March LSF Meeting

Business Meeting

Carl advised that he and other LSF members are exploring the idea of running a Gavlaxicon in the DC area in 2008, perhaps in the September timeframe. He named various LSF members who have already volunteered to fulfill various roles. Wayne Wilkening (in Boston) has also expressed interest in helping out. Carl explained that LSF will be asked to host the con, but that the con-comm would be a separate organization from LSF. (It would ideally be an incorporated 501C3 organization and would secure its own liability insurance for the con-comm and the convention weekend.) He also said the con-comm would probably ask the Gaylactic Network and LSF for some seed money. They will be looking at hotels in and around Ballston, Arlington, and other locations that are Metro-accessible. A new, separate e-mail list has been created to discuss con-planning activities. Peter volunteered to e-mail the regular LSF mail list members with the new G-Con 2008 list name and invite those who are interested to subscribe to that list.

MOTION (Carl): I move that LSF host Gaylaxicon 2008.

This motion will be voted on at the April meeting.

Peter informed everyone that this year's Capital Pride parade is slated

for Saturday, June 10, with the festival on Sunday, June 11. He suggested that LSF follow the same tradition as in prior years: host a joint LSF meeting (changed from the regular 2nd-Sunday schedule) and video party at Peter & Rob's home starting on the afternoon of the 10th, stroll over to the parade at an appropriate time, eat out somewhere (or get fast food/pizza/etc. at Peter & Rob's), then return to the video party. Then, on Sunday, the 11th, LSF will have its booth at the Capital Pride festival at Freedom Plaza. (Note: The following weekend is Gaylaxicon 2006 in Toronto!)

Social Meeting

LSF Speaker Norman initiated a name circle, especially helpful for two first-timers. Kendall stated that the Lambda Literary Awards finalists have been announced, and he cited the F&SF finalists. It was noted that Sam Goody is going out of business and that good deals on genre videos can be had. (Hurry fast!)

Peter passed around Parsec, the newsletter of the Pittsburgh-area scifi club. Barrett brought some genrerelated posters from prior Smithsonian exhibit and several members bought them (proceeds to the LSF treasury).

The Natural History Museum will be showing Harry Potter IV on the BIG screen sometime soon. Rob mentioned that his review of Octavia Butler's last book, Fledgling, is now posted at: strangehorizons.com He commented

that Fledgling has GLBT content.

Rob also announced that Gaylactic Spectrum Award nominations will be open through the end of March 2006. The awards will be announced at the 2006 WorldCon (Anaheim).

Michael reported that the recent LSF movie outing to see the original Kong Kong at the AFI was lots of fun. He is planning another AFI movie outing to see Sunset Boulevard, which could be stretched to be considered genre-related. [Ed. Note: Itis narrated by a dead man, va know!]

X-Men III opens on May 5. Peter is thinking about hosting a video party to show the first and second X-Men movies prior to the X-Men III opening. Look for an upcoming e-mail announcement. Rob suggested an outing to see V for Vendetta.

The upcoming LSF Book Discussion Group titles are: James Tiptree Award Anthology I (March), Harry Turtledove's Ruled Britannia (April), Neal Stephenson's Quicksilver (May - Note: it's the new mass-paperback version or only the first "book" within the hardback or trade paperback versions), The Watchmen, the DC graphic novel (June).

The meeting wrapped up with an animated discussion of the season finale episode of Battlestar Galactica. (New episodes begin in October.) Plus, Peter enthusiastically advised that the 2006 Doctor Who episodes will soon be shown in the US.

On February 24th, awardwinning SF author Octavia Butler fell outside her house and struck her head. She was found by a neighbor and rushed to the hospital, where they found that blood had pooled in her brain. She passed away the next day.

Before anybody told her that black girls do not grow up to write science fiction, Butler (the daughter of a shoeshine man and a maid) was already fashioning a place for herself in a white-dominated universe Octavia Butler became one of the country's leading writers - a female African American pioneer in the white, male domain of science fiction. She has been considered the most successful African American woman writing in the science fiction genre; and in 1995 she became the only science fiction writer to receive one of the vaunted "genius grants" (\$295,000) from the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation. She has also received the PEN Center West Lifetime Achievement Award, two Nebula awards, and two Hugo Awards.

Following her participation in the Clarion Science Fiction Writers Workshop, Butler's first short story ("Crossover") appeared in the 1971 Clarion anthology. Additional sales were slow to develop; but in time she published nearly 20 novels and books.

Perhaps Butler's most popular work is *Kindred* (1979), a timetravel novel in which a black woman from 1976 Southern California is transported back to the violent days of slavery before the Civil War. The novel — an exploration of issues such as the relationship between the empowered and the powerless, and an expression of Butler's vision of social justice — became a popular staple of school and college courses and now




Octavia Butler 1947 - 2006

has more than a quarter million copies in print. (*Kindred* was repeatedly rejected by publishers, many of whom could not understand how a science fiction novel could be set on a plantation in the antebellum South.)

