
Torchwood (and Sarah Jane Smith Adventures) Parties announced by Peter Knapp



For those that don't know, the Doctor Who revival in 2005 has been a phenomenal hit in the UK - 28 episodes have been shown, with 13 more to premiere (in the UK) in April. Two spinoff shows have been commissioned. Now that the first spinoff, Torchwood, has finished its run in the UK, and the pilot for the second spinoff, The Sarah Jane Smith Adventures, has also aired, I thought it'd be fun to see them again with a group. So, I've planned four afternoons of Torchwood viewing (with The Sarah Jane Smith Adventures tacked on to the last set of Torchwood showings) at Rob's and my place.

The parties will be held on Saturday afternoons every four weeks between February 3 and April 28. Business:

There was general discussion about promoting Gaylaxicon 2008 at various cons starting later this year, perhaps with the 2007 CapClave. **Social:**

The Illustrated Man (1969, based on Ray Bradbury's book) is now out on DVD.

Del Toro's *Pan's Labyrinth* was given top reviews by a number of LSFers – "brilliant, stunning." Definitely *not* a children's movie, however.

Lord of the Rings trilogy director Peter Jackson is involved in an ongoing feud regarding an audit of expenses for the *Fellowship of the Rings* movie.

Ghost Rider (Sony Pictures), starring Nicholas Cage, opens in February. Will this totally bomb at the box office? Critically-acclaimed Children of Men is now in wide release. The Golden Compass movie, based upon the Phillip Pullman novel, is due out in November. Filming for Indian Jones IV has begun. (Yes, it will star Harrison Ford.) J.J. John Michael Strazinski, better known as JMS, is creating straight-to-DVD *Balylon 5* movies, using characters whose actors are still alive.

My Hugo Nominations for 2006

As many of you know, I'm a media fan. I nominate dramatic presentations for Hugos every year that I'm eligible to nominate them. As I attended last year's Worldcon, I just got my ballot in the mail for the 2006 Hugos.

Without further ado, here are my nominations, in the order that I would vote for them if they make the final ballot.

Dramatic Presentation, Long Form:

Pan's Labyrinth V for Vendetta Nightwatch The Lost Room (Miniseries) X-Men 3



Pan's Labyrinth was probably the best movie I saw in 2006. Mexican director Guillermo del Toro tells the tale of a young girl named Ofelia who deals with monsters from both her imagination and from real life. Set during the end of the civil war in Spain, she escapes to an imaginary world that while horrific, is a far cry from the life she faces with her new evil stepfather. Del Toro does a masterful job of weaving two very different worlds together and makes them believable. While watching the movie, I wanted Ofelia to prevail through the impossible situations presented to her by both worlds. Professional critics often don't "get" genre movies. This movie is an exception. As of this writing,

it's already won the best picture award from The National Society of Film Critics. I wouldn't be surprised if it wins an Oscar.



V for Vendetta is based on the graphic novel of the same name by Allan Moore and David Lloyd. The screenplay is by The Wachowski Brothers and made by their studio. (They did The Matrix.) Unlike Pan's Labyrinth, which mixed reality with speculative fiction, V for Vendetta takes place wholly in the genre camp. In a near-future fascist state, a freedom fighter known only as "V" tries to bring down the government. He befriends a young woman who, by the end of the movie, helps him incite a revolution. Unlike so many Hollywood adaptions of source material that sanitizes gay content, this movies keeps it all in and I think might actually add to it. I really appreciated the decision to keep the gay content in the movie. The Wachowski Brothers did a fine job of crafting a an interesting, thoughtprovoking movie with great action sequences, like they did in The Matrix.



I saw a sneak preview for *Nightwatch* in 2005. Early in the showing, a section of the movie didn't make a lot of sense. I asked Rob if the

movie was supposed to be like that. Just then, the projectionist stopped the movie, as the reel of film had been loaded in backwards and upside down. It took almost half and hour to unwind the film and rewind it correctly on a new reel. Almost no one left the theater while waiting for the movie to restart. It was that engaging. Taking place in modern Russia, the forces of light have an uneasy truce with the forces of dark. When one side is going to use their powers, they have to get a license from the other side. Early in the movie, the rules are broken, which starts a chain reaction of chaos and horror. I really had to pay attention, as the story was very convoluted and it was not often clear who was a good guy and who was a bad guy. It kept my attention the whole time. When released in Russia, it quickly became the most successful Russian movie ever. Too bad the American distributor botched the American release of the movie with next to no publicity.



