"Nightmares" Again book Reviews by Carl



[Note: This is the final installment in the series of my reviews of the "creepy" books I read during October 2013.]

The Curse of the Wendigo (2010)
The Isle of Blood (2011)
The Final Descent (2013)
by RickYancey

In the November 2010 LSF newsletter. I reviewed the first volume of a new YA-F&SF series. The Monstrumologist by Rick Yancey. I described it as being a prime example of "edgy" YA and even said: "It's got 'bite.' (Pun intended.)" The second volume (The Curse of the Wendigo) came out later that year, and I happily "devoured" that one, too (once again, pun intended) – but, for some reason or other, I never got around to reviewing it. The long-awaited fourth "Monstrumologist" book was finally issued in October 2013, so I figured this was a clear sign for me to finish the series as part of my 2013 "Halloween read-a-thon."

The series opens in a small Massachusetts town in 1888. Young Will Henry was orphaned when his father died while in the employ of Dr. Pellinore Warthrop, the world's foremost "monstrumologist" (or, as he prefers to term it, "doctor of aberrant biology"). Will Henry becomes Dr. Warthrop's assistant and finds himself entangled in a series of horrifying and ever-so-deadly adventures with (as it says in The Monstrumologist) "life forms generally malevolent to humans and not recognized by science as actual organisms, specifically those considered products of myth and folklore." Or, as Dr. Warthrop

Teresa and David both saw the new "Lego" movie – lots of franchise tie-ins. Teresa noted that the upcoming "Mr. Peabody and Sherman" movie apparently includes fart jokes. Teresa also commented that it appears that the sequel to the film *300* will have significant female characters.

Carl has just finished reading Nicola Griffith's new novel *Hild*. He reported that it is an historical fiction novel – no genre content – and contains a couple of female-female sex scenes.

Avengers 2: Age of Ultron includes Elizabeth Olson as the Scarlet Witch and Aaron Taylor-Johnson as Quicksilver. Still no Wasp in the "Avengers" movies!

FX is adapting John Scalzi's 2012 novel *Red Shirts* into a limited TV series. Seth Rogan is making *The Preacher* (Vertigo's mature-themed comic book series) into a TV series for AMC.

Peter enjoyed watching *Gravity* in 3-D Imax. He also promoted the four-part BBC series about the life of Ian Fleming and the influences that led to him writing the "James Bond" novels. He's not sure how accurate the history is.

Dan liked the *Ender's Game* movie. David says that much of the thematic input of the book was stripped

out – for example, there is no explanation of how the aliens communicate. There was general consensus that the subsequent novel would not make a good movie.

AwesomeCon (April 18-20 at the DC Convention Center) is attracting some high profile guests, including: Billie Piper, comics artist George Perez, *Serenity*'s Ron Glass and Jewel Staite, plus more! And this will only the second year for AwesomeCon!

David attended Arisia con in Boston two weeks ago. He described a group of first-responder nerds called Operation Hammond First Responders. He also travelled up to NYC to see *The Glass Menagerie*, which included Zachary Quinto in the cast.

Season 2 of the popular BBC genre series *In The Flesh* is underway. The premise: the zombie apocalypse comes, but a cure is found and the undead are rehabilitated. But not all of the living welcome back "rotters" with "partially deceased syndrome".

Dan remarked that *Star Trek: Next Gen* was too preachy. Peter generally agreed, but supplied specific exceptions to that premise.

says in *The Final Descent*: "I am an explorer. I carry a lamp into lightless places. I strive against the dark that others may live in the light."

And the creatures that Will Henry and Dr. Warthrop hunt are deadly indeed. Yancey has created some truly innovative monstrosities. For example, *The Monstrumologist* features a ravenous species that's a combination of the *Anthropophagi* ("man-eaters" from medieval cartography) and the *Blemmyae* (headless men from Greco-Roman legend).


In *The Curse of the Wendigo*, Dr. Warthrop and Will Henry head up to Canada in search of *Lepto lurconis* ("gaunt devourer"), aka the Wendigo,

and end up following a trail of blood and death as the ravenous vampiric creature makes its way to New York City. Parallels to Bram Stoker's *Dracula* are inescapable. The Wendigo and Stoker's Immortal Count have a lot in common – even more so when readers are introduced to Warthrop's old mentor Dr. Abram von Helrung, president of the Society of Monstrumology. *The Curse of the Wendigo* also raises the "creepiness and gore" level beyond what is featured in *The Monstrumologist*.

In *The Isle of Blood*, Dr. John Kearns returns. He is an amoral "monster hunter" first seen in *The Monstrumologist*. But Kearns is rather more than that – you've probably heard of his exploits in Victorian London, under the alias "Jack". Now Kearns and Warthrop are each racing across the world – from America, to England, to Italy, to a mysterious island off the coast of the Arabian peninsula – to locate the source of a hideously infectious, zombie-making serum. And the question seems to be: Which one of

them is the more ruthless, more determined to win at all costs? Poor Will Henry finds himself questioning his devotion to Dr. Warthrop and the high-sounding (but hollow?) principles of Monstrumology – and the story becomes a grim exploration of just who and what qualifies for the label of "monster".

The Final Descent is rather different from the previous three novels. Oh, there's a search for a deadly new monster, of course - a supposedly-extinct creature known as T. magnificum - but I don't really think that's the most significant facet of the novel. The Final Descent is the story of Will Henry's continuing "descent" into an ever-increasing moral and philosophical dilemma. Has his always-prickly relationship with the irascible Dr. Warthrop influenced Will Henry in an unexpected direction? Can a young, impressionable mind spend years exploring "the dark side" of both nature and the human psyche without ill effects? Added to this is the fact that Will Henry is growing up and

and falling in love - and surging hormones and jealousy don't make things any easier for him. The format of the story is also very different from the three previous novels - jumping back and forth between diary entries from three different periods of Will Henry's life to illustrate his increasingly unsettled mental state. Many devoted fans of the "Monstrumologist" novels have expressed their dismay at Yancey's conclusion to the series. As Yancey notes in his Acknowledgments: "The Monstrumologist was conceived as one thing and evolved into something quite different." I found the entire series to be a really good read; and I think The Final Descent brings the story of Will Henry to a fascinating - albeit unsettling conclusion. ΛΨΦ
