Osamu Tezuka: God of Manga, Father of Anime info passed along by Wayne 1

Apparently in recognition of the recent release of the new *Astro Boy* animated feature, the Freer Gallery of Art is presenting a retrospective of the remarkable works of Astro Boy's creator, Osamu Tezuka. Osamu Tezuka (1928-1989) was perhaps the most influential artist in the mediums of *manga* (comic books) and *anime* (animated features); he created hundreds of *manga* and dozens of animated films and television episodes.

Nov. 13 (Friday, 7PM)

Introducing Astro Boy – Astro Boy (known as "Mighty Atom" in Japan) is one of Tezuka's most iconic and enduring creations. To kick off the retrospective, author and Tezuka expert

The screening is followed by a panel discussion with authors Frederik Schodt (The Astro Boy Essays), Helen McCarthy (The Art of Osamu Tezuka: God of Manga), and Natsu Onoda Power (Good of Comics: Osamu Tezuka).

Nov. 15 (Sunday, 2 PM)

Marine Express (1979) – This 91-minute tale of skullduggery and smuggling on an undersea train features appearances by nearly all of Tezuka's most famous characters. In person: Frederik Schodt and Helen McCarthy.

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How LSF Was Founded (With a Nod to James Crutchfield) by Peter Knapp

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The genesis of Lambda Sci-Fi can dates back to Noreascon 3, the 1989 World Science Fiction Convention.

During the convention, the Gaylactic Network held a gay fandom party and circulated a sign-up sheet for people interested in meeting and creating local gay sci-fi clubs. After the con, those who filled out the sign-up sheet received a letter with contact information for other local people who had also filled out the sign-up sheet. In April of 1990, Loree and Marcelle Cook-Daniels held the first LSF meeting at their house in Takoma Park, MD. Nine founding members came to that first meeting and organized the club: Barrett Brick, Carl Cipra, Loree Cook-Daniels, Marcelle Cook-Daniels, Bruce Garrett, Tom Hertzel, Peter Knapp, Al Weiner, and James Williams.

The next three meetings were held in Silver Spring, MD at Al Weiner's house. While a great a space to hold meetings, Al's house was not easily accessible by Metro, as it was so far out from the Washington, DC. Carl Cipra held the fifth meeting at his condo near Catholic University (walking distance from the Metro), and twenty five people showed up and stuffed into his small living room. The club needed to find a larger space near the Metro.

James Crutchfield, who joined the club at the August 1990 meeting, agreed to host future meetings at his place in the Dupont Circle area. Through his generosity over the years, hundreds of fans of science fiction, fantasy, and horror have attended LSF meetings in his large living room. The club has thrived in large part due to James's unwavering support over the last 19 years.

Well, it all started with lots of LSFers traveling up to Minneapolis over the Columbus Day Weekend to attend Gaylaxicon 2009 (Oct. 9-11). And so the October LSF meeting was postponed (from its regular second-Sunday-of-themonth date) until Saturday, October 24th – and linked with a "Halloween-themed" potluck video party.

As it turned out, about a dozen or so folks showed up on that rainy Saturday. On the downstairs screen were The Thing (1951, produced by Howard Hawks) and the first two Season 1 episodes of True Blood (the HBO series). Tezuka's Short Films – This remarkable showcase of shorts made between 1962 and 1987 reveals Tezuka's energy, originality, and clarity of vision as he employs music and imagery to render dialogue unnecessary. These films show Tezuka the art house animator at his inventive best.

basis. Doors to the Meyer Auditorium open approximately 30 minutes before each show time.

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
Hand of Isis by Jo Graham

(Orbit Books, 2009) a short review by Carl

Some months ago, I reviewed *Black Ships*, the marvelous first novel by up-and-coming author Jo Graham. And now her second book – *Hand of Isis* – has hit the stands. Suffice it to say that I rushed right out and bought a copy – and enjoyed it!

Once again, Graham has written a novel of the historical/fantasy variety. This time, however, the novel is set in actual historical times rather than being a "historical re-creation" of Bronze Age legends. Hand of Isis tells the story of Cleopatra – from her youth during the turbulent reign of her father, Pharaoh Ptolemy Auletes, to her rise to power and her relationships with both Julius Caesar and Marcus Antonius, and on to her tragic death (and beyond). Although there are definite links to the 1960 blockbuster film Cleopatra (starring Elizabeth Taylor, Rex Harrison, and Richard Burton) and to the Shakespearean plays, Graham has once again added some unique and fascinating twists of her own to the tale.

The story is told from the viewpoint of Charmian, one of Cleopatra's "handmaidens." Ah, but here comes the first kicker: Charmian and Iras (the other "handmaiden") are actually Cleopatra's half-sisters, illegitimate daughters of Pharaoh by a Thracian slave and a Nubian slave. And, as trusted members of the Royal House, Charmian and Iras eventually come to fulfill roles that are rather more significant than merely attending to the personal needs of their royal half-sister. Just as Oueen Cleopatra comes to be recognized as the personification of the Goddess Isis (and "the Hand of Isis" on Earth), so do Charmian and Iras become Cleopatra's "hands" (her "executive officers," as it were). When Cleopatra ascends the Throne of Egypt, Charmain is given control of the Royal Palace and all its workings, and Iras becomes Cleopatra's Royal Treasurer. Together, they work to maintain peace and prosperity for Egypt in a world increas-



ingly disrupted by the intrusion of Rome into the Eastern Mediterranean area.

I found one particular aspect of Charmian's life to be truly fascinating: Ms. Graham has depicted Charmian as having a brief love affair with Marcus Vipsanius Agrippa (an actual historical character). They meet when the young Agrippa comes to Egypt as a staff officer in the entourage of Julius Caesar. For various reasons, the two young lovers are prevented from developing an ongoing relationship; and this becomes particularly poignant when, many years Agrippa eventually leads the Roman forces that decisively defeat the armies of Cleopatra and Marcus Antonius at the Battle of Pharsalus.

LGBT content plays a larger role than in Graham's previous novel, Black Ships. In Hand of Isis, Dion is an up-and-coming scholar in the Great Library and a member of the Jewish Diaspora in Alexandria. He's also a close personal friend of Charmian, as well as the long-time lover of Charmian's husband, Emrys (a Gaul, a member of Caesar's Guard). The relationship between these three people is, I think, handled rather endearlingly. Graham herself has said: "I felt that Ashterah [the heroic young cross-dressing sacred prostitute] got a bad deal in Black Ships, and so it was good to give Dion room to grow and have an interesting life."

The Fantasy angle is also rather more pronounced in this novel. It begins right as the novel opens, with the death of Charmian and her spirit's appearance for judgment before Isis and Serapis in the Hall of Amenti. There are also lots of hints about reincarnation, with brief glimpses of the previous and subsequent lives of some of the characters. Of particular interest are indications that Charmian and other characters in Hand of Isis were characters (in previous incarnations) in the story of the Aeneid (as retold in Black Ships) AND will also be characters (also in previous incarnations) in Graham's next novel, Stealing Fire. One of the supernatural characters in Hand of Isis, a minor winged deity named Mikhael (seemingly an earlier form of Michael the Archangel) also previously made an appearance in Black Ships.

As in *Black Ships*, Graham once again truly gives her readers a taste of life in another age. This time, however, rather than providing an historical veracity to myth and legend, she provides glimpses of what life might have been like in late Ptolemaic Egypt. All this and a fascinating story too!

I'm really looking forward to Graham's next novel, Stealing Fire. It will apparently recount the story of Alexander the Great, told from the viewpoint of one of his Companions. And if you haven't read either Black Ships or Hand of Isis, I highly recommend that you rush right out and read one (or both!) of them. I'm pretty darn sure you'll be glad you did.
