There might be a direct-tovideo Serenity II movie. $\Lambda \Psi \Phi$



Gaylaxicon 2007 Review

When I told my coworkers that I was going to Gaylaxicon, they looked at me funny. For those not familiar with fan-run conventions, many people who go to them "have a life." They don't live in their mother's basement and don't know the names to every episode of every incarnation of *Star Trek*. The primary reason they go is to have fun and socialize, which is exactly what I did.

I see many people through the SF convention circuit that I only see once or twice a year at conventions. This year's Gaylaxicon was no exception. I reunited with people from all over the North American continent, from as far away as California and Canada. Of course, I also saw people from LSF whom I almost never see in DC! Hanging out with friends and getting cuddly with some of them was a lot of fun. My only complaint is that much of the cuddling happened late at night when I was really tired and had to go to bed and get enough sleep - yes it's recommended that one get sleep at conventions - to be coherent at the next morning's panels. Next year I want an afternoon tea that will facilitate midday cuddling!;)

Speaking of panels, I really enjoyed the media portion of the programming. I volunteered to be a panelist on three *Doctor Who*-related panels. They were all a lot of fun, especially the 10:30 AM "Anything That Moves: *Torchwood* and Captain Jack Harkness" panel. At 10:30 AM on a Sunday morning, I didn't think anyone would show either as a panelist or in the audience. a remembrance by Mike Cornett

Richard Valley, pioneering editor of the gay-slanted genre magazine *Scarlet Street*, died at about noon on Friday, October 12th, at the age of 58. He had cancer.

For over 15 years, *Scarlet Street*, which covered the mystery and horror genres (with occasional forays into sci-fi, fantasy, and superheroes), angered a few but pleased many more with its frank discussions of gay subtext in many classic genre films.

Richard Valley and Scarlet Street were pioneers in gay fandom, openly discussing GLBT content in films ranging from What's the Matter with Helen? and Bride of Frankenstein to Horrors of the Black Museum and How to Make a Monster, at a time when many prominent critics and scholars of the horror genre overlooked or even denied such content.

Valley was a playwright for many years, with comedies like *Play by Play* and *A Piece of Cake* on his résumé. He had recorded audio commentaries for several DVD editions of the Basil Rathbone/Sherlock Holmes films; and,

with friend actor/composer/music producer Bruce Kimmel, he had produced a CD, Jeepers Creepers! Great Songs from Horror Films, that featured Broadway and cabaret performers singing songs from films like The Blob, The Uninvited, and Whatever Happened to Baby Jane?

Scarlet Street had temporarily halted publication while Richard dealt with his illness. Another issue was in the planning stages at the time of his death. Many of Valley's friends and associates are hoping to continue the magazine in the future.

Valley had been a guest at a previous Gaylaxicon (and was hoping to appear at our next one) and for a long time had been a fixture at various horrororiented conventions on the East Coast. Age slowed him down somewhat, but he was always a guest at Monster Bash in Pittsburgh, which also served as a gathering/reunion for friends and fans who knew each other from the message boards at the *Scarlet Street* website.

Richard Valley and I had been good friends for many years. He and I had our differences...he liked Universal, I liked Hammer; he thought Orlando Bloom was sexy, I preferred Karl Urban; he hated MST3K, I loved it; and we both detested Baz Luhrmann's Moulin Rouge! with a passion...but in the end our friendship was solid and strong. He gave me my first writing assignment, an interview with Val Lewton, Jr.; and although it was never used, it got me started doing DVD reviews elsewhere. It was through him that I made many new friends who are now part of my extended family. He was a unique, intelligent, witty voice in fandom, and not merely a loss to me personally, but to many of his friends around the world.

Richard is survived by his mother and his partner of 26 years, Tom Amorosi.

At Gaylaxicon 2007, I got a chance to see *Socket*, a gay horror film that reminded me a lot of a David Cronenberg film. It deals with a surgeon, Bill Matthews, who is hit by lightning. While recovering, he meets a hunky intern, Craig Murphy, who likewise has been hit by lightning. Craig introduces Bill to a group of people addicted to electricity and uses the group to help him struggle with his own addiction. As with many addictions, things don't go well.

I try very hard to look past amateur elements of independent movies that make the gay film festival circuit. When there are too many, though, it's difficult to enjoy the movie. Luckily, *Socket* rises above the usual fare. For the most part, it is well acted, scripted, and shot. The movie kept me interested and engaged for an hour and a half. I recommend it highly.

By the way, I usually don't get queasy watching movies, but I had to leave this movie for a few minutes during a sequence when Bill tests a way of juicing more organically than plugging a fork into an electrical outlet. The scene was not gory or violent, but highly disturbing, as it showed him sinking to a new low with his addiction. It was like watching a train wreck, and not in a good way.

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appeared on stage with Gerrold, who showed the audience a rough cut of the love scene between the two characters. Afterwards the three had a Q&A session with the audience. Rice admitted that Fowler had soft lips and good breath, a very diplomatic response about what it was like as a heterosexual kissing a gay man. (Later on in the weekend I found out – though not based on personal experience – that Fowler is a good kisser.)

Another fan-produced *Star Trek* series, *Star Trek*: *Odyssey* (www.hiddenfrontier.org) also had a presence at the con. Because of a *Doctor Who* panel I was on, I missed most of the first episode of *Odyssey*. The captain of the *Odyssey*, a gay Bajoran played by Bobby Rice, is on a long journey (think Homer's *Odyssey*) to get home. He doesn't know if his husband is still alive and waiting for him.

