



Charlton Heston 1923 - 2008

Charlton Heston died on April 5th. Whether or not you agreed with his politics or his stance on gun control, he was definitely one of the great ones in Hollywood history.

Heston was primarily noted for his role in the such cinema spectaculars as *Ben-Hur*, *The Agony and the Ecstacy*, *El Cid*, *The Ten Commandments*, *55 Days in Peking*, and *Khartoum*. He won the Academy Award for Best Actor in 1959 for his title role in *Ben-Hur*.

He earned star billing from his first Hollywood movie, *Dark City* (a 1950 film noir). Cecil B. DeMille next cast him as the circus manager in the all-star *The Greatest Show On Earth*, named by the Motion Picture Academy as the best picture of 1952.

With his strong presence and sonorous voice, Heston was the ideal star during the period when Hollywood was filling movie screens with panoramas depicting the religious and historical past. He liked to cite the number of historical figures he had portrayed: Andrew Jackson (The President's Lady, and The Buccaneer), Moses (The Ten Commandments), El Cid (from the film of the same name), John the Baptist (The Greatest Story Ever Told), Michelangelo (The Agony and the Ecstasy), General Gordon (Khartoum), Marc Antony (Julius Caesar, and Antony and Cleopatra), Cardinal Richelieu (The Three Musketeers), and Henry VIII (The Prince and the Pauper).

Heston served as president of the Screen Actors Guild and chairman of the American Film Institute; and he marched in the civil rights movement of the 1950s. With age, he grew more conservative and campaigned for conservative candidates. In June 1998,

Heston was elected president of the National Rifle Association, the organization for which he had posed for ads holding a rifle; and he held that position until 2003. In 2002, Heston revealed that he had symptoms consistent with Alzheimer's disease.

And, lest we forget, Charlton Heston had a long history of roles in F&SF films and TV:

1958 - Shirley Temple's Storybook (television), as the Beast in "Beauty and the Beast"

1968 - Planet of the Apes, as Taylor

1970 - Beneath the Planet of the Apes, once again as Taylor

1971 - *The Omega Man* (based on the Richard Matheson story *I Am Legend*), as "the last man"

1973 - Soylent Green (based on Harry Harrison's Make Room, Make Room), as Detective Thorn

1994 - *Seaquest DSV* (television), as the title character in the episode "Abalon"

1995 - *In the Mouth of Madness*, as Jackson Harlow

2000 - The New Outer Limits (television), as Chief Justice Wainright in "Final Appeal"

2001 - *Planet of the Apes*, as Zaius (uncredited)

2001 - *Cats & Dogs*, the voice of "the Mastiff"




Evil Henchmen Guide

How to Merchandise Your Own Image

Years after retirement, many superheroes are able to generate considerable interest and financial rewards by exploiting their merchandising appeal.

Children and certain adults love to play with action figures, and collect memorabilia associated with them. Licensed products make up over one-third of the toy industry, and the market share just keeps on growing. Superhero spin-offs and products are dominant players in this area, and a canny silver-haired super can get a piece of this action and cash in on a big earner. Learning to fly was easy; knowing how to fly off store shelves is a bigger challenge.

...you've got to associate yourself with a large reproducible object, so that whoever buys your action figure will feel compelled to have the shark tank, siege tower, supermobile, or secret lair that is an inseparable part of your identity. If you live on an island or an elaborate space station you've hit the jackpot: that's five pounds of plastic and six months worth of pocket money right there.

Above all you've got to be keyed into the compelling lifestyle choices that you represent. What is it about you (and them) which makes them want to be you? How do you tap into their wants, needs, and desires? How do you achieve that delicate balance of ensuring that supply is woefully insufficient to meet demand? Don't give them what they don't really want, and they'll be lining up around the block to have what they can't get.

Two Alternate History Collections

Serendipity rides again! Mike Resnick and Harry Turtledove are two of my favorite authors. I own (literally) piles of books by each of them. And – wha'd'ya know? – this year both of them have had collections of "alternate history" short fiction published! Almost simultaneous publication of two volumes of one of my favorite F&SF subgenres, one from each of two of my favorite authors! Somebody pinch me; I must be dreaming!




The Other Teddy Roosevelts by Mike Resnick (Subterranean Press, 2008)

Mike Resnick has long been fascinated with Theodore; and for almost 20 years, he's been writing "alternate history" stories about our 26th President. (Most of these stories first appeared in Asimov's.) Now, for the first time, all of Resnick's "alternate TR" stories have been collected in *The Other Teddy Roosevelts*. And what a collection it is!

Most of the stories are straight-forward "alternate history" tales, where plausible "what if" situations are based on TR's actual life. For example, there's "Bully!" – where, in 1910, TR (ex-President, now a Great White Hunter) accepts the challenge of his ivory-hunting guide to oust the Belgians from the Congo and set up a native democracy. (Things don't go as well as TR hoped they would.) And there's "Over

There" - where, in 1917, TR persuades President Woodrow Wilson to allow him to re-form the Rough Riders and take them to Europe during WWI. (And TR learns the horrors of a whole new kind of warfare.) Perhaps the most poignant and powerful piece, however, is "The Light that Blinds, The Claws that Catch." In this story, Alice Roosevelt, TR's sickly first wife, did not die in 1884; and TR spends the rest of his life foregoing all the challenges and adventures of his "real" life in order to care for the woman he loved and adored above all others. (His devotion to Alice, when juxtaposed with his "might have been" visions and dreams, is really rather moving.)