In Butler's stories, African Americans and other people of color are present and significant in ways they had not been previously. This both attracted readers and allowed her to use the genre as a powerful means of speaking to a range of issues including race, gender, and the environment. Her best-known works include: Patternmaster (1976); Survivor (1978); Wild Seed (1980); "Speech Sounds" (1984; Hugo for best short story); *Clay's Ark* (1984); "Bloodchild" (1985, Hugo and Nebula for best novelette); Imago (1989); Parable of the Sower (1993); Bloodchild and Other Stories (1995); and Parable of the Talents (1998, Nebula for best novel). Finally, after encountering a form of writer's block, came her first new novel in seven years, Fledgling (2005). The novel is reportedly uncharacteristic for Butler, including as it does both a vampire story and significant GLBT content.

In 1999 (after her mother's death), Butler moved from her native Southern California to Seattle. Normally



reclusive (self-described as "comfortably asocial"), she became a frequent participant in readings and writers' conferences, especially Clarion West. She also served on the advisory board of Seattle's Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame.

Steven Barnes (SF writer, from his webpage): "A lady of incredible intelligence and rather dark humor, she was also what I called 'a REAL writer.""

Tananarive Due (F&SF writer, from a *Seattle Post-Intelligencer* interview): "What she really conveyed in her writing was the deep pain she felt about the injustices around her. All of it was a metaphor for war, poverty, power struggles and discrimination. All of that hurt her very deeply, but her gift was that she could use words for the pain and make the world better."

Rob Gates (Gaylactic Spectrum Award Administrator, from an email): "She was a brilliant writer and, if there is justice, will be remembered as one of the greatest writers ever of the speculative fiction genre. Her work speaks of what we were, what we are, and what we might become as individuals and as a society."

Walter Mosley (mystery/SF writer; quoted in a *Los Angeles Times* article): "She wasn't writing romance or feel-good novels, she was writing very difficult, brilliant work... For an African American woman to somehow define herself as a science fiction writer and to realize that dream is an extraordinary thing."

On March 2nd, Seattle's Science Fiction Museum and Hall of Fame hosted readings and remembrances in honor of Octavia Butler, including an open-microphone session during which people shared their memories of her life.

Greek Mythology Revisited (Part 2) a review by Carl Cipra

As I said in Part 1 of this series (in the January 2006 newsletter), Greek mythology is a pretty big subject; and there are certainly a lot of F&SF books out there based on the stories and themes and images of the gods, heroes, and monsters of the ancient Greeks. I thought I'd share my thoughts about some of the good ones I've read recently. In Part 1, I started by reviewing a recent translation of "the Sources" (The Iliad and The Odvssev, translated by Robert Fagles) and a couple of unique works about Greek mythology: Spivey's Songs on Bronze and Calimach's Lover's Legends: The Gay Greek Myths.

This month, I'll continue the series by looking at the first of three sexy "mythological biographies."



Alexander the Fabulous: The Man Who Brought the World to Its Knees, by Michael Alvear and Vicky A. Shecler (Advocate Books/Alyson Publications, 2004)

OK, OK, I know what you're thinking. Strictly speaking, Alexander the Great isn't exactly "fair game" when it comes to a discussion of Greek mythology. Well, I offer the following in my defense: (1) Alexander frequently proclaimed himself to be the son of Zeus. (This was either a reflection of his colossal ego or a product of his rather stormy relationship with his human father, Philip of Macedon.) (2) He was certainly considered to be at least a demigod by his contemporaries. (3) He seems to have consciously patterned his life after that of the mythical hero Achilles possibly even considered himself and his "longtime companion" Hephaestion to have been some sort of reincarnation of Achilles and Patroclus. (4) By medieval times, the historical Alexander had become the center of a number of fables and legends that were collected into the incredible and widely-read "Alexander Romance" (which included, for example, stories of how Alexander had traveled under the sea in a glass submersible and been carried up into the heavens by tamed gryphons). (5) Not to mention the fact that Alexander has certainly been incorporated into some sort of "gay mythology" in the present Era. (6) And there *is* a lot of discussion of "gay Greek myths" in this book (Zeus and Ganymede, Hercules and his many young lovers, etc.). So, having said that...

This is a very "glitter and be gay" book – lots of wry humor, lots of sexual innuendo, lots of gay double entendre. Here are a couple of examples:

In a world where gods were believed to take human form, Alexander became intoxicated with this exalted view of himself. This was especially true in bed. When his lovers yelled "Oh, God, I'm coming!" Alexander always replied, "I know, sweetheart, I know."

[excerpt from the "Timeline" at the beginning of the book] 333 BCE Alexander, 23, solves riddle of Gordian knot, wins first Persian conflict – the Battle of Issus – conquering all of Turkey. Goes online with sassy screen name ("Fuknhotblond") and provocative profile ("strong stick, velvet throat"), trades pictures and meets the beautiful eunuch Bagoas at a Starbucks.

This is not to say, however, that there isn't a lot of accurate historical reportage in amongst all the sassy patter – there *is*. In fact, I highly recommend "Chapter 4: Sex in the City-States" for a fairly lucid explanation of the *erastes/ eromenos* {"lover"/"beloved") relationship and of Greek socio-sexual practices in general.


Just don't go into this book expecting a replay of your high school (or even college) History 101 text. I mean, *puh-leez*! This book is quite witty and *très amusant*.


Says Kendall:


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Aquaman: A New, New Body? info passed along by Carl
