"Hey! You Got Your Mystery in My Science Fiction!!"


OK, OK, I realize that the M-word ("Mystery" — not "Madonna" — you ninny!) doesn't cut a lot of ice around LSF, but there are actually some really good science-fictional mystery stories out there — and I recently read two books containing just that kind of cross-over work.

There are, after all, some strong ties between the Mystery and Science Fiction genres. Lots of well-known, successful F&SF authors have written works in both genres — including Fredric Brown, Alfred Bester, Jack Vance, Richard Matheson, Henry Kuttner, Isaac Asimov, and Leigh Bracket. And, more recently, well-known mystery writer Walter Mosley has been trying his hand at science fiction (Blue Light, Futureland, and The Wave). And, says editor Mike Resnick in his Introduction to Down These Dark Spaceways, just over a halfcentury ago, two novels clearly disproved the theory "that no one could effectively blend the mystery story with the science fiction story": Alfred Bester's The Demolished Man (1953, winner of the first Hugo) and Isaac Asimov's The Caves of Steel (1954). I'll also add that one of Robert E. Howard's Conan stories ("The God in the Bowl") is quite clearly a "locked room mystery" story (first published in 1952); and, to mention a few of my favorites, there are Janet Kagan's SF/Mystery novel Hellspark (1988) and John Varley's Anna-Louise Bach stories, such as "The Barbie Murders" (1978) and "The Bellman" (2004).

At any rate, on to my reviews of a couple of recent SF/Mystery books.

Down These Dark Spaceways ed. by Mike Resnick (Science Fiction Book Club, 2005)

I ordered this all-original anthology through the Science Fiction Book Club on the basis of the following: its editor (Mike Resnick) and its theme (sci-fi mysteries). It turns out I made a really good choice!

In his Introduction, Resnick provides a clear statement of the anthology's theme: "I decided that it might be interesting to use what is known as the Black Mask school of writing as a jumping-off point for a sextet of science fiction novellas." OK, now I'm really hooked! For those of you not familiar with the Pulp Era, Black Mask magazine (under the editorship of Joseph Shaw, 1926 - 1936) was arguably the finest detective pulp magazine ever published. It regularly featured such authors as Dashiell Hammett (creator of Sam Spade) and Raymond Chandler (creator of Philip Marlowe) and was known for its "hard-boiled fiction."

On the whole, I think Resnick did a good job of presenting science fiction with a "hard-boiled" slant in *Down These Dark Spaceways*. And what a collection! Every author is either a Nebula and/or Hugo winner, a Nebula and/or Hugo nominee, or a Campbell Memorial Award nominee/winner.

The book starts off with a contribution by Mike Resnick himself: "Guardian Angel." It's filled with all kinds of satisfyingly *noir* twists and turns, as a sci-fi PI searches for a missing teenager, the son of an ice-queen society matron and an interstellar gangster – although the young man might not be so much "missing" as "fleeing."

Then there's "In the Quake Zone," by David Gerrold. This was probably my favorite of the lot. The quakes Gerrold includes in his story are

timequakes; and his L.A. detective travels back and forth and up and down the timeline trying to find out why another time-traveler is murdering young gay men in West Hollywood – and, if possible, stop him before he kills any of them. (I've nominated it for this year's Spectrum Awards.)

The next story, Catherine Asaro's "The City of Cries," is probably my least favorite of the anthology. It's not that it's not a good story – it is a good story. It's just that I don't think it fits the "hard-boiled detective" theme as well as the others. The story is set in Asaro's "Skolian Empire" universe. The investigator, an ex-street rat-ex-military-turned-gumshoe, must work her way through the delicate (and deadly) social intricacies of the ruling Dynasty (as well as of her former underworld friends) to find an AWOL young prince. Or is he a kidnapped young prince?

Robert Reed's "Camouflage" is a really fascinating tale of the far-distantfuture; and it truly has "interstellar" scope. It all takes place within the unbelievably immense, unbelievably old Great Ship as it lumbers on its continuing multi-billion-year voyage around the galaxy. Reed's unwilling investigator – who's hiding a number of his own secrets - is tasked by the Great Ship's stern First Chair to unravel a centurieslong series of murders involving the exhusbands of a reclusive resident-passenger. (Truth to tell, I found the descriptions of the Great Ship - which are scattered throughout the story - as much of a treat as the story itself.)

Jack McDevitt is one of my favorite writers. "The Big Downtown" is yet another example of why that is. A female detective finds that her latest missing-person case has turned into a murder/cover-up with links to various high-rollers in the interstellar archeology community. But how did an artist's model get involved with them? And why kill her (and, as it turns out, several others)? The setting is in and around a future Washington, DC of the not-toodistant future — and it contains references to events in some of McDevitt's recent novels.

