Jim and Carl like the new Kia TV commercial featuring dancing hamsters and mechanoids.



Detective Dee and the Mystery of the Phantom Flame

This is the latest offering in Wu Xia films (martial arts adventures). As with so any of them, it's visually stunning – with lots of rock'em-sock'em, flying-fists action. It's also won acclaim and several awards at various film festivals. The storyline is pretty complex and convoluted; but it all makes sense if you pay close attention. The dialog is Mandarin (with a little Spanish thrown in –don't ask) with English subtitles. The special effects are eye-popping; and there's actually a fair amount of F&SF content to it.

The action takes place in China in the year 690 AD. The Empress Wu Zetian – de facto ruler of China for about 30 years (in the name of her husband and sons) - plans to be recognized as sole Emperor in her own right. (Note: She was, in fact, the only female ever to be so recognized.) Opposition and discontent abound. Suddenly, a series of loyal senior officials die horribly and publicly – apparently by spontaneous combustion. Because this threatens to delay Empress Wu's inauguration ceremony, she releases the infamous Detective Dee from prison and convinces him to investigate. Complications, political intrigue, and more

Detective Dee is based on an actual historical character, a Tang Dynasty magistrate and statesman named Di Renjie (c. 630–700 AD). In this film, he's rather more of a martial arts hero than portrayed in the history texts or in the "Judge Dee" detective novels (1946-1967) written by Robert van Gulik.

I quite enjoyed the film. It's on a seriously-limited engagement at the Shirlington arthouse theater. Odds are you'll need to catch it when it comes out on DVD or via Netflix. But I think it'll be worth your while to check it out.



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Illustrated Steampunk from Abrams Image, Part 2 of 2

In last month's LSF newsletter, I reviewed *The Steampunk Bible*, the first part of a two-part review of illustrated steampunk books published by Abrams Image. OK, so here comes Part 2!

Boilerplate: History's Mechanical Marvel by Paul Guinan and Anina Bennett (Abrams Image, 2009)

This book has been around for a couple of years now. I've seen it time and time again on the shelves at various bookstores; but (for some reason or other) I could never get past the cover to look through it. Go figure. (Maybe I mistakenly thought it was a graphic novel, which isn't a literary form that I prefer.)

And then I read *The Steampunk Bible* – and quickly ran off to purchase a copy of *Boilerplate*.

Boilerplate is a brilliant piece of Steampunk (possibly "Gearpunk"?) literature. It purports to be the straightforward history of a mechanical man during the late 19th and early 20th Centuries. I don't think I'd classify it as a work of "alternate history," though, because it's supposedly telling the story of something that actually happened in "our timeline" rather than in some alternate timeline. I think Boilerplate is rather more like "cryptohistory" (aka "hidden history") – it tells the story of something that happened but that very few people know about anymore. (Maybe "forgotten history" would be a better term?)

As stated in the book's Forward:

Boilerplate is one of history's great enigmas, a technological breakthrough that languished in obscurity—until now. Ironically, the robot's fame in years past was part of the problem. Many researchers have been led astray by apocryphal tales of the automaton, and there's confusion about whether Boilerplate existed at all. As a result, historians are reluctant to include the robot in official texts.

But let's be clear on this: Boilerplate is a work of fiction. "Boilerplate" (the fictional Victorian robot) was created in 2000 by artist Paul Guinan. The character was originally intended for comics but became known via Guinan's faux-historical website. For this website, Guinan devised an incredibly detailed history for Boilerplate, expertly interweaving fictional and historical characters. He photoshopped various archival images to illustrate this history, so that the robot appears to be interacting with various historical figures, such as Theodore Roosevelt, Pancho Villa, prizefighter Jack Johnson, and others. Boilerplate (the book) brings the website information (along with photographs and other graphics) into the printed medium and is the creation of Guinan and his wife Anina Bennett. The book is an ingenious piece of work – and wonderfully illustrated!


Here's the back story: Talented amateur (and entirely fictional) scientistengineer Prof. Archibald Campion created his prototype mechanical man (later dubbed "Boilerplate") in the late 1880s. Campion's self-proclaimed purpose for creating a mechanical soldier was "preventing the deaths of men in the conflicts of nations." His inspiration was the death of his beloved brother-in-law during the brief U.S. conflict with Korea in 1871. (Yes, there really was a U.S. Korean Expedition in 1871.) Campion created his automaton in collaboration with fellow scientists Edward Fullerton (pioneer of fuel-cell technology), Nikola Tesla (the genius of electromagnetics), and (the fictional) Frank Reade Jr. (creator of the Steam Man and various other fabulous inventions of the 1870s and 1880s). Campion first exhibited his "Mechanical Marvel" in the Machinery Hall of the 1893 World's Columbian

Exposition in Chicago.

The bulk of the book recounts the history of Prof. Campion and "Boilerplate" from 1893 until the automaton's disappearance in October 1918 during the WWI Battle of the Argonne Forest. At the same time, the reader is treated to an amazing overview of many of the most significant U.S. and world events during this period, including: the U.S. enonomic Panic of 1893; the Pullman Strike of 1894; the annexation of Hawaii by the U.S.; Kitchener's Sudan Campaign of 1896-1898; the Klondike Gold Rush; the construction of the Panama Canal; the Spanish-American War; the Philippine-American War; China's Boxer Rebellion; the Russo-Japanese War; Pancho Villa and the Mexican Revolution; Lawrence of Arabia and WWI's Middle Eastern Front; and WWI's European Front.

The last couple of chapters are also a real treat. "Popular Depictions of Boilerplate" describes all the various forms of(fictional) "Boilerplate memorabilia" in novels, magazines, advertising, early moving pictures, and so on. The final chapter-"Boilerplate's Brethren"-kind'a crosses the line between "our reality" and "the Boilerplate reality." It's a really good overview of mechanical menthat actually appeared in history (such as the chessplaying "Turk" of the 19th Century), popular fiction (the "dime novels" of the late 19th and early 20th Centuries, such as The Steam Man of the Prairies, 1868), and drama (Karel Capek's Rossum's Universal Robots, 1920, in which the term "robot" was coined). The illustrations in this final chapter-reprints from actual period publications – are an absolute delight.

Final comment: Boilerplate: History's Mechanical Marvel is a marvel-ous piece of Steampunk literature. If you're a Steampunk fan, this is another "must have." I'm just sorry I didn't read it years ago.
