Once again, a number of prestigious sci-fi awards were announced at the World Science Fiction Convention (RenoVation, Reno NV). Here are some of the highlights:



The Hugo Awards are awards for excellence in the field of science fiction and fantasy. They were first awarded in 1953 and have been awarded every year since 1955. The Hugos are awarded each year at the World Science Fiction Convention; and voting for the awards is open to all members of the World Science Fiction Society (members of the current year's Worldcon).

The 2011 Hugo Award winners were announced at the traditional banquet on Saturday evening, August 20th. Authors Jay Lake and Ken Scholes presided as Masters of Ceremony, with additional presenters including Tim Powers, Boris Vallejo, Ellen Asher, George R.R. Martin, and Robert Silverberg. Social

In the Marvel "Ultimate Universe," a new biracial Spiderman named Miles Morales has been introduced.

Claire attended an art show at the Art & Space Museum depicting the space program over the past 50 years. She also advised everyone that the National Book Festival on the National Mall in September will feature a guest appearance by science-fiction author Neal Stephenson.

Carl commented on all of the butt-focused shots of Daniel Craig in the film Cowboys and Aliens. Jim W. was impressed by the ape character movement of the new Rise of the Planet of the Apes movie. Several people commented that they look forward to Pixar's next feature, Brave – a fantasy with a female lead., The upcoming Superman movie, titled Man of Steel, is due out in June 2013; it will feature the Kryptonian villains General Zod and Faora. Carl described the trailer for the game-based movie Battleship: it will feature ocean-going alien spaceships against Earth navies. And the "Rockem-Sockem Robots"-based film, Real Steel, starring Hugh Jackman, looks promising.

Carl and Jim will be attending the World Science Fiction Convention in Reno this coming week; and David will be attending Gallifrey (Dr. Who Convention) next February. Jim W. reviewed the events and activities at the most recent Shore Leave convention; he got to speak with Gary Lockwood and Sally Kellerman. Claire commented that Anne McCaffrey will be attending the next DragonCon after a long absencd due to health issues.

Apparently, not many LSFers have been watching the sci-fi TV series Alphas, Falling Skies, or Haven. And did you know that the newest male character on Warehouse 13 is gay?

Carl described Paul Malmont's latest novel, The Astounding, the Amazing, and the Unknown. In it, genre authors Robert Heinlein, Isaac As imov, and L. Sprague de Camp work at a naval laboratory doing research in support of the war effort during WWII. ΛΨΦ



Illustrated Steampunk from Abrams Image, Part 1 of 2

The Steampunk Bible by Jeff Vander Meer, with S.J. Chambers (Abrams Image, 2011)

There's been a lot of discussion at LSF lately regarding the resurgence of "steampunk" in the F&SF community. New steampunk novels and anthologies seem to pop up every day. And it's been noted that local conventions – such as Balticon and Darkovercon—have included more and more steampunk activities in recent years. How fortuitous, therefore, is the publication of *The Steampunk Bible: An Illustrated Guide to the World of Imaginary Airships, Corsets and Goggles, Mad Scientists, and Strange Literature*!

You say you're not familiar with "steampunk"? OK, quick and dirty definition: it's a sub-genre of SF that involves an era or world where steam power (and/ or clockwork mechanisms) are widely used and that often includes anachronistic technology (or futuristic innovations as Victorians might have envisioned them). Think of the works of Jules Verne or H.G. Wells or Mary Shelley as possible sources. Steampunk literature (labeled as such) first came to prominence during the 1980s and early 1990s: The Anubis Gates (Tim Powers, 1983); Lord Kelvin's Machine (James Blaylock, 1985); Infernal Devices (K.W. Jeter, 1987); The Difference Engine (William Gibson & Bruce Sterling, 1990).

The Steampunk Bible provides a beautifully-illustrated guide to lead you through all the various ins-and-outs of

the great, wide, weird world of Steampunk!

Chapter 1 – "It's a Clockwork Universe, Victoria" – starts you off with an overview. It even includes a whimsical mathematical formula designed by John Coulthart to provide a tongue- in-cheek "definition" of the genre:

STEAMPUNK = Mad Scientist Inventor [invention (steam x airship or metal man / baroque stylings) x (pseudo) Victorian setting] + progressive or reactionary politics x adventure plot

Chapter 2—"An Imaginary Voyage to the Past"—takes you back through the origins of "steampunk". It provides a really good grounding in the lives and works of Jules Verne and H.G. Wells, as well as supporting background information: the pre-Verne/Wells *contes philosophiques*, Edgar Allan Poe, the Industrial Revolution, the U.S. Civil War, early 20th Century Japanese SF authors (such as Yano Ryukei and Oshikawa Shunro), and the "Edisonades" of the U.S. 19th Century "dime novels".

Chapter 3 - "Clanking Metal Men, Baroque Airships, and Clockwork Worlds" - explores the literature of Steampunk: from its origins in the 1980s (Powers, Blaylock, Jeter, et al) up to the current crop of Steampunk-ish writers (Gail Carriger, George Mann, Cherie Priest, Scott Westerfield, et al) and the comic books and graphic novels (such as Mike Mignola's "Amazing Screw-On Head", Phil & Kaja Foglio's "Girl Genius", or Alan Moore & Kevin O'Neill's "League of Extraordinary Gentlemen"). "The Young Stempunk's Guide to Subgenres" even outlines possible distinctions within Steampunk literature: Boilerpunk, Clockpunk, Dieselpunk, Gaslight Romance, Mannerspunk, Raygun Gothic, and Stitchpunk.

Oh, but wait! There's more to Steampunk than literature! Much, *much* more! And *The Steampunk Bible* leads you there, too.

Chapter 4 – "From Forevertron to the Raygun Rocketship and Beyond" – takes you into the world of artists, craftsmen, and do-it-yourself "activists." There's Forevertron Park (Prairie Du Sac, Wisconsin), a gigantic Steampunk art installation. There's Sean Orlando's full-

sized "Steampunk Tree House," which appeared at the Burning Man Festival (Black Rock City, Nevada, 2007). And there's "Les Machines de L'ile Nantes" Exhibit (2007), featuring the gigantic "Sultan's Elephant," a lumbering Steampunk monstrosity built as a tribute to Jules Verne (who lived in Nantes).

You say you don't just want to "read" or "see" Steampunk – you want to "look" Steampunk? OK, turn to Chapter 5 – "Hair Stays, Goggles, Corsets, Clockwork Guitars, and Imaginary Airships" – which leads you through the world of Steampunk fashion, accessorizing, and role-playing. There's even a guide to "Steampunk music" and related events in the Steampunk subculture.

And how can one talk about Steampunk without considering its appearances in and effect upon movies, animated features, and television? So take a look at Chapter 6 - "Magic Lanterns, Robot Armies, Giant Tuning Forks, and Perambulating Castles." It looks at everything from Disney (20,000 Leagues Under the Sea, 1954) to Georges Méliès (Le Voyage dans la Lune, 1902) to Hayao Miyazaki (Howl's Moving Castle, 2004) to The Wild, Wild West (1965-1969) to Sky Captain and the World of Tomorrow (2004) to Dr. Who episodes (such as the 2008 Christmas Special) and Warehouse 13 (SyFy Channel, 2009 to date). It also got me to go on-line and look up "Jasper Morello and the Lost Airship" (2005). I highly recommend taking a look at this Oscar-nominated short film (26 minutes). Wow! Now that's Steampunk – with a touch of Lovecraft!

And it's all brought to a speculative conclusion in Chapter 7 – "The Future of Steampunk: Will Clockwork Gears, Mechanical Corsets, and Dirigibles Be Enough?"

The Steampunk Bible is a lavishly-illustrated guide to the history and current state of this resurgent F&SF subgenre. If you're at all interested in things Steampunk-ish, then The Steampunk Bible is a "must have." (And if I hadn't read it, I'd never have read the next book I'llbereviewing!)
