Two upcoming events may be of interest to LSFers: The Maryland Renaissance Festival and The National Book Festival. Perhaps some enthusiastic person(s) will organize an LSF outing to one or both events?



The **Maryland Renaissance Festival** will be held on the following weekends: Aug. 24, 25, 31, Sept. 1, 2, 7, 8, 14, 15, 21, 22, 28, 29, and Oct. 5, 6, 12, 13, 19, 20. The Renaissance Festival is located in Crownsville, MD. Set in a fictional 16th-century English village named Revel Grove, the festival is spread over 25 acres of woods and fields. It is the second largest fair in the United States.

There are more than 130 craft shops and 42 food outlets. More than 1,300 participants populate the village: 400 work directly for the

company that runs the fair, 700 work for the other vendors, and 200 are performers on stages or characters throughout the village. The Festival features eight major theaters, four smaller stages in taverns, a children's area, and a jousting tiltyard with seating for 3,000.

Finally, he announced that there's a new ALA bookmark design featuring the cast of *The Big Bang Theory*, and he'll be ordering a batch of them to hand out at next year's Pride Day table.

The Next Doctor (Who?) by Peter Knapp

On August 4th at 2:00 PM, the BBC aired a live special that introduced the next Doctor. The new actor will appear during the 2013 Christmas special, as Matt Smith (the 11th Doctor) regenerates into... Peter Capaldi. Capaldi's first full episode will be shown some time in 2014.

Born 14 April 1958, in Glasgow, Scotland, Peter Capaldi attended drama classes and was accepted into the Glasgow School of Art. While studying there he secured his breakthrough role in *Local Hero* (1983).

He was the lead singer of a punk rock band, Dreamboys, which included Craig Ferguson as the drummer and Temple Clark as the bassist.

He played a character called "W.H.O. Doctor" in *World War Z* (2013) before being cast in the lead role for *Doctor Who*.

Jack Vance 1916 – 2013


I learned at PulpFest that Jack Vance, one of F&SF's Great Ones, had passed away. Vance was an active writer of science fiction, fantasy, and mystery for almost 60 years – even after becoming legally blind in the 1980s. He wrote somewhere between 60 and 90 works – my sources aren't completely certain. In a 2009 profile in *The New York Times Magazine*, he was referred to as "one of American literature's most distinctive and undervalued voices."

Vance's first published story was "The World-Thinker", which appeared in the Summer 1945 issue of *Thrilling Wonder Stories*. But he didn't establish himself as a full-time writer until the 1970s. In the meantime, he worked at such trades as bell-hop, canner, gold dredger, electrician in a naval shipyard, rigger, surveyor, ceramicist, and carpenter. During six years at UC Berkeley, Vance studied mining engineering, physics, journalism, and English – and published jazz reviews for *The Daily Californian*.

It's difficult to point to any particular Vance story as "typical" of his works. The stories he wrote for the Pulps in the 1940s and 1950s covered many science fiction themes, with a tendency to emphasize mystery and biological themes rather than technical themes. (He almost never wrote about robots.) Many of his stories are comic. He was also an original member of the Swordsmen and Sorcerers' Guild of America, a loose-knit group of heroic fantasy authors founded in the 1960s to promote the sword-and-sorcery subgenre.

Vance is probably most famous for a collection of linked stories set in a far-future Earth, when the sun (as well as human civilization) is dying, and magic and weird science exist side-by-side: collected as *The Dying Earth* in 1950. (In many respects, I think Vance set the tone for "the New Weird" long before that F&SF subgenre was conceived in the 1990s.)

Some of my other favorites from his SF works include: *Big Planet* (1957), *The Languages of Pao* (1958), the "Demon Princes" space opera novels (*The Star King*, 1964; *The Killing Machine*, 1964; *The Palace of Love*, 1967; *The Face*, 1979; and *The Book of Dreams*, 1981), *Ports of Call* (1998), and *Lurulu* (his final novel, 2004). His most notable Fantasy novels are probably his "Lyonesse Trilogy": *Suldrun's Garden* (1983), *The Green*



Pearl (1985), and Madouc (1989).

Vance won numerous awards and honors for his works. He won three Hugos, for the SF novels The Dragon Masters (1963) and The Last Castle (1967), and for his memoir This is Me, Jack Vance! (2010) – and a Nebula Award for The Last Castle, too. He received the World Fantasy Award in 1990 for Lyonesse: Madouc. He won an Edgar Award in 1961 for the best first mystery movel, The Man in the Cage. Vance was given a World Fantasy Award for Life Achievement in 1984; the Science Fiction & Fantasy Writers of America made him its 14th Grant Master in 1997; and he was inducted into the Science Fiction Hall of Fame in 2001.