And then there are those other three stories! They're out-and-out F&SF romps! In "Redchapel," TR visits London in 1888 and helps to track down Jack the Ripper. (Actually, Resnick had his own theories about the Ripper's identity; and he figured the only way he'd get anyone to listen to him was to write a story about it.) "Two Hunters in Manhattan" takes place in NYC in 1897, during TR's stint as Police Commissioner (1895 - 1897); TR makes a rather unique deal with a vampire-kingpin ("Big D") and eventually has to figure a way to put the bloodsucker down. And for you H.G. Wells fans, there's "The Roosevelt Dispatches"-it's 1898, and Rough Rider TR runs across a Cuban infestation of Wells's Martian invaders.

All the stories in this slim volume are an absolute joy! And it's really nice to have *all* Resnick's "alternate TR" stories gathered into one place, too!

Opening Atlantis **by Harry Turtledove** (ROC/Penguin, 2008)

When I saw this book, I mistakenly thought it to be a collection containing some favorite Turtledove stories I'd already read. (Two of his "Atlantis" stories appeared in *Analog* a few years ago; and I think I even wrote reviews for the LSF newsletter.) But – nay, nay, nay – seems as how *Opening Atlantis* has all *new* content. (Ah, but never, fear... According to the Uchronia website, Turtledove's two earlier stories – "Audubon in Atlantis" and "The Scarlet Band" – will appear in the *next* volume, *The United States of Atlantis*.)

The "timeline divergence" for Turtledove's "Atlantis" stories is rather unique for the alternate history subgenre. Rather than basing this timeline on alternate military victories (such as "what if the South had won the Civil War"), the "Atlantis" stories are an example of that most rare of alternate

history premises: "geological alternate history" (for lack of a better term).* In this case, tens-of-millions of years ago, much of eastern North America (east of the Mississippi and south of the St. Lawrence) split off as a separate island continent – and continental drift (or whatever) moved it about halfway out into the Atlantic.

The ecology of Atlantis (the name given the continent by its discoverers) is, thus, rather different from anywhere else on Earth. (Think of other isolated island ecologies - say Australia or the Galapagos Islands, or even South America before the Central American connection was established.) The plant life includes lots of conifers (even giant redwoods) and cycads, but no grasses. There are no native mammals – just lots and lots of birds, including several species of giant flightless "honkers" (think of geese of steroids - big, stupid geese) and giant flying predatory eagles. There are also lots of reptiles, including huge alligators (in the warmer southern areas, of course). But there aren't any human inhabitants – the "copper-skins" never traveled over from "Terranova" (the North American mainland).

Opening Atlantis tells the story of the discovery and colonization of Atlantis by Western Europeans. But it wasn't an Italian adventurer in the pay of Their Catholic Majesties who discovers Atlantis. It's discovered by Basque codfishermen in the early 1450s, during their mid-Atlantic forays in search of their finny prey; and the Basques are soon joined by their English and Breton friends and competitors.

The book is composed of three "parts" (novellas? novelettes?), which follow the settlement of Atlantis through the adventures of various members of a single English family, the Radcliffes. "New Hastings" tells how cod-fisherman Edward Radcliffe learns about Atlantis from some Basques. As the story pro-

gresses, he eventually brings his family and friends from Hastings across the sea to settle in the new land and escape the inequities and tumult of England during the Wars of the Roses. "Avalon" takes place in the 1600s, with Radcliffes (and Radcliffs) living on both the eastern and western coasts of Atlantis. Avalon (on the west coast) is a notorious pirate base (an analog for Tortuga or Barataria); and it's the home port of Red Rodney Radcliffe, scourge of both the Atlantic Ocean and the Hesperian Gulf (between Atlantis and mainland Terranova). This is also the story of William Radcliff, a wealthy merchant of the town of Stuart (on the east coast), who leads an expedition to cleanse Atlantis of this "wretched hive of scum and villainy" (to use a phrase from Star Wars) and rid the seas of his distant cousin, Red Rodney. The last story, "Nouveau Redon," takes place in the mid-1700s. It's pretty much a re-telling (in Atlantean terms) of the French and Indian War from our timeline (1753 - 1764). And now it's Victor Radcliff who leads his green-coated Atlantean contingent alongside the British redcoats in defense of English Atlantis.

As with all good alternate history stories, *Opening Atlantis* gives its readers a fresh new perspective on "our history" – in this case, the settlement of the New World by English (and other) colonists and the development of a distinctive "Atlantean" society. Turtledove also has a lot to say about the *ecological* effects of Atlantean colonization and the hideous nature of slavery – and he does all this in a series of rollicking, entertaining adventures. I'm quite looking forward to the next two volumes in this series.

^{*} In fact, I can only think of two other instances of alternate history stories based on "geologic divergences" – both from the mid-to-late 1980s. There's Harry Harrison's "Eden Trilogy" (West of Eden, Winter in Eden, Return to Eden), in which the Cretaceous-Tertiary dinosaur extinction never occurred. Intelligent dinosaurs evolved, with humans evolving in an isolated North America. And there's another series of short stories by Harry Turtledove (later collected into a single volume, A Different Flesh), in which European explorers discovered a North American continent inhabited by Pithecanthropus erectus rather than by Amerindian humans.
