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#### **Earth-Sized Exoplanets Discovered**

NASA's Kepler Space Telescope has located a couple of Earthsized planets orbiting Kepler-20, a star 945 light years away. This is the first time planets of this size have been detected in another solar system. Scientists have hailed the technical achievement of detecting Earth-sized "exoplanets" (planets outside our Solar System), as it increases the chances of finding life-bearing worlds.

However, neither of Kepler-20's Earth-sized planets is located within the "habitable zone" (where temperatures are warm enough to allow liquid surface water, which increases the prospects for life). Both planets are believed to be rocky, with a composition of iron and silicate. Kepler-20e (about 0.87 the size of Earth) has an orbital "year" of about 6 days and a surface temperature of 726 C. Kepler-20f (about 1.03 the size of Earth) has an orbital "year" of about 19 days and a surface temperature of 426 C; it might have a thick water-vapor atmosphere.

The Kepler-20 system is known

to contain 5 planets – the other three larger than either Kepler-20e or Kepler-20f. The system doesn't seem to be "set up" like our Solar System. In our system, small rocky planets orbit close to the Sun and large gas giants orbit farther out. In Kepler-20's system, however, the planets are "organized" in alternating sizes: big, little, big little, big. It's not believed that Kepler-20's planets formed in their current locations: they probably formed farther out from the star and then migrated inwards (probably due to interactions with other in-system materials).

The Kepler Space Telescope has located 28 confirmed extrasolar planets so far, as well as thousands of likely "candidate" planets. It identifies "objects of interest" by looking for stars that dim slightly, which can occur when a planet crosses a star's face. To confirm a transiting planet, astronomers also look for the star to wobble as it is gravitationally tugged by its orbiting companion(s).

OK, now that I've got your attention... A current exhibit at the Smithsonian's National Museum of the American Indian (NMAI) brings together rare works of Quileute art. And the Quileutes are the Washington State tribe that served as the inspiration for the shape-shifters (including Jacob) in Stephenie Meyer's "Twilight Saga." (See? There is a connection!)

The exhibit is called "Behind the Scenes: The Real Story of Quileute Wolves" and runs at the NMAI through May 9th in the museum's second-level Sealaska Gallery. Entry to the museum and to the exhibition is free.

No, Quileute tradition does NOT include werewolves (hunky or otherwise). However, the Wolf Society (for warriors) is one of their five secret societies meant to maintain the balance between the human and spirit realms.

The exhibit offers an intimate look into the tribe's artwork and wolf creation stories, which are central to the

Quileute world view. Amongst the artifacts on display are two wolf headdresses from different regions, depictions of wolf ritual dances and shamanistic performances, as well as replicas of items used during various *Twilight* films. It also includes a map of Quileute language place names throughout the Pacific Northwest, a timeline of Quileute history, and a 12-minute video that describes the history and Quileute oral/cultural traditions through interviews with tribal members and teens as they describe the phenomenon and effect of the *Twilight* films in their own words.

NMAI is located at the east end of the National Mall, at 4th Street and Independence Avenue SW (between the Air & Space Museum and the Capitol Building). For more information about NMAI, goto: www.americanindian.si.edu

# Mister Creecher: A Novel in Three Parts by Chris Priestley (Bloomsbury, 2011)

A couple of months ago, I reviewed a YA novel related to Mary Shelley's classic Frankenstein – Kenneth Oppel's This Dark Endeavor: The Apprenticeship of Victor Frankenstein (Simon & Schuster, 2011). Imagine my surprise when I ran across another YA novel based upon the famous Mary Shelleytale. This time, it's not Victor Frankenstein who is the central character, however; now it's the monster's turn. And, unlike Oppel's novel, the events in Chris Priestley's novel Mister Creecher take place some years after the Frankenstein saga has already begun.

It's now 1818. Victor Frankenstein and his friend Henry Clerval have fled from the Continent to England, doggedly followed by Frankenstein's monstrous creation. The monster plans to ensure that his creator lives up to his promise to create a mate for the monster.


One dark night in the bad, bad streets of London, young Billy – orphan, pickpocket, and petty thief – discovers what he believes to be the corpse of a huge and powerfully-built man. As he gets ready to rifle through the man's pockets, Billy is set upon by a gang of murderous street toughs. But, just as Billy is about to be seriously maimed, the "corpse" rises to its feet and tears into the young toughs. Billy is saved. And thus begins his novel-

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long relationship with the frightening man he mistakenly calls "Mister Creecher."

Mister Creecher nurses Billy back to health. What begins as a relationship of convenience becomes a tentative friendship between two outcast misfits. And Mister Creecher convinces the youngster to help him keep track of a mysterious stranger through the streets and alleys of London - and later to accompany Mister Creecher as he trails this stranger across the English countryside, heading toward Scotland. As the story progresses, Billy gradually learns what's going on and discovers the identity of "Mister Creecher" and the reason for his obsession with Victor Frankenstein. Good and evil, truth and lies, "hero" and "villain" – young Billy learns that nothing is ever quite as simple as it seems.

Don't be surprised if Part I of Mister Creecher - which takes place in London-seems to have a rather "Dickensian" flavor. This is deliberate. It's eventually revealed that young Billy is, in fact, Billy Sikes. Does that name ring a bell? Yes, young and naïve Billy grows up to become the murderous Bill Sikes of Charles Dickens's Oliver Twist. (Even Fagin makes an appearance in Mr. Creecher.) In fact, in his "Author's Note" at the end of the novel, Priestley even encourages his readers to turn to Oliver Twist "if you want to know what became of Billy Sikes." I know one particular Amazon reviewer has derided the ending of Mr. Creecher as "rushed, forced, and unfinished." But I think that reviewer ignores the fact that Priestley never intended to tell the *whole* story about either Billy or the Monster in the first place. I think he only intended to fill in that "*terra incognita*" of their lives during which Shelley's and Dickens's characters supposedly "met" – and then to direct his YA readers to the novels *Frankenstein* and *Oliver Twist* "if you want to know what happens next."

Oh, and you're in for a disappointment if you're expecting to see the bolts-in-the-neck, shambling, monosyllabic version of Frankenstein's creation portrayed by Boris Karloff in the classic Universal films. Priestley's "Mister Creecher" is very much the powerful, athletic, vegetarian, well-spoken, and philosophic "Modern Prometheus" originally envisioned by Mary Shelley-with almost translucent skin and a whiff of decaying meat about him. In fact, Priestley has obviously based his novel on a lot of research into the Shelley story. While I don't think it's necessary to have read Frankenstein in order to enjoy Mister Creecher, I can't help but think that a certain amount of knowledge of the original 1818 novel will allow you to appreciate just how ingeniously Priestly has woven that background into his novel. (Even the subtitle of Priestley's novel - A Novel in Three Parts - is a subtle nod to Mary Shelley's novel, which was originally published in three volumes.)

Ireally enjoyed Mister Creecher. If you're a fan of the Frankenstein legend, then I'll just bet you'll enjoy it, too. If you've got a "thing" against hardbacks, then you'll be glad to know it's also available in Kindle – and I'm bettin' it'll come out in a paperback edition sometime in 2012. ΛΨΦ
