As promised in last month's newsletter, here's a short reminder about Lambda Sci-Fi's *nineteenth* annual book (*et al*) exchange, which will occur at the upcoming Jan. 8th meeting! All LSF members — and visitors, guests, attendees, etc. — are invited to participate in this "blind exchange."

In case you've never participated in one of these before (or in case you've forgotten), here's how it works:

- (1) Go out and purchase a copy of your "favorite" science fiction, fantasy, or horror book. (NOTE: Over the years, LSF has expanded the concept of "book" to include comics, videotapes, "books on tape," etc. If you want or if you're feeling particularly wealthy you can even make itseveral favorite books or whatever.)
- (2) Insert a piece of paper (or a bookmark) with your name on it. (That's so whoever eventually ends up with the item will know who it's from and will get to know a little more about you at least to know what one of your "favorites" is.)
- (3) Wrap up the exchange item, but don't put any identifying marks or anything on the wrapped package to say (continued on page 2)

Business Meeting

The election of officers for 2009 went quickly. All current officers were elected by acclamation: Teresa (Speaker), Rob (Treasurer), Peter (Membership Coordinator), and Scott (Secretary).

Rob reported that the club has about the \$1700 in its bank account.



From Troy to Rome: The Aeneid in F&SF (Part 2)

Recently, three F&SF authors have written their own versions – or reinterpretations – of *The Aeneid*. In the December issue of the newsletter, I reviewed two of those books: David Gemmell's *Troy: The Fall of Kings* and Ursula K. LeGuin's *Lavinia*. And now for my review of the third re-telling of the voyage from Troy to Rome.

Black Ships, by Jo Graham (Orbit, 2008)

I picked this book up on a whim. When I first spotted it, I figured it'd be a pleasant counterpoint to Gemmel's "Troy" trilogy (reviewed in last month's newsletter). Well, *Black Ships* turned out to be rather more than that! This is Jo Graham's first book; and it's astoundingly good! It tells the story of *The Aeneid* from the perspective of Gull (later called Linnea or "the Pythia" or "the Sybil"), who accompanies Aeneas (aka Neas) on his journey to Italy.

The time is the Late Bronze Age, when civilization is on the brink of a Dark Age and cities fall one after another to raiders and barbarians. As the story opens, Gull is a young girl in the Achaian city of Pylos, daughter of a captured Trojan slave. When she is crippled in an accident, Gull is taken by King Nestor to be apprenticed to Pythia, the priestess and oracle of Persephone, the Lady of the Dead. In time, she becomes Pythia herself. When a group of Trojan raiders descend on Pylos - led by Prince Aeneas - Gull/Pythia and the other Trojan slaves join them and begin their quest for a new homeland. throughout this quest, Gull becomes the virtual heart, soul, and guide of the fugitive Trojan people.

But Graham's book isn't just a simple re-telling of *The Aeneid*. Through Gull's story, Graham also provides the reader with her fascinating interpretation of the so-called "crisis of *circa* 1200 BC" (the fall of Troy; the destruction of the Achaean citadels; the end of the Minoan and Hittite empires; the depredations of



the Sea Peoples; etc.). And she offers a number of interesting possibilities. For example, archaeology shows us that the city of Troy was actually destroyed and rebuilt a number of times. In Graham's novel, Gull's mother was captured during the first Trojan war (the invasion led by Agamemnon); but Aeneas and his men are fugitives from a subsequent destruction of Troy: a new raid led by Neoptolemos, the bloodthirsty son of Achilles. This Neoptolemos leads a fleet of pirates in savage forays throughout the eastern Mediterranean, sacking one city after another – even leading them to the shores of mighty Egypt. His seafaring band of mixed Achaians, Sardinians, and others is Graham's take on the fabled Sea Peoples eventually defeated by Pharaoh Ramses III (circa 1175 BC). And in Black Ships, it's Aeneas and his Trojans who are instrumental in tipping the scales of victory in Pharaoh's favor.

This brings up what is perhaps Graham's most ingenious re-interpretation of Vergil's epic poem: her version of the tragic "Dido and Aeneas" story. Vergil, of course, has the Trojan prince visit Carthage, where he falls in love with, romances, and then abandons Queen Dido. Well, says Graham, that's an unsupportable anachronism: Carthage didn't exist during the time of Aeneas and the Trojan War - it wouldn't be founded until several centuries later. So where can Aeneas have found a powerful royal lady to woo? Egypt! So, for this story, Graham has ingeniously created the Princess Basetamon, sister of Ramses III, "She Who Speaks with Pharaoh's Voice in Memphis." It all fits together so well that I can hardly believe that no one has thought of this before. (Well done, Ms. Graham!)

