

Conan of the Coffee Table

book review by Carl Cipra

No, that's *not* the title of the latest Conan pastiche; I just couldn't resist using that as the title for this review. After all, that's pretty much what this book is: a big, beautifully-illustrated coffee table book about the mighty Cimmerian. Here's the actual title:

Conan: The Ultimate Guide to the World's Most Savage Barbarian. By Roy Thomas. (DK Publishing, 2006).



And, yes, the author is *that* Roy Thomas: Stan Lee's former assistant editor and eventually the editor-in-chief at Marvel Comics — the guy who acquired the "Conan" property for Marvel and then spent 20 years writing and editing such titles as *Conan the Barbarian*, Savage Tales, The Savage Sword of Conan, King Conan, and Red Sonja.

So, what have we got here? Well, first off, it's BIG! Like I said, it's a coffee table book — 10-by-12 and about three-quarters of an inch thick. And it's beautiful! Every page features eyecatching graphics — almost all of them in full color, some of 'em two-page spreads — by some of the leading Conan illustrators in the business. It includes artwork from Marvel and Dark Horse Comics, including such greats as John Buscema, Gil Kane, and Barry Windsor-Smith. And there are works by some of my favorite Conan cover-artists and illustrators: Frank Frazetta, Gary Gianni,

Ken Kelly, and Alex Ross. Wow! (Surprisingly, though, nothing from another of my favorites, Joe Jusko.) Lots of really beautiful maps, too.

As for the non-graphics content — well, it's pretty darn complete. Virtually every aspect of the Cimmerian's legendary career is captured here, from the short stories and novels (primarily those written by old REH himself) to the Marvel/Dark Horse comics/graphic novels. (I think it's kind'a hard to be "The Ultimate Guide," however, when you consider that Dark Horse is still churning out new issues every month.) In fact, about the only aspects of "the Conan legend" not included in this book are the Cimmerian's adventures as shown on the Silver Screen (Conan the Barbarian, Conan the Destroyer, Red Sonja) and the small screen (the not-very-good 1998 TV series Conan: The Adventurer, featuring Ralf Moeller as Conan). Nope, "Ah-nold" makes no appearance in these pages — and neither does "Thulsa Doom" (who was actually a character in Howard's "Kull of Valusia" stories, not his "Conan" stories).

As you might imagine, this book probably isn't going to make "Conan purists" very happy — it doesn't restrict its content to the "canonical" (or should that be "Conanical"?) REH works. There are lots and lots of storylines and characters from the various Conan comics and graphic novels in here. And I'm not so sure that Thomas has rigorously kept the promise he makes in the Prologue (page 8): "We have tried, in these pages, to make it clear when we are dealing with episodes or entities whose truth is not vouched for by the writings of Robert E. Howard himself."

That cavil aside, this is still quite an impressive book. As well as all the information about the Cimmerian's various swords-and-sorcery adventures, there's lots of information about the lands and peoples of the Hyborian Age.

By Metro: Take the Red Line to the Wheaton Metro Stop. After ascending the longest escalator in the Hemisphere, walk towards the Kiss'n''Ride to your right (to the East). 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Thomas has even included some of Howard's information about pre-Hyborian and "post-Conan" Hyborian times.

As with any coffee table book, this one comes with a hefty price tag: \$24.99 USA (\$32.99 Canada). However, be of good cheer: I've seen it on "new books" tables in at least a couple of Borders bookstores with a "20% Off" sticker on it — in company with a couple of other new DK publications: *The DC Comics Encyclopedia* and *Batman: The Ultimate Guide to the Dark Knight*.

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Conan, by Neal Adams

John M. Ford 1957 - 2006

Yet another award-winning F&SF author died on September 25th. John M. Ford was the author of novels, short stories, poems, articles, and game reviews. And he was famous (notorious?) for his "Ask Dr. Mike" lectures at various conventions (Minicons, Reinconation 5, Noreascon 4, etc.), where the audience asked various scientific questions and Ford (wearing a lab coat) provided spontaneous humorous answers.

Ford's first short story, "This, Too, We Reconcile", appeared in *Analog* (May 1976) when he was 18. His first novel (*Web of Angels*) was published by Tor when he was 23. His third book (*The Dragon Waiting: A Masque of History*) won the 1984 World Fantasy Award for best novel when he was 27. [Ed. Note: The Dragon Waiting is one of my favorite books!] A few years later, he won

the World Fantasy Award again for a poem ("Winter Solstice, Camelot Station"). His novel *Growing Up Weightless* won the Philip K. Dick Award in 1993. His articles, reviews, stories, and poems were published in *Omni*, *Analog*, *Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine*, *Amazing*, and various anthologies (including most of the *Liavek* anthologies). He wrote science fiction, fantasy, horror, and espionage thrillers equally well. He even wrote two *Star Trek* novels: *The Final Reflection* (1984) and *How Much for Just the Planet?* (1987).

