Yup, that's right, LSF will be descending on Washington's latest attraction, the International Spy Museum!

When: Saturday, April 5, 2003. Meet at 2:45 in front of the museum (or in line if there is one); hopefully we'll get in by 3:00.

Where: The International Spy Museum is at 800 F St NW, near the Gallery Place/Chinatown Metro station, & not far from the Archives/Navy Memorial station.

Costs: This ain't the Smithsonian. Tickets for the museum are \$11 for adults, \$9 for seniors/military ID, \$8 for kids K-12, and free for kids 4 and under. Tickets can be purchased in advance by calling 202-654-0960 at least 24 hours in advance or by visiting the museum at least 24 hours in advance; a \$2 service charge will be applied for phone orders. Also, if we get 20 or more people interested, we can get group rates (not very likely, though).

The museum recommends about two hours for a visit; we can go for an early dinner afterward. There are two restaurants on site and others nearby; Chinatown is a simple stroll away. There's also a museum shop!

Gaylaxicon 2004 - San Diego is pleased to announce its Artist Guest of Honor, confirmed dates, and updated membership prices for the convention.

We are honored and delighted that San Diego-based comics artist **Joe Phillips** has agreed to be our **Artist Guest of Honor**. Mr. Phillips has worked for DC Comics, Innovation Comics and Wizards of the Coast, drawing such characters as Superman,

Spider-Man, Batman, Wonder Woman, Silver Surfer, Catwoman, Superboy, Green Lantern, and many others. He is also the artist behind *Rage Gay Crusader*, a comic based on a comic seen in the Showtime series *Queer As Folk*.

Mr. Phillips' art has also appeared in various publications, including *XY Magazine* and *Xodus Magazine*, and the upcoming re-release of *The Joy of Gay Sex*. He has a successful product line with Xodus USA, which features his artwork on tattoos, greeting cards, books, T-shirts and magnet sets. His popular calendars include "Innocent Moments," "Boys Will Be Boys", and "Girls Will Be Girls," all of which will be returning in 2004. His first animated


You know those bits on the back of books where writers tell you how great this one is? Most people ignore them, but I find them useful. For example, I read anything that Tim Powers praises. So when I picked up Jack Dann's anthology, *Jubilee*, reissued in the United States by Tor Books, and saw people like Robert Silverberg and Gardner Dozois calling this work "vivid" and "the best", I had to give it a try.

And I was not disappointed. The stories are a mix of science fiction, fantasy, and just plain interesting. They explore human emotions and take us on spins through both familiar and strange territory. The anthology starts off with a bang: "The Diamond Pit" describes a 1920's barnstormer who is trapped in a luxurious prison and must choose between his conscience and love. All this is wrapped in a diamond literally the size of a mountain. Some of the stories have a lighter touch, as in "Fairy Tale", where a Jewish Catskills comedian has a run-in with some very nasty fairies. This yarn includes a delightful glossary of Yinglish, perfect for those like me who are not up on our Yiddish-English terms. Dann's Jewish background is very evident in many of these stories, as in "Jumping the Road", where a Rabbi travels to a distant world to explore the

mystery of how Judaism developed there before any Earth spaceships reached the planet. In true Dann style, the Rabbi grapples with his own issue of how God can let bad things happen. The contents of *Jubilee* were written between 1978 and 2001 and include such gems as the award-winning alternate history "Da Vinci Rising", following the thread of what if Leonardo Da Vinci had created a successful flying machine?

These are stories about emotions, and they involve our emotions. Dann shows us places and people we know, but shares the dark, the strange, and the fun of these, always with a twist. Predictability is not a part of the book. In the story "Tea", an old Jewish woman finds the man she has been inviting into her home is a Nazi war criminal. Her reaction is believable, but also unexpected; and it tugs at the heart. That tug is also in "Tattoos", where a man discovers an old friend has the ability to ease peoples' guilt through his tattoo art, but at a price to artist.