In December, the Sci Fi Channel premiered their big miniseries of the year, The Lost Room. With investigating a homicide, a cop named Joe Miller discovers a secret segment of society who desperately are trying to find magical objects that originally came from a mysterious motel room. While objects are not haunted, people who come in possession of the objects often go crazy or get killed by other people trying to collect the objects. The investigation gets personal when Miller's daughter disappears in the room. It took a while to dawn on me, but this miniseries was about quantum physics and what happens when people come into possession of objects that open portals to other realities. Cerebral stuff couched in a slightly film noir mystery. I hope The Lost Room comes back as a series.

X-Men 3 was a fun movie, but I don't think it had heart of the previous two installments of the franchise. Was this because Brian Singer, who directed the first two X-Men movies, left the franchise? Maybe. I did enjoy the movie though. I found it a good summer popcorn movie. Fun but fluffy.

Dramatic Presentation, Short Form:

Doctor Who - "Army of Ghosts"/ Doomsday" Doctor Who - "The Impossible Planet"/ The Satan Pit" Doctor Who - "School Reunion" Doctor Who - "The Girl in the Fireplace" Doctor Who - "Rise of the Cybermen"/ The Age of Steel"



What can I say? I can't get enough of *Doctor Who*. There were really good science fiction shows on TV last year. *Battlestar Galactica* and *Heros* come to mind. Even not-so-good shows like *Stargate: SG-1* had stand-out episodes such as "200." I just happen to like *Doctor Who* better.

For the uninitiated, *Doctor Who* is the longest running genre show on the planet. It centers on a alien named the Doctor, who travels the universe in a

time-and-space machine exterminating evil and championing the causes of the less fortunate and down-trodden. He almost always has a companion with him, usually female and human. *Doctor Who* is to the UK what *Star Trek* is to the US. The current version of the series is the brainchild of Russell T. Davies, the openly gay created of the original (British) *Queer as Folk*. In the current incarnation of the show, Russell has focused the show on the relationship between the Doctor and his companions and between the time travelers and the people left behind.

The two-part season finale showcased the meeting between two of the Doctor's greatest foes, the Daleks and the Cybermen. Both want to take over Earth and exterminate or delete the human race. To complicate matters, a rift between our Earth and another Earth opens, threatening both worlds. While the adventure was great, the part that ripped my heart out was the forced departure of the Doctor's companion, Rose, who had traveled with him for two years. I cried during the last few scenes.

"The Impossible Planet"/"The Satan Pit," another two-parter, was basically the story of Alien, set in the Doctor Who universe. While made almost entirely within studio sets (the exception being the pit which was filmed at a rock quarry), I was able to suspend my disbelief and thrill to the Doctor and company trying to survive many hazards in a claustrophobic set based on a planet revolving around a black hole.

While the new version of Doctor Who tries very hard to stand on it's own, every once in a while elements from the original show are brought back. Two favorite companions from the midto-late 1970's, Sarah Jane Smith and K-9, guest star in "School Reunion." While the nemesis of the week was fun to watch, the strength of the episode lay in relationships between the Doctor and his companions past and present. The episode explores one of the curses of immorality. We find out why the Doctor always leaves his companions behind. While they grow old and die, he doesn't. He finds it unbearable to watch the people he loves fade away. While I didn't cry during this episode, I did get teary-eyed.

"The Girl in the Fireplace" was probably the best episode of the season. Again, it revolves around relationships, this time a love story between the Doctor and Madame De Pompadour, mistress of Louis XV, King of France. One did not have to be a fan of *Doctor Who* and be knowledgeable in the mythos of the show to enjoy this episode.

The third two-parter in my list of favorite episodes, "Rise of the Cybermen"/"The Age of Steel," brings back the Cybermen from the classic series. Since the Cybermen are my favorite *Doctor Who* baddies of all time, I had to like the episode, even if it recycled previous *Doctor Who* stories. It also introduced Ricky, an alternate universe version of Mikey, Rose's boyfriend. In the alternate universe, Ricky has a boyfriend named Jake!

When I talked to Rob and what I was going to nominate, I pointed out that two of the movies I wanted to Pan's Labyrinth and nominate – Nightwatch - were foreign language films with subtitles. He pointed out the all of the TV shows I nominated were also foreign. While the US can and does make good stuff, I'm hoping that last year's foreign movies are an indication that we'll be seeing more excellent movies that are not a product of the Hollywood system, that tends to turn out safe, comfort movies. We'll see in September if any of my picks win Hugos!