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Mystery in Science Fiction

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Finally, there's Robert Sawyer's "Identity Theft." (Yes, it's the Robert Sawyer who wrote *Hominids*.) Sawyer tells the tale of the only detective on Mars – he's trying to solve a murder in a world where people are regularly downloaded into android bodies. How do you solve a murder in a society where victims – and perpetrators – don't have fingerprints or DNA?

Like I said: on the whole, a pretty darn good collection of "hard-boiled" sci-fi stories. It's just unfortunate that *Down These Dark Spaceways* isn't more generally available. (As far as I know, you can only buy it from the Science Fiction Book Club.)



Dead Man on the Moon: A Luna City Special Investigations Novel, by Steven Harper (Phobos Impact, 2006)

Steven Harper has a brand-new novel on the stands. It's not part of his "Silent Empire" series (for which he has received 3 Spectrum Award nominations); rather, *Dead Man on the Moon* has been described as "Sci-Fi meets *CSI*."

Noah Skyler is a young, good Earthside cop who has just won a scholarship to attend prestigious Luna University. However, with the high cost of living on the Moon (you know paying for food, air, stuff like that), Noah is required to hold down two jobs at the same time as being a student. Being a vaudeville performer at a local theater isn't too much of a strain (although it does present a few unexpected problems); but his other job, working as a forensic investigator for Luna City Special Investigations, could end up costing him a lot more — his life! Noah has barely set foot on the Moon when his soon-to-be LCSI supervisor assigns him

Two Book Reviews by Craig Laurance Gidney

L'Amber by Tanith Lee

(a non fantastic book by a fantasy/horror writer)

Jayne, a café worker, falls in love with the ethereal, glamorous Jilaine during a chance meeting. Jayne (known as Jay) is young, lonely, poor, and a closeted lesbian. Jilaine is an artist, a published author, and the daughter of a semi-famous painter. Jay's feelings for Jilaine verge on obsession and lead her to inveigle her way into Jilaine's life. She discovers that all is not as it seems.

Set in London in the early '80s, this brief novel is an acute psychological thriller and character study. It is written like a monologue; and Jay's voice—the self-loathing, the distance she places between herself and people—comes through believably. Jay is the lesbian version of Patricia Highsmith's Ripley—an amoral interloper; and the plot has an interesting Ingmar Bergmanesque twist.

Lee captures the crazy feel of emotional and sexual obsession in this cautionary fable.

Word Made Flesh by Jack O'Connell

Mixing noir crime fiction with existentialist fantasy, Word Made Flesh creates a new genre, heavy on the atmosphere. Set in a decaying New England factory town called Quinsigamond, its follows the adventures of ex-cop/ current cabbie Gilrein, as he gets enmeshed in an insidious plot with rival mob bibliophiles. The town of Quinsigamond is stuck in a time warp, with abandoned art deco buildings, old world crime syndicates, and haunted mansions. A radio station plays a Caribbean torch singer's songs incessantly. The grotesque characters are memorable: a fallen priest who becomes a Kafkaesque detective, obsessed with his Methodology; a blind tattoo artist who can see, even though her eye sockets are empty; an old world refugee who speaks to a doll that might be a golem.

This is not so much a mystery as it is an allegory about the power of stories, madness, and history. The plot swirls with stories-within-stories, while the frame tale is told in present-tense, a crime fiction manner with an understated sense of the absurd. Horrific imagery, violence, and menace prowl through the streets of O'Connell's postmodern, surreal tale. Not for the squeamish. There is a strong, allusive quality to the tale. Fans of David Lynch or the author Paul Auster should give this a try.

Not to know is bad. Not to want to know is worse. Not to hope is unthinkable. Not to care is unforgivable.

to investigate a corpse out on the surface. It appears that someone was shoved out of an airlock without a spacesuit; and, despite the fact that DNA records of *all* Lunar visitors and residents are on file, there seems to be no record of the victim anywhere. And then another body is found! Luna City's normal record of infrequent and non-lethal crimes is being shot to hell; and LCSI is under heavy pressure from the mayor's office to solve the murders and avoid

scaring off some desperately needed investors who are expected to arrive any day now.

I found *Dead Man on the Moon* to be an enjoyable, fast-paced read and a satisfying combination of murder mystery and near-future police procedural. I also think Harper has done a nice, believable job of portraying what life on the Moon could be like. If you like your "SF" mixed with "M," then I think you'll enjoy this novel, too.