Black Ships isn't only historical fiction, however - there are plenty of Fantasy elements to keep F&SF fans interested. To begin with, Gull is an oracle and prophetess (particularly in her roles as Pythia and Sybil). As priestess of the Persephone, she leads Aeneas in his visit to the Underworld in search of knowledge. One of my favorite fantasy scenes occurs in the Phoenician city of Byblos, where Gull encounters a "young" winged god named Mik-el, "one of the warriors who waits upon Baal." In the course of their brief meeting, Gull learns of Mik-el's origins in prehistoric Mesopotamia and of his desire to become a "champion of the worthy." (It becomes obvious that this "young god" is actually the precursor of Michael, archangel and supreme enemy of Satan.)

And there's even some LGBT content in Black Ships - not a lot, but enough to be satisfying. Aeneas, the "man of destiny," is loved by both Gull and his longtime friend Xandros (aka Alexandros) – but neither of their loves are requited. Aeneas loves them both, but only as friends. (Gull is a Priestess of the Dark Lady, and Aeneas cannot wed her to found his dynasty; and although Xandros is bisexual, Aeneas is not.) Gull and Xandros console each other and eventually fall in love and have children. (It is true that, as a Priestess of the Dark Lady, Gull is forbidden to marry; but she's not forbidden to have children.) There's also the heroic-tragic character Ashterah, a young eunuch "priestess" of the goddess Ashterat. Xandros meets and becomes enamored of Ashterah during the Trojans' brief stay in Byblos. Subsequently, Ashterah helps the Trojans escape from Byblos ahead of the Achaian raiders, but is swept overboard during a storm on the way to Egypt.

All in all, *Black Ships* is a really satisfying read! Jo Graham certainly gives a long-time author like David Gemmel1 a run for his money!





Forrest J Ackerman

Forrest Ackerman – writer, editor, agent, collector, and fan extraordinaire – passed away on December 4th. "Uncle Forry" was a reader of SF magazines from their inception and an active member of SF fandom from his early teens. He attended the first World Science Fiction Convention (NYC, 1939) dressed in a costume based on the then-current SF blockbuster film *Things to Come*.

Forry's first story was "A Trip to Mars" (1929) for the *San Francisco Chronicle*, which won a prize for the best tale by a teenager. As early as 1932, he served as associate editor of *The*

Time Traveller, the first fanzine. For many decades thereafter he wrote numerous stories and articles for fan journals – becoming known in fan circles as "Mr. Science Fiction." He won several awards for these activities, including a Hugo in 1953 for Number One Fan Personality.

Forry collected SF books and memorabilia from the very first – eventually housing his 300,000-item library (which he called the Fantasy Foundation) in a 17-room house in Hollywood. (A number of LSF members have had the honor of touring the collection over the years.)

Forry edited the magazine Famous Monsters of Filmland (1958-1982) and the US "Perry Rhodan" series (1969-1977), as well a several anthologies. Notorious for his punning and use of simplified words, he is credited with introducing the term "sci-fi" in 1954. He was the agent for a number of writers, notably A.E. Van Vogt. Two of his closest friends over the decades were fellow SF icons Ray Bradbury and Ray Harryhausen.

Although not gay himself, Forry was a long-time friend to the LGBT fannish community. In 1994, LSF was highly honored when Forry agreed to be our Gaylaxicon Special Guest of Honor.

Here are a couple of personal memories from LSF members:

Michael C.: Many of us remember him being a gracious and entertaining

guest at a past Gaylaxicon in Rockville, and I have my own memories of hanging out with him at assorted Monster Bash conventions.

Michael M.: It is the sad passing of an era. Ackerman was an important part of my childhood. I remember anxiously hunting down as a kid issues of his fan magazine Famous Monsters of Filmland. It was my intro to horror movies and the sci fi horror genre. His fan stuff was my favorite read as kid, even more than comic books. I owe him a debt I can never repay. I'd like to think somewhere in the great beyond he is enjoying a tete a tete with Karloff, Lugosi, Price, and all the other greats.



Jules Verne was my father. H.G. Wells was my wise uncle.

Edgar Allen Poe was the batwinged cousin we kept high in the back attic room.

Flash Gordon and Buck Rogers were my brothers and friends.

There you have my ancestry.

Adding, of course, the fact that in all probability Mary Wollstonecraft Shelley, author of *Frankenstein*, was my mother.
