Fall of Kings, published in 2007, under the joint authorship of David and Stella Gemmell. (Stella Gemmell completed the book after her husband David died while writing the book.)

Rob thought that Robert Downey Jr. was perfect for the role of Tony Stark in the film *Iron Man*.

Peter listed the tentative start dates for upcoming genre films: Narnia: Prince Caspian, Indiana Jones and the Kingdom of the Crystal Skull, Get Smart, Wall-E, Incredible Hulk, Hellboy II, Dark Knight, X Files: I Want to Believe, Mummy III, animated Star Wars: Clone Wars, Quantum of Solace (a James Bond film), Madagascar II, the next "Harry Potter" film, The Day the Earth Stood Still (with Keanu Reeves—say it ain't so!). (Does Sex and the City count as genre?)

Carl expressed concern about Del Toro doing the two Hobbit movies. Will they be too dark? And will he get around to doing a Cthulhu film?

One attendee who watched *Speed Racer* (the animated TV series) as a child had mixed feelings about the current *Speed Racer* movie.

Both Laurel K. Hamilton and Lynn Flewelling have new novels coming out soon.

It was noted that A&E will be showing a remake of Michael Crichton's *Andromeda Strain*. The two-night TV movie will open up on Memorial Day

weekend.

Peter blurted out a spoiler on the season finale for *Torchwood* – two of the *Torchwood* members get killed off. Over at *Doctor Who*, the latest companion, played by Katherine Tate, is refreshing because she is not pining for the Doctor.

The previews for M. Night Shamaylan's *The Happening* certainly have the feel of his earlier movies – *The Sixth Sense*, *Unbreakable*, and *The Village*. Why are all of these people dying or disappearing? The script originally was titled *The Green Effect*.

Peter passed around the most recent newsletter from PARSEC, the Pittsburgh sci-fi group.

Secret Talents of the Stars – an ill-fated TV show that was canceled after one episode. And George Takei was on the show singing a country western song.

Here TV Network is producing its own gay James Bond movie, starring Robert Gant. This is the network that brought you *Dante's Cove*.

Rob mentioned that a new superhero game will be coming out in the Spring.

And Peter promoted Gaylaxicon 2008!



Peter's Annual Best Dramatic Presentation Hugo Predictions

By a series of unfortunate mishaps, I missed the my opportunity to nominate works for Hugo consideration. If I *had* nominated works, *these* would have been my choices:

Best Dramatic Presentation Long Form

Six of the works I would have nominated *did* get nominated, if you count the *Battlestar Galactica*, "Razor" nomination in the Short Form category, as opposed to the nomination I proposed in the Long Form category. That's a 60% success rate.

I made sure to cast my votes for the Hugos well ahead of the voting deadline. This is how I voted in order of preference:

Best Dramatic Presentation Long Form

- 1) I walked into *Stardust* not knowing anything about the movie or the source material. Boy, was I pleasantly surprised. The movie entertained me and moved me the way a good old-fashioned love story should. It was, in my opinion, by far the best genre movie of the year.
- 2) I'm a big fan of the 'Harry Potter' books and movies. Last year's installment, while fun, wasn't dramatically new or different from the previous movie in the series.
- 3) I enjoy *Heroes*, but I never got sucked into the serialized nature of the show. If I missed an episode (which I often did), I had to ask Rob for a recap. Perhaps if I sat down and watched the entire series in one shot, I would have enjoyed it more.

4) One of my favorite books was ruined by writer/director Chris Weitz - The Golden Compass. Why did he have to water down the anti-Catholic bent of the source material? Why did he have to cut the downbeat ending of the book and end the movie on a happy note? Oh yeah, he was trying to make money in a media that plays it safe (and not offend the religious right) and waters down a great coming-of-age young adult tale. Had I not read the book, would I have liked the movie better? Probably. Technically, it was a good movie. The production was gorgeous; the special effects deserved the Oscar they won; and the acting was good. But I did read the book (and the whole trilogy - "His Dark Materials" by Philip Pullman) and my enjoyment of the movie suffered for it.



5) I did not see *Enchanted* but decided to vote for it as my last choice. I don't expect it to win; but if it does, that's better than no award.

Best Dramatic Presentation Short Form

As many people know, I'm a sucker for anything *Doctor Who/Torchwood*-related. Therefore, I *had* to pick the three *Doctor Who/Torchwood* episodes for my top three votes.

1) The *Dr. Who* story that brought tears to my eyes was the love story between Captain Jack Harkness and Captain Jack Harkness in *Torchwood*, "Captain Jack Harkness." Of the three *Doctor Who/Torchwood* episodes, this was the most dramatically powerful for me.

- 2) I really want Paul Cornell, who wrote *Doctor Who*, "Human Nature"/"Family of Blood," to win a Hugo. That's why I chose his work over Stephen Moffit's *Doctor Who*, "Blink."
- 3) Moffit hass already won two Hugos (for previous *Doctor Who* episodes) and, more recently, two Baftas (a British Bafta and Welsh Bafta) for "Blink." (I also liked Cornell's two-parter better than Moffit's single episode, though I think Moffit's "Blink" is tighter and doesn't suffer from the padding that made the two-parter overly long.)
- 4) Next on my list was the killer *Battlestar Galactica* episode "Razor." It did a great job of presenting a strong story without requiring the audience to have followed the show. Bringing back the Cylons from the 1980s show brought goose bumps to my skin. The movie kicked some fracking butt!
- 5) That leaves one of the best fan-produced *Star Trek* episodes I've ever seen, *Star Trek New Voyages*, "World Enough and Time." The story is strong, the sets are good, and the CGI special effects are great. But the acting is moderate-to-poor (except for the two professional actor guest stars, George Takei and Christina Moses); the dialog was weak; and the episode suffered from many technical flaws, such as the sound quality.

In some ways it's unfair to put "World Enough and Time" in the same category as the other four stories. "World Enough and Time" was made on a shoestring budget. The production values on *Doctor Who, Torchwood*, and *Battlestar Galactica* are all excellent. The shows' producers all have the money to hire the best writers, actors, and technical crews to produce a polished piece of work. "World Enough and Time" pales in comparison.

What do I think will win? That's easy: Long Form – *Heroes*, Season 1; Short Form – *Battlestar Galactica*, "Razor"

Worldcon is in the U.S. this year. There are currently 3,389 members. I wasn't able to find attendance figures

for last year's Worldcon; but, since it was in Japan, I'm pretty sure membership was low. All members of this year's Worldcon and last year's Worldcon can vote for the Hugo awards. Both *Heroes* and *Battlestar Galactica* are very popular shows in the U.S.

While there were a lot of fun theatrical movies last year, nothing really stood out in my mind as great. *Heros*, on the other hand, ranked 21st in the 2006–2007 television season, with an average 14.3 million people watching the show. Surely some of those viewers must be members of Worldcon?

While Doctor Who won a Hugo two years in a row, I think Battlestar Galactica will get another Hugo this year. (The show won in 2005 for the first episode of Season One - "33." "Razor" is currently ranked #183 in Movies & TV at Amazon.com.) I know that among the LSF crowd I hang out with, Battlestar Galactica is more popular than Doctor Who or Torchwood. Time will tell if my predictions are correct.



BTW, I only saw twelve genre movies and one genre miniseries last year. The older I get, the pickier I get. Here is the list of movies I *did* manage to see, on which I based my fantasy nominations and actual voting for the Best Dramatic Presentation Long Form Hugo:
