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One-Man Lord of the Rings a Review of the Play by Peter Knapp



I recently saw the One-Man Lord of the Rings play by the same guy (Charles Ross) who did the One-Man Star Wars play. As the title suggests, the play is performed by one man, with no sets or props (not even a ring) and only theatrical lights to suggest various scenes. In three acts, Ross voices all the key characters, music, and sound effects, runs around the stage, often fighting with himself, playing various characters fighting the hordes, and at times each other. I had a good time and recommend it to Lord of the Rings Fans. It runs through August 1st at Woolly Mammoth:

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Shakespeare in Klingon


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Washington Shakespeare Company announces By Any Other Name: An Evening of Shakespeare in Klingon "qaStaHvIS wanI'vam yIDachQo'!"

Never shrinking from a challenge – and always willing to surprise – Washington Shakespeare Company (WSC) has once again turned Shakespeare on its ear. In celebration of its groundbreaking 20 years as the Metro area's cutting-edge classical theater company, WSC is pleased to present "By Any Other Name: An Evening of Shakespeare in Klingon," with special guest George Takei. This unique production includes performances of memorable Shakespearean scenes presented in both English and Klingon, the language spoken by the fictional warrior race in the beloved Star Trek series. Appearing with WSC for this one-nightonly event is legendary actor George Takei. In addition to his portraval of Mr. Sulu in the television and film series, Takei has more than 40 feature film and television roles to his credit. "I've never participated in an event that brings Shakespeare and Star Trek together in this unusual way," said Takei. "It will be a new and exciting experience for me, and I'm looking forward to boldly going where I've never gone before!"

Indeed, the planets have aligned for this remarkable event; the current president of WSC's board is none other than the creator of the Klingon language. Marc Okrand. A noted linguist, Okrand helped launch television's closed captioning service for deaf and hard-ofhearing viewers. By an unusual confluence of events, he found himself enlisted to develop Klingon, now believed to be the most widely spoken fictional language in history. Indeed, fans began to study the language, even using Okrand's Klingon Dictionary to translate the works of Shakespeare and the Bible.

"Translations of Shakespeare into Klingon and my involvement with WSC began at about the same time,"



Okrand remarked. "I was always trying to figure out how to get the two together. Given WSC's creative approach to Shakespeare, performing scenes in Klingon struck me as something obvious to try. The upcoming celebration of WSC's 21st season presents a great opportunity to pull these elements together in typical WSC fashion — and to offer an evening that's both serious and fun."

Joining Takei on stage will be WSC's own Artistic Director, Christopher Henley, as well as members of WSC's Acting Company. The cast will perform scenes and speeches in both English and Klingon from Hamlet, Julius Caesar, and Much Ado About Nothing (with a same-sex couple performing as Beatrice and Benedick). WSC has tackled everything from an all-nude production of Macbeth to an all-female production of The Taming of the Shrew; thus, taking on Shakespeare in a completely fictional, sci-fi language isn't daunting for Henley

"WSC continues to take chances. Our brand of non-traditional, risk-taking theater is exactly what sets us apart and wins over audiences from around the region. We have evolved from a scrappy to a substantial company, without losing our edge. It's a special treat to celebrate our new space and our 21st year with such a generous and enormous talent as George Takei."

This groundbreaking production on September 25th kicks off a celebration of WSC's 21st season and is a turning point for the company. In October, the company moves into its new theater space in Artisphere, the cultural arts center formerly occupied by the Newseum in Rosslyn, VA. Artisphere

will also include a ballroom, a WiFi town square, a restaurant, and a gallery.

"By Any Other Name: An Evening of Shakespeare in Klingon" featuring George Takei takes place at 8 PM on September 25th, 2010, at the Rosslyn Spectrum in Arlington. In addi-tion to the scenes from Shakespeare, the performance includes an introduction by Okrand and a question-and-answer session with Takei, Okrand, and Henley at the conclusion of the show. Tickets for this event go on sale on June 15: a \$150 ticket includes the Klingon event and four flex-use theater passes for the WSC 2010-2011 season; a \$250 ticket includes the above package plus a ticket to the VIP reception following the performance.

Man Star Wars play. I'm not a fan of fantasy in general and gave up trying to read Lord of the Rings as a kid. I saw the three movies, though not the special editions. My husband Rob is a huge fan of the source material, so he was proverbially rolling on the floor laughing the way I did the three times I saw the One-Man Star Wars show.

Ross talked to the audience afterward. After getting a cease-and-desist order from the *Lord of the Rings* folks, he spent four years writing weekly letters asking for permission to do the show. They finally relented for 10%. While popular when he first performed it after the movies came out, the show is not as popular today. He's philosophical about the difference between the two shows, as the *Star Wars* show is very popular; but he has to give George Lucas 25%. He only has to give 10% to the *Lord of the Rings* folks.

Star Wars in Concert a short review by Carl



Saturday night (July 17th) I gave myself a treat and attended "Star Wars in Concert" at the Verizon Center. All I can say is: "Wow! What a show!" It's a traveling concert featuring film clips from the six Star Wars films and, of course, the music of John Williams. And short introductions to each segment were narrated by Anthony Daniels (yes, C3PO himself).

I've always been a fan of John Williams. Putting aside arguments about whether or not his work is "derivative," the man really knew how to compose thrilling film scores. And I'm here to tell you that there's simply nothing like hearing a live symphony orchestra belt out the music from the Star Wars epic right there in the auditorium. I couldn't help tapping my feet to the rhythm. (The guy in front of me was pounding his thigh in time with "The Imperial March.") I'm pretty sure they used some sort of THX sound system after all, the whole show started with the THX intro sound effects – and, of course, the Twentieth Century Fox fanfare. Pretty cool, says I! There was even a full chorus to sing the pulse-pounding "Duel of the Fates" theme (for the climactic duel against Darth Maul in *Phantom Menace*).

But where would a *Star Wars* concert be without the visuals? Well, "*Star Wars* in Concert" did a really good job of including excerpts from all six of the films—as well as occasional stills and preproduction artwork—expertly woven into the Williams score. On a huge hi-def screen, no less.

The opening sequence was a montage of scenes from all six films while the *Star Wars* orchestral overture was performed. The rest of the concert was organized as a series of thematic sequences, with titles like "Rise of the Hero" and "The Droids" and "Pod Racing." But I'm not actually certain about all the titles,
