

Gaylaxicon 2004 Announces Guest of Honor and Host Hotel

Gaylaxicon 2004 - San Diego is pleased to announce that author David Gerrold has agreed to be a Guest of Honor at the convention, which will be held at the Red Lion Hanalei Hotel, April 8-11, 2004.

Mr. Gerrold is the Hugo, Nebula and Spectrum award-winning author of *The Martian Child*, the "War Against The Chtorr" series, *Jumping Off The Planet* and *Bouncing Off The Moon, The Voyage Of The Star Wolf, The Man Who Folded Himself, When HARLIE Was One, In The Deadlands, Moonstar Odyssey, Space Skimmer*, and "The Trouble With Tribbles" episode of *Star Trek*.

Mr. Gerrold has been writing professionally since the sale of his first television script, "The Trouble With Tribbles," in 1967, which to this day remains the most popular episode of *Star* Trek. In addition to other episodes of Star Trek, he has written for over a dozen other television series, including Star Trek: The Animated Series, Star Trek: The Next Generation, The Twilight Zone, Babylon 5, Sliders, Logan's Run, and Tales From The Darkside: and he is the creator of Land of the Lost. Mr. Gerrold has also published more than forty books, and has been nominated for or received Hugo, Nebula, Spectrum, Lambda Literary, Locus Readership Poll, Homer, Sturgeon, and Hal Clement "Golden Duck" Awards.



Mr. Gerrold attends science fictions conventions all over the world, and conducts an auction at each one to benefit AIDS Project Los Angeles, raising over \$30,000 to date and still going. He resides in Los Angeles, California, with his adopted son, who was the basis for the semi-autobiographical novelette *The Martian Child*. (Thankfully, now that his son is a teenager, Mr. Gerrold no longer suspects his son is a Martian - he's sure of it.)

Mr. Gerrold joins previously announced Guest of Honor artist Joe Phillips, the comic artist whose resumé includes work for DC Comics, Innovation Comics, and Wizards of the Coast, drawing such characters as Superman, Spider-Man, Batman, Wonder Woman, Silver Surfer, Catwoman, Superboy, Green Lantern, and many others, and is the artist behind *Rage: Gay Crusader*, based on the comic seen in the Showtime series *Queer As Folk*.



Delany, critic and sciencefiction novelist, address racial and social issues, heroic quests, the nature of language, and the process of thinking He critiques our present-day society by creating new worlds with values and conventions different from ours. He casts a critical eye on sexual persecution against women, ambisexuals, and homosexuals. His work is a testimony to a future Delany believes will change to reflect human diversity honestly. Delany is one of American science fiction's most consistently brilliant and inventive writers.

Delany's more than thirty books include *Dhalgren*, *Stars in My Pockets Like Grains of Sand*, *Driftglass*, *Return*

Abarat by Clive Barker



Children's fantasy can take us to wonderful, strange places, as in the *Alice in Wonderland* books. They present magical places that are both enchanting and frightening. Keeping with this tradition, Clive Barker has created *Abarat*, as weird and wonderful an adventure story as has ever been written. Do not let Barker's reputation as a horror writer throw you off: this is an outstanding piece that any fan of fantasy will want to read.

Candy Quackenbush is growing up in Chickentown, Minnesota. It is a community known only for its large chicken farms (hence, the name of the town); and life can be pretty dull. Not only does nothing exciting happen there. but Candy's family life is grey, with an alcoholic, out-of-work father and a beaten-down mother. While preparing a school report for her sixth grade class, Candy discovers a hint of mystery in the town's past. Things really become strange when she stumbles across a lighthouse in the middle of the prairie. She meets an antlered man named John Mischief, a interesting character whose seven brothers are heads attached to his antlers. After helping Mischief flee from a dark pursuer, Candy chooses to go with him into the Sea of Isabella to



Abarat. This archipelago of twenty-five islands represents the hours of the day and one island that is "time out of time." As Candy explores Abarat, she discovers it is not a land of sunshine and happiness. Two men are wielding their power over the islands to change its face to what they desire. The Prince of Midnight, Christopher Carrion, wants to plunge the archipelago into darkness and allow the monsters at the bottom of the sea to rise. Rojo Pixler, owner of Commexo Company, sees the islands joining into his technological ideal, with all magic disappearing. Candy slowly begins to feel she has been in Abarat before and that she may not only have some role to play in its future, but also in the future of these two men.



While this is not a horror work or even a dark fantasy, *Abarat* does have its hard edges. This is not a drawback. Barker sets the atmosphere and ignores no details. Even the names of the characters are wonderful and remind me of the Gormenghast series. The visual aspects are not neglected: there are over one hundred color pictures in this lavishly illustrated book, all painted by Barker. These capture the feeling of the book, giving the reader access the author's vision of Abarat directly.

This book is the first of four; and the final judgement on the series will have to wait until all the volumes are printed. If the ones that follow are as good as *Abarat*, Barker will have a new children's classic to his credit.

Cowboy BeBop: The Movie (and the DVD!!)