Jubilee is a work of many facets, and each is rich in its own way. The kudos from authors and others is well-deserved. Words like "passionate" and "inspired madman" can only hint at the what you will find in this book. If I seem to be gushing, give this work a try. I don't think you will be disappointed either.

The Year of the Hangman by Gary Blackwood

(Dutton, 2002)

As I've doubtless said many, many times, I'm a big fan of alternate history stories.

Actually, people have been writing "what if?" histories for centuries; but "alternate history" as a recognized SF sub-genre is only a few decades old. Some authorities contend that the sub-genre only "began" in 1939, with the publication of L. Sprague de Camp's original short story version of "Lest Darkness Fall"; and one of the "modern classics" of the sub-genre, Ward Moore's *Bring the Jubilee*, was written in 1953. And alternate histories have only become *really* popular in even more recent times. The Sidewise Awards for Alternate History have only been around since 1995; and Uchronia: The Alternate History List (www.uchronia.net) has only been around a little longer, since 1991. Now, while shopping for Young Adult (YA) historical fiction for one of my nieces, I've even found a YA alternate history novel! And it's *good!*

The story opens in the year 1777. Many of the inhabitants of the British colonies in North America have started calling it "the Year of the Hangman" because of the large number of rebels and traitors who have of late been decorating gibbets throughout the colonies. The armed forces of the American rebellion have just been soundly defeated by the mighty British army; and the captured rebel military commander, General George Washington, has been whisked off to a military prison somewhere to await his fate at the end of a hangman's noose. Without Washington's leadership and unifying influence, the military portion of the rebellion pretty much collapsed. Those rebel leaders who have thus far eluded capture — Benjamin Franklin, Thomas Jefferson, General Benedict Arnold, and others — have fled to Spanish-held New Orleans for safety, from whence they continue to carry on a seemingly hopeless resistance to British Imperial tyranny.



It is into this troubled setting that Creighton Brown, a spoiled young 15-year-old from an impoverished but well-born English family, is thrust. Creighton's father, a Major in the British army, has apparently been killed in a skirmish against the rebels in Carolina — although his body has never been found and there seems to be some sort of bureaucratic snafu holding up the payment of his military pension. One night, while returning from a particularly unsuccessful card party, Creighton is abducted by a band of disguised soldiers and secretly shipped across the Atlantic to Charles Town, Carolina Colony. Unknown to Creighton, the mastermind behind his abduction is Sir Edward Lyndon, current suitor to Creighton's widowed mother. Creighton is finally delivered to his mother's stern and *very* unsympathetic brother, Colonel Gower, military aide to the royal governor of Carolina. As a result of a series of startling events, Creighton finds himself in Spanish New Orleans, where Colonel Gower expects him to spy on the rebel leadership. But, living amongst the rebels — indeed, living in the home of Dr. Benjamin Franklin himself — Creighton comes to like some of the rebels and slowly begins to learn that the circumstances of the American rebellion aren't necessarily what he'd been led to believe back in England. Will the reluctant "spy" become a "turncoat" himself; or will he remain loyal to the cause in which his father died?


I was delighted to find *The Year of the Hangman* to be such a very well-written and enjoyable alternate history story. I can't help but feel that it could

serve as quite a suitable introduction for young readers to the concept of "what might have happened if" — and Creighton Brown and other young characters provide a view of things that I'm sure will provide younger readers with a clearer sense of identification. On the other hand, Blackwood's authorial skills are such that I think adults are able to find the book a good read. I actually think some aspects of the story might be a bit "gritty" for young readers — it's *not* a sugar-sweet, modern version of "Dick & Jane meet George Washington"! And *The Year of the Hangman* certainly serves as an antidote to the mistaken impression that the success of the American Revolution was as much of a "sure thing" as many of us think nowadays. As the author points out in the concluding "Author's Note," General Washington *was* in fact captured by British troops and only rescued by his men "at the last moment." If you're an alternate history fan like I am, then I think you'll enjoy this book, too — and I don't think you could do wrong by recommending it to budding young readers either!