I have to admit I haven't been a big fan of the fan-produced *Star Trek*. Early episodes of *Star Trek*; *Hidden Frontier* (*Odyssey* is the sequel show) were awful. But a lot has happened in seven years. The pieces of the *New Voyage* and *Odyssey* episodes I saw engaged me enough to want to download full episodes of all the various fan *Trek* shows (http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Star_Trek_fan_productions) and give them a try.

The weekend went by very quickly due to all the people to hang out with, things to do, and sleep to catch up on. I wish the convention had been longer. On a side note, Brian and I went Georgia Aquarium the (www.georgiaaquarium.org) Friday afternoon. It's touted as "The World's Largest and Most Engaging Aquarium." While I could argue that I've been more engaged by other aquariums (the Boston and Baltimore aquariums come to mind), I enjoyed the Atlanta aquarium a lot. I recommend it highly.

If you haven't made plans to attend next year's Gaylaxicon (www.gaylaxicon2008.org) in Bethesda, MD over Columbus Day weekend (October 10-13, 2008), I highly recommend that you do. Gaylaxicons are a lot fun in general, and the people planning next year's con (myself included) intend to make it a memorable one!



A Blast from the Past

Amerika a novel by Brauna E. Pouns from a screenplay by Donald Wrye (Pocket Books, 1987)

Serendipity strikes again!

As you know, I've been traveling a lot lately. Well, one weekend during my 3-week sojourn in Kansas City, I dropped into a Salvation Army store while waiting for my clothes to dry at a laundromat; and, of course, I quickly hunted down the used books section of the store. Lo and behold! - I ran across a genuine "lost treasure." It's the novelization of a 12-hour ABC mini-series: Amerika (which featured the talents of Kris Kristofferson, Robert Urich, Sam Neill, Mariel Hemingway, Christine Lahti, and a host of others). I quite enjoyed the 1987 mini-series; and, needless to say, I picked up the paperback without a moment's hesitation. Oh-boy-oh-boyoh-boy!

The premise of the story is that the United States has been taken over by the Soviet Union, and the Soviets intend to prevent the reassertion of their rival superpower by balkanizing it into a number of loosely confederated, independent nations. Quite a fascinating premise, considering the actual turn of events! I don't seem to remember the mini-series ever really explaining how the Soviets pulled it off. The "Prologue" of the novelization, however, explains it quite handily: they detonated four gigantic nuclear weapons in the stratosphere above the U.S. and took out the highly-sophisticated American defense and communication systems with a vast electromagnetic pulse (EMP). The U.S. President was given a choice: surrender (and unilaterally disarm) or face certain annihilation. Then Soviet Bloc forces (thinly disguised as UN peacekeepers) moved in to "restore order." Pretty nifty, says I. The Soviet motivation? They realized that the U.S.-led arms race was bankrupting the Soviet Union, and unrest and uprisings had begun to pop up here and there within the Soviet bloc



- so the boys in the Kremlin decided to take out their American rivals in one bold stroke and to utilize America's agricultural/industrial resources to bolster the Soviet regime.

But what about American resistance? Yes, there was some – mainly in mountainous regions in the West and in Alaska. But, as for the rest... "[The Soviets] were offering peace. It was a sort of peace that the great majority of Americans—all those who wanted nothing more from their time on earth than to preserve some fraction of the security and comfort they'd known before—accepted with appalling ease." Also, sadly possible: a population whose will-to-resist had already been enervated by its own government, now led by collaborators and quislings.

As the story opens, almost a decade later, the Soviets want to pull their occupation forces out of America – they're needed to bolster an increasingly shaky Soviet dominion within their own lands – and they can't afford to allow a revived American superpower to rebuild itself after they leave. Hence, they plan to eliminate the puppet U.S. Federal Government and set up smaller regional "nations" that will never reunite. The first to secede will be the agricultural Midwest – to be renamed "Heartland" – with its capital at Omaha.

And thus the stage is set. Three men symbolize the novel's ten-

sions. (1) Peter Bradford, a former county commissioner, is to become the Governor General of Heartland; he believes that this will be the first step in getting Soviet "advisors" out of North America - and, eventually, lead (at some unspecified future date) to the reunification of the United States. (2) Devin Milford has just been released from a long stint in a Texas political detention camp and sent back to his Nebraska home as an "internal exile." He ran an unsuccessful independent campaign for the presidency in 1992 (in opposition to the Soviet-backed candidates) and was supposedly "hospitalized after a nervous breakdown." Milford is weakened by his experiences in the detention camp but he remains a true patriot at heart – he quickly becomes the unwilling focus of anti-Soviet sentiments. (3) KGB Colonel Andrei Denisov is second-in-command of the Soviet occupation forces; he has developed a grudging respect for the American people and their former goals. He also knows a horrendous secret: hard-liners have gained the upper hand in the Kremlin, and they will not allow the U.S.A. to rise again. If the balkanization of America is not achieved - and soon the planned withdrawal of Eastern Bloc forces will immediately be followed by the nuclear devastation of most major American cities. All the pieces are in place; tensions are high; and the game begins!

What was originally designed to be a dystopian warning has become a fascinating study in alternate history. I quite enjoyed the original TV miniseries; and, yes, I quite enjoyed reading the novelization. *Amerika* – a blast from the past; and an enjoyable read.