Cowboy BeBop: The Movie is wonderful! If you're a fan of the animé series, then you absolutely must see this feature film! It's a great mix of humor, drama, and

action/adventure, just like in the original TV series. There's lots'a new stuff; but there's also plenty that's familiar: Punch

& Judy appear in a broadcast of *Big Shot*, the bounty-hunter show; Edward is just as loopy as ever; and even Antonio, Carlos, and Jobim (the three old guys in the bar who show up in various *BeBop* episodes) make a significant contribution to the story. Granted, the movie's storyline isn't as tight as the typical *Cowboy BeBop* episode -- it develops at a rather more leisurely pace. But, then, this shouldn't come as much of a surprise: the film runs almost two hours, whereas each original episode only lasts about 25 minutes.

Surprisingly, the original *Cowboy BeBop* themes ("Tank!" and "The Real Folk Blues") are absent from the

movie; but there's still a catchy, jazzy filmscore that adds just that certain zest to the story.

And, to top it all off – Oh, joy! Oh, rapture! – I've just read an announcement that *Cowboy BeBop: The Movie* will be available on DVD soon! Columbia TriStar Home Entertainment will be releasing a "special edition" (*i.e.* with lots'a added goodies) on June 24th. I can hardly wait to get my own copy! (But I must admit that I'm really glad I got to see it on "the big screen"!)

So You Think We're Weird?!

OK, I'll admit it: we can be pretty "outside the norm" around here from time to time; but the members of Lambda Sci-Fi simply can't hold a candle to certain other organizations when it comes to outright *weirdness*! And, no, it's not necessary to go back as far as the 18th-Century Hellfire Club to find folks weirder than us! Let's look back only about a century to an organization composed of good ol' American middle class, professional "solid citizens" – the Whitechapel Club.

By 1892, the Whitechapel Club had replaced the Press Club as Chicago's primary watering hole for prominent young newspaper reporters and editors, a place to swap newspaper gossip, play poker, and drink. Ah, but it was also so much more! Opie Read (member, and publisher of The Arkansas Traveler) called the Whitechapel Club "the world's most fantastic institution"; and George Ade (member, and reporter/columnist for Chicago's News-Record) called it "a little group of thirsty intellectuals who were opposed to everything." Ade also recalled picking up leads for his column in the spirited conversations held there: talk "of the streets and of the town. stories of Chicago life." It's even been said that those late-night talks in the



dimly-lit Whitechapel Club "became a testing field for some of the best reporting in the city."

As observers/reporters of life in the Chicago of the 1890's, you can well imagine that the club's members had become pretty thick-skinned about the shocking nature of the urban scene (slum life, grisly murders, etc.). That probably explains the club's ambiance. First of all, the name: ves, indeed, in 1890, the founders of the Whitechapel Club deliberately named it after the London slum where (just 2 years earlier) Jack the Ripper had made a name for himself. ("The Ripper" was even the official title of the club president!) Next, the location: the club rented rooms in "Newspaper Alley", an unlit, noisome alley behind the Daily News building. Finally, the decor: like something from the imagination of Edgar Allan Poe or the 1959 film Horrors of the Black Museum.

The center of the club's front room was dominated by a bar that was shaped like a coffin; it was lit solely by gas jets placed inside skulls hanging on the walls. The room was further decorated by other grisly trophies: human skulls (donated by an alienist at the nearby county insane asylum); hangmen's nooses and assorted weapons used in actual homicides (provided by Chicago policemen); and a bloodstained blanket (acquired by member Charles Seymour as a souvenir of his news coverage of the Sioux Indian Wars). After a member's initiation, he was even served a quart of ale in a silverlined skull!

But the weirdness at the Whitechapel Club didn't stop at the

decor; the members got up to some pretty wild hijinks, too! They liked to play pranks on famous out-of-town guests – such as Theodore Roosevelt – often sending out robed members to kidnap visiting celebrities and steal them away in a black coach with covered windows, all without saying a word! (Certainly doesn't sound like the Kiwanis Club, does it?)

Their most outrageous and famous stunt, however, involved the cremation of one of their members on a huge pyre on the shores of Lake Michigan. When Morris Allen Collins ("a rum-soaked, would-be poet who was the sole member of his own Suicide Club") finally killed himself with an overdose of morphine, a group of fellow club members claimed his body at the morgue, placed it in a pine box, carted it off by train to the Indiana Dunes, built a 20foot-high pyre on the lakeshore, and lit it with torches. As Collins went out in a blaze of glory, hooded, black-robed club members marched around the pyre singing dirges or solemn hymns to the dead and drinking whiskey. Money for the coffin, the rail tickets, and the whiskey had come from James W. Scott, editor of the Chicago Herald, in return for exclusive rights to the story. Next day. Scott filled the entire front page of his Sunday edition with an account of the funeral. (The story also made the front page of the New York Times.)

Sort'a makes LSF's "video madness" parties or last year's "Harry Potter Halloween Party" look like small potatoes, doesn't it? Or maybe it just gives us a goal to shoot for?
