It was noted that there is a comic book version online. *Sanctuary*, a new genre TV show, premieres on October 3. It appears to be about a sanctuary for metaphysical beings.

There was general agreement that the *Babylon AD* movie is horrible. Some films coming out soon: *The Day the Earth Stood Still* starring Keanu Reeves (yes, can you believe it?), *Strange Case of Benjamin Butter*, and *Blindness*.

Some genre TV news: This will be the last season of *Supernatural*. *Heroes* returns – the first half of this season is titled "Villains." *Middleman*

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and *Life on Mars* are remakes of BBC series. The Justice League members will be featured during this season of *Smallville*. *Pushing Daisies* is returning. (What else?) The premise of *Primeval* is that there are portals that allow creatures from the past and the future to enter our time period; the show is recycling CGI dinosaurs and other creatures featured in various BBC/PBS documentary series.

A TV show about Eros and Aphrodite taking human form and taking up in a small town was briefly discussed – but no one could recall the title of the show.

In a straight-to-video "Wonder Woman" animated feature, Carrie Russell will provide the voice of the Amazing Amazon.

Rob reminded everyone of the upcoming LSF book discussion titles and dates. In September, it's *Howl's Moving Castle* (book and/or movie). In October, the book is Steve Berman's *Vintage*. (Note: Steve Berman is a guest at Gaylaxicon 2008.)

Alex commented that a new online game called *Spore* is has been released and that he is totally addicted.

"Star Trek: The Experience" Closes Down

After a decade at the Final Frontier, "Star Trek: The Experience" has gone where no Las Vegas Strip attraction wants to go. With a decommissioning ceremony – as befitted any great vessel – the exhibit and its replica of the Starship Enterprise have closed. Thousands of trekkies "beamed up" from across the United Federation of Planets, the United States, and around the world one last time, according to exhibit spokesman Chad Boutte. Some sought a final encounter with the Borg. Others just wanted to share a farewell drink - likely a stiff Warp Core Breach, with 10 ounces of rum – with fellow fans at the attraction's restaurant. More than 3 million people have come through since the Experience opened in 1998. In the end,the USS Enterprise couldn't breach an earthly frontier - the attractions owner (Cedar Fair Entertainment Co.) and the Las Vegas Hilton (its landlord) couldn't agree on a new lease. They worked as a typical landlord and retail tenant, with Cedar Fair keeping all revenue from the attraction, said hotel spokesman Ira David Sternberg. Trekkies were incensed. They scrawled reminiscences about the exhibit on the walls inside, and they called Cedar Fair and the hotel to complain. But the on-line rumor that the space the exhibit occupied will become a theater for pop star Michael Jackson is unfounded, Sternberg said. He said nothing's decided. λΨФ

The Word of God or, Holy Writ Rewritten by Thomas M. Disch (Tachyon Publications, 2008) a review by Carl

Iread Disch's first book when it came out four decades ago; and now I've read his last (posthumous) book. How often can you say that about an author? Oddly enough, I haven't read any of the works in-between, including some of his most famous ones: *Camp Concentration* (1968), *On Wings of Song* (1979), and *The Brave Little Toaster* (1986) - and I had't read any of his poetry either.

Thomas Disch was one of those New Wave science fiction writers who rocked the genre back in the 1960s. I read his first novel, The Genocides (1965), soon after it came out. (I was into my "apocalyptic sci-fi" period; and Disch's book really satisfied me.) I never knew he was gay until I prepared an obituary article for the LSF newsletter following his death in July of this year. It was then that I also heard about a new Disch book to be published posthumously by Tachyon. When I spotted it in a local Borders - purely by accident; it was mis-shelved - I picked it up. Good thing, too - I quite enjoyed it.


How to describe this book? Hmmm... that's a tough one. It's sort'a like The Bible in some respects: God tells you stuff; there are some stories to illustrate various points of divine truth; and there's some poetry. But I suppose that's to be expected, isn't it? After all, look at the title of this book. If you haven't read any of Disch's short fiction, then there are ten or so of 'em in

here, including: "The Second Coming of Christ," "A Man of Mystery," "A Ranch House on the Styx," "The School for Traitors," and "The New Me." And there are also about a dozen of his poems in here, including his famous "How to Behave When Dead" (1981). It would seem that most (if not all) of the poetry in *The Word of God* has appeared in previous publications - but if, like me, you've never read any of it before, this is a great way to do some catching-up.

But, you ask, how does the Divine Voice sound when It's not telling stories or reciting poetry? Let me give you a couple of excerpts from Chapter One:

As to the revelations I mean to unfold, many will be of that traditional High Utterance that lays down laws and offers delectable previsions of heaven and saber-rattling fantasies of enemies horribly revenged, but there will also be talks of a friendlier locker-room character (the more American side of the vision), with homespun scriptures sometimes verging on whimsy. But nowhere will there be irreverence. Indeed, it's precisely in the more playful and paradoxical passages that seekers may find the touchstones of a perfected faith, for faith is never more perfectly rooted in the soul than when one can truly believe in something one knows to be preposterous, like Noah's Ark...

