Two Short Reviews by Carl





The Affinity Bridge by George Mann (TOR Books, 2009)


"The Widow of Windsor" is on the throne; zeppelins roam the skies; automata and other fantastical Victorian "super science" abound - looks like Steampunk to me! But The Affinity Bridge is rather more than that. It also interweaves elements of several different strands of popular Victorian literature: the Great Detective (in the tradition of Holmes and Watson); mad scientists (in the tradition of Captain Nemo, Dr. Jekyll, and Dr. Moreau); and Gothic chills (in the tradition of such authors as Bram Stoker, Sheridan LeFanu, and Robert Louis Stevenson). There's also a nod to the current F&SF interest in zombies. And, as I learned at Worldcon in Montreal, The Affinity Bridge has even been classified as "alternate history" good enough to be included on the 2009 Short List for the Sidewise Awards (honoring excellence in works of alternate history). Wow! That's quite a mix! And ya know what? Mann pulls it all off really well!

Crown Investigators Sir Maurice Newbury and Miss Veronica Hobbes are assigned (without explanation) by Her Majesty to investigate the mysterious crash of a huge zeppelin (with the loss of all lives aboard) - and the even more mysterious disappearance of the automaton that had been piloting it. In the meantime, a mass murderer (reputedly a "glowing policeman") is terrorizing London's East End, while a zombie plague ravages the city's slums. Is it possible there's some sort of connection between all these events? Newbury and Hobbes as they search for clues through the dangerous night-time streets and alleys of Victorian London.

As I've said many time before,

I'm a big fan of Steampunk; and I consider The Affinity Bridge to be a fine addition to this sub-genre. Give it a try; I think you'll enjoy it, too.

Schismatrix Plus by **Bruce Sterling** (Ace Books, 1996)



Back in the August LSF newsletter, I reviewed a book by a new favorite author of mine: Revelation Space by Alastair Reynolds. thereby hangs a tale...

In the Afterward to Galactic North (a collection of his short stories), Reynolds comments that he owes "an equally obvious debt to Bruce Sterling, whose 'Shaper/Mechanist' sequence blew my mind on several levels." And then he says: "Read Schismatrix if you haven't already done so: it will melt your face." Sounds like heart-felt praise to me. I can't say as I've read much by Sterling; in fact, all that comes to mind is The Difference Engine, the Steampunk magnum opus co-authored by Bruce Sterling and William Gibson. (And I definitely liked it!) So, OK, I decided to check out what affected Reynolds so deeply. Fortunately for me, all five of Sterling's "Shaper/Mechanist" stories (including the novel Schismatrix) were collected into one volume back in 1996: Schismatrix Plus. And off I went to Amazon.com.

In his Introduction to the volume, Sterling describes the "Shaper/ Mechanist" stories and Schismatrix as "the most 'cyberpunk' works I will ever write." All of them were first published in the early 1980s, with the short stories appearing in such magazines as Fantasy and Science Fiction, Universe 13, Omni, and Interzone. But they're not like the other "classic cyberpunk" stories I've read – they don't have the same "urban noir-ish" feel that I'd come to expect of that sub-genre. Like the Reynolds novels they inspired, Sterling's "Shaper/ Mechanist" tales are sort'a like "cyberpunk in outer space" - they explore a lot of the "classic cyberpunk" themes and concepts, but in a less Earthbound context. I'd almost classify Sterling's "Shaper/Mechanist" works as precursors of the recent New Space Opera sub-genre. (Unlike Reynolds's humanity, however, Sterling's humans haven't yet expanded beyond our Solar System.)

In Sterling's version of the 23rd Century, society is basically divided between two major human factions: the Shapers (who employ genetics and psychology to alter the basic human type) and the Mechanists (who use computers and body prosthetics). And there are all the confused and confusing political associations based on one of those two major factions. Within this framework, Sterling explores such issues as what it means to be "human" and how tinkering with the basic human type can affect societies and politics. And he does it all while telling fascinating stories.

I'm not sure I enjoyed Sterling's "Shaper/Mechanist" stories as much as I have the Reynolds novels that they inspired. This isn't to say that I didn't enjoy everything in Schismatrix Plus because I did enjoy it all. (I found the experimental format of his "Twenty Evocations" to be particularly interesting.) Maybe it's just that I prefer the sense of being immersed in Reynolds's massive novels. Whatever. If you like Cyberpunk or New Space Opera, I'd recommend getting your hands on a copy of Schismatrix Plus. I think you'll like it. too. ΑΨΦ
