1425 "S" Street, NW Washington, DC. Time: 7:00 - 11:00 PM (doors open at 6:30



toward the McDonald's and turn left in front of the McDonald's. Follow 14th Street for two full blocks. When you cross "T" Street, you'll pass a church that looks like a warehouse. Keep going. When you cross Swann Street (between "T" and "S" Streets), you'll pass a 24-

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The LSF Book Discussion Group





hour laundry. At "S" Street turn right. (If you cross "S" Street and pass a small used car lot, you've gone too far.) Next, you'll pass the Whitman-Walker Clinic and then an alley. We're the seventh row house after the alley: 1425 "S" Street, NW. If you get lost, give us a call at 202-483-6369.

Alternative Metro Stop: Take Metro to the Dupont Circle stop (Red Line). Exit the Metro on the "Q" Street side of the station; and, at the top of the escalator, turn right on "Q" Street. Follow "Q" Street, past a liquor store on your right and a Wrap Works sandwich shop on your left for 5 blocks. You'll pass the Raku Asian restaurant at 19th Street, a couple of large apartment buildings at 18th Street, New Hampshire Ave. (at a diagonal), a Trios Pizza restaurant at 17th Street, the Jewish Community Center at 16th Street, and row houses at 15th Street. Cross 15th Street and turn left. Travel two blocks on 15th Street to "S" Street. Cross "S" Street and turn right. We're two-thirds of the way down the street: 1425 "S" Street. NW. If you get lost, give us a call at 202-483-6369.

Driving Directions: 1425 "S" St., NW is in the 1400 block of "S" St. (which runs East-West), half-way between 14th and 15th Streets (which run North-South). 14th St. is a two-way street; and 15th St. is a one-way street heading North. "S" St. is a two-way street.

From the North: Take 16th St. (Exit 31 on the Beltway) or Connecticut Ave. (Exit 33 on the Beltway) heading South. Turn left onto "S" St. and go $1\frac{1}{2}$ blocks (from 16th) or $6\frac{1}{2}$ blocks (from Connecticut).

A number of LSF'ers attended the World Science Fiction Convention in Boston last weekend. Much fun was had by all, even if there was just one GLBT panel. <sigh> Carl was pleased to relate that Frank Robinson agreed to a guest at next year's GCon in Boston. (Wayne W. was please, too.) Frank has a new book out this year entitled The Donor (and it has GLBT content.) GCon 2005 Author Guest of Honor Lois McMaster Bujold's novel The Palladin of Souls won this year's Hugo Award for Best Novel at WorldCon. Rob reported on the winners of this year's Gaylactic Spectrum Awards, which were also announced at WorldCon. (Glad to see that Nalo Hopkinson's The Salt Roads won best novel.) The gay superhero, Surge of Power, attended WorldCon (as well as the film's producerdirector); and this entertaining action film was shown as part of WorldCon activities. Gay-themed episodes Star Trek: Hidden Frontier were shown one evening at one of the GLBT parties.




Strange Cargo by Jeffrey E. Barlough (Ace Books, 2004) reviewed by Carl

[Introductory Note: I can hardly believe that I finally beat Colleen to a review of one of Barlough's books. I thought for sure my stint as a Spectrum judge would hold me up long enough for her to send in another one of her terrific reviews. As a reminder, Colleen reviewed Barlough's two earlier novels – Dark Sleeper (1998) and The House in the High Wood (2001) – in this newsletter; and all I was able to say was "ditto."]

What if Charles Dickens had written F&SF? What if Dickens had been be influenced by such writers as Edgar Allen Poe, Jules Verne, and H.G. Wells? Well, Jeffrey Barlough's "Western Lights" novels can give you a pretty good idea of what type of F&SF Dickens might have produced. Take, for example, *Strange Cargo*, the third book in this fascinating series...