So is this Holy Writ or isn't it? Am I being serious? Yes, and then some. What I propose to write about in these sacred pages is what the whole Godbusiness looks like to someone who not only doesn't believe in God but who, moreover, doesn't believe in the belief of those most aggressively pious, most loudly devout. The only way effectively to convey my own sense of the matter is to arrogate to myself the same absolute authority, the same more-than-Papal infallibility, the same maddeningly smug chutzpah that True Believers of all varieties have armed themselves with: the Jesus freaks and Jehovah's Witnesses, the Tartuffes and Elmer Gantrys, the imams and avatollahs, the redneck judges with two-ton Tablets of the Law



they want to plunk down on the courthouse lawn and the archbishops campaigning against abortion, all the while they play three-card monte with their cadres of pedophile priests. To paraphrase a popular song, if they loved God half as much as they say they do, they wouldn't do all the things we can see them do.

Shocking? Hey, isn't it the Divine Prerogative to shock us poor mortals? And, speaking of "shocking," one of the biggest eye-openers for me was the absolute river of vituperative bile that Disch unleashes against another deceased SF author by the name of Philip K. Dick. Hokey Smoke, Bullwinkle! No love lost there! It runs like a bloody stream through several-many of the short stories! On the other hand, I suppose one can understand Disch's anti-Dick animus - after all, Dick did report Disch to the FBI in 1972 after Camp Concentration was published. (No lie. Dick apparently suggested to the FBI that the book contained coded information "to be read by the right people here and there.") Juicy!

Put it all together, and I whole-heartedly recommend *The Word of God* by Thomas M. Disch. Read it and I think you'll see why Disch is sometimes referred to as an "unsung science-fiction master." Oh, and by the way, it appears that there will be yet another posthumous Disch collection coming out from Tachyon later this year: *The Wall of America*. I guess I've got something to look forward to.

Otto, or Up With Dead People

Otto, or Up With Dead People features a newly zombified young thing - teetering into the world of the undead on still unsteady feet. Otto, played with gothic glee by Jay Crisfar, wanders the streets of Berlin, briefly recalling snippets of his pre-zombie life. (At one point, compelled to eat the entrails of a small animal and finding it somewhat of an acquired taste, he wonders if he was a vegan in a former life.) Otto eventually finds work as, well... a zombie... on THE epic political-porno-zombie movie to end all political-porno-zombie movies. Ridiculed for remaining in character, Otto remains consumed by the memory of his ex-boyfriend. He tracks him down, with predictably disastrous results, but not before remembering the love they once shared. Aaaawww... Otto features all the LaBruce flourishes we love so well sexy boys being naughty, bursting

politically correct bubbles left and right, and a cinematic style that is at once both breathtakingly daring and slyly low-rent. [LaBruce, Germany, 2008, 95 minutes]



Zombie Prom

While Otto is a subversive look at European mores and politics, Zombie *Prom* is as all-American as apple pie and comic books. Apple pie dipped in radioactive waste, that is. Good-girl Toffee and Jonny-with-no-H are in love, but she dumps him at the insistence of principal Miss Strict (RuPaul). Devastated, Jonny jumps into a nuclear cooling tower, only to emerge a still handsome atomic waste-ridden TEENAGE ZOM-He returns in hopes of still escorting Toffee to the prom, but the whole town is thrown into turmoil at htis radioactive hunk in their midst. media is called in, adding to the furor and hysteria behind the Zombie Civil Rights struggle. Will Jonny win back Toffee? And what of the shared past between Miss Strict and sleazo-o TV personality Eddie Flagrante? It all comes to a boiling head amidst some rousing dance numbers, state-of-the-art comic book animation and not-so-veiled look at the lives of gay teenagers today. 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Olsson's Closes!

Olsson Enterprises, Inc., trading as Olsson's Books & Records, Record & Tape Ltd., and Olsson's Books announced today [Sept. 30, 2008] that it has closed all of its locations and petitioned the U.S. Bankruptcy Court District of Maryland for conversion of its current Chapter 11 protection to Chapter 7. The reasons given for the petitioning were stagnant sales, low cash reserves, and an inability to renegotiate current leases, along with a continuing weak retail economy and plummeting music sales.

Olsson's was granted Chapter 11 protection on July 11 this year in order to work on an aggressive reorganization plan involving selected store closings and large cuts in overhead costs. At the same time the Lansburgh/ Penn Quarter location on 7th Street, NW was shuttered to make way for a new London-based restaurant.

Olsson's was established in 1972 and grew to as many as nine retail stores in the Washington, DC metro area, with sales over \$16 million a year and as many as 200 employees. Olsson's earned its reputation as a locally-owned community-oriented retailer with a knowledgeable staff selling a wide selection of books, music, video and gifts.

Stephen Wallace-Haines, Olsson's general manager stated: "In the end, all the roads towards reorganization led to this dead end: we did not have the money required to pay for product in advance, to collect reserves to buy for Christmas, and satisfy the demands of rent and operational costs. We were losing money just by staying open."