Ford was born in East Chicago, Indiana, and raised in Whiting, Indiana. In the mid-1970s he attended Indiana University Bloomington, where he was active in the IU science fiction club and the Society for Creative Anachronism (using the name Miles Atherton de Grey). He suffered from complications related to diabetes since childhood and also had renal dysfunction which required dialysis and, in 2000, a kidney transplant. He was found dead from natural causes in his Minneapolis home on September 25.

Ford was a prominent member of the Friends of the Minneapolis Public Library, which established a John M. Ford Book Endowment after his death. Donations are used as interest-generating capital for the yearly purchase of new books.

Ford was much respected by his fellow writers, editors, critics, and fans. $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$

Jack Williamson 1908 - 2006

Another one of the Great Old Ones in the F&SF field passed away on November 10th at the age of 98.

Jack Williamson's first SF short story was published in 1928, a year after Charles Lindbergh made his historic solo flight from New York to Paris. Williamson was one of the longest-active writers in the F&SF field. He was 20 years old when "The Metal Man" appears in *Amazing Stories* — and his writing career continued on into the 21st Century. His last novel, *The Stonehenge Gate*, was published by Tor Books in 2005.

Ray Bradbury described Jack Williamson as "one of the great science fiction writers... he became my best friend and teacher." Arthur C. Clarke said: "I have no hesitation in placing Jack Williamson on a plane with two other American giants, Isaac Asimov and Robert Heinlein." Sam Moskowitz (author of the 1961 Seekers of Tomorrow: Masters of Modern Science Fiction) wrote that Williamson was "an author who pioneered superior characterization in a field almost

barren of it, realism in the presentation of human motivation previously unknown, scientific rationalization of supernatural concepts for story purposes, and exploitation of the untapped story potentials of antimatter."

Williamson himself believed that "science is the door to the future and science fiction is the golden key." He wrote more than 50 novels, including *The Humanoids* (1949, one of his best-known works), *Darker Than You Think*, and *Legion of Time*. He collaborated with Fred Pohl on nearly a dozen SF novels, including *Undersea Quest*, *Starchild*, and *Farthest Star*.

Williamson received a Grand Master Award in 1976 for lifetime achievement from the Science Fiction Writers of America. He also received a World Fantasy Award for life achievement from the World Fantasy Convention in 1994. In 1998, Williamson received the Bram Stoker Award for superior achievement from the Horror Writers Association. In 2001, his novella *The Ultimate Earth* won both the Hugo and Nebula Awards.

Williamson credited hard work and constant inquiry with helping him remain current as an award-winning science-fiction writer. "I have a vast curiosity about our universe, our origins and its probable future," the then 95-year-old Williamson (who subscribed to numerous science journals, magazines, and newspapers) told the *Albuquerque Journal* in 2004.

All this from a man born on April 29, 1908, in Bisbee, Arizona, when the state was still a territory. And when his family moved to eastern New Mexico in 1915, they did it in a covered wagon. "We lived on isolated farms and ranches, far from anybody, and when I was young I knew very few other kids; so I lived to a great extent in my imagination," Williamson told *Publishers Weekly* in 1986. "Life would have been absolutely

empty without imagination." He was home-schooled until he was 12 years old. Reading an early copy of *Amazing Stories* magazine was a turning point for the teen-aged Williamson. "Here were spacecraft taking off from other worlds, travel in time and all sorts of wonderful inventions!" Williamson recalled. He spent a year writing short science-fiction stories, composing them in his head as he worked on the family farm, then typing them on an antique Remington type-writer borrowed from an uncle.

Williamson received \$25 for "The Metal Men," which was featured on the cover of the December 1928 issue of *Amazing Stories*. Thirteen of his first 21 stories (published between 1928 and 1932) were illustrated on various pulp magazine covers.

During World War II, Williamson served as an Army Air Forces weatherman and rose to the rank of staff sergeant. He served the final three months of the war in the Pacific. In 1947, Williamson's first book, a reprint of his early serial *The Legion of Space*, was published by Fantasy Press. It earned him \$750 and helped persuade him to return to full-time writing.

Williamson's 1984 autobiography, Wonder's Child: My Life in Science Fiction, won a Hugo Award for best nonfiction book. "I've never written bestsellers or made a great deal of money at it, but when I look back, I've been able to spend most of my life doing something I enjoyed," Williamson said in an interview in a 1999 issue of Interzone. "It's an exciting time to be alive. I wish I could live another century."