In Barlough's "Western Lights" universe, something Happened to our world sometime during the mid-Nineteenth Century. It's very clear that it is supposedly our world (languages, flora and fauna, references to England and France and Greece and Italy, etc.) — but the "the Sundering" occurred and everything changed! Exactly what happened hasn't been made exactly clear ---possibly some sort of asteroid strike of near planet-buster proportions. As a result, though, the entire Old World (Europe, Asia, etc.) seems to have been obliterated; and, as far as the reader knows, all that's left is a very English sort of society huddling along a northwestern coastline somewhere, presumably protected from the worst effects of the disaster by a range of high mountains immediately to the east. (I keep getting the distinct impression that the setting is along the Pacific coast of North America, between Alaska and California.) It's also a rather cold, wet, and dreary world now — just the right setting for a Dickensian/Gothic tale! (It also tends to support the idea of a postcataclysmic Ice Age of some sort.) And, to make the setting complete, the forests,



moors, fens, and seas are filled with Pleistocene megafauna (such as mammoths and sabertooth tigers) — much more in evidence in this novel than in the previous two.

Sounds kind'a SF'y, doesn't it? "But where's the Dickens?" you ask. Well, in the "Western Lights" stories, Barlough has deftly written what some reviewers have called a "Victorian pastiche." The society depicted in his novels is very much Victorian/Dickensian in nature — technological level, societal conventions, manners, language, etc. And, speaking of language, Barlough has quite a knack for writing Victorian dialog — grammar, syntax, vocabulary, and dialects - an absolute delight! And listen to the names of some of the characters in Strange Cargo: Mr. Hake Jobberly (the lighthouse keeper's assistant in the village of Paignton Swidges); Mr. Arthur Liffey, Attorney (of the town of Cargo); Miss Aspasia Veal (a selfrighteous, be-wigged old maid); Captain Jack Barnaby (owner and master of the good ship Salty Sue); Dr. Giddeus Pinches (rector of St. Mary-le-Quay); Mr. Malachi Threadneedle (former grocer, inveterate "tinkerer," and current master of the estate of Smithy Bank); and poor, haunted Miss Jane Wastefield (tragic heroine of the piece) — and on, and on, and on - all sounding like they've just stepped from the pages of a Charles Dickens novel!

Strange Cargo intertwines several distinct storylines that eventually connect (or collide) toward the end of the novel. In one, poor Miss Jane Wastefield is haunted by an ancient bronze mirror that she cannot get rid of - no matter how she disposes of it, it somehow returns to her possession. This mysterious artifact has caused the death of her widowed father; and its insidious siren call is bringing her ever more horrific and realistic nightmares. Perhaps one of her father's antiquarian contacts can help rid her of it? In another storyline, Mr. Fred Cargo, his irascible wife Susan, and the spinsterish Miss Aspasia Veal — and their loval family attorney, Mr. Liffey - have set out on a journey in search of one Jerry Squailes. The mysterious Mr. Squailes has somehow been granted a sizeable bequest in the will of Fred's miserly grandfather; and Mrs. Cargo (for one) and Miss Veal (for another) have no intention of letting this "unknown interloper" receive a brass farthing! And, finally, there's Mr. Threadneedle, the kindly old master of Smithy Bank (inherited in his own right upon the decease of his loving wife, the former Mrs. Baxendale). His well-hidden "tinkering" out in the estate's coach house has led to a scientific discovery of truly stupendous proportions and is the source of all those sightings of mysterious flying objects up and down the coast.

As I said, each of these three storylines — each a delight in and of itself — all come together by the end of the novel. Along the way, the reader is treated to shadowy strangers, grasping lawyers, horrific demons with a taste for human flesh, star-crossed lovers, perilous sea voyages, powerful ancient gods, harrowing escapes, angry ghosts, improbable Victorian pseudo-science, ravening prehistoric beasts, uppity servants, shiftless ne'er-do-wells, and coincidences and serendipitous encounters sufficient to keep any fan of Charles Dickens happy. (The reader will also learn much more about the cause of "the Sundering" — not exactly my favorite part of the story.) All in all, a delightful read! To Mr. Jeffrey Barlough I say (in the style of Miss Aspasia Veal): "Thenk vaw!" **ΛΨΦ**
