
What's Inside?

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Anthologies, Ho!

Why the sudden interest in short fiction? Hmmm... I'm not quite sure. I've certainly been reading a lot of novels lately, and maybe I felt the need for a change. Or maybe it was the siren call of that stack of unread, fascinating-looking anthologies. At any rate, off we go...



Dead Man's Hand: An Anthology of the Weird West edited by John Joseph Adams (Titan Books, 2014)

I'm pretty sure I've mentioned that I'm a fan of Weird Westerns: "stories of the Old West infused with elements of science fiction, fantasy, or horror" (to quote the editor's Introduction to this anthology). So how could I pass up this anthology of 23 all-new stories? Especially since it leads off with a story by one of my favorite authors, Joe Lansdale ("Mr. Weird Western" hisself).

Even though the soubriquet "Weird Western" is only a few decades old, the genre has certainly been around for a much longer time. Robert E. Howard wrote some weird Western stories back in the 1930s for example, "The Horror from the Mound" (Weird Tales, May 1932). But, as this anthology amply demonstrates, the genre hasn't been "mined out" yet.

As with many anthologies, I found this one to be a mix of "stories I liked" and "stories I didn't like as much" - but I think there are some real goodies in here. Here are a few of my especial favorites... Alan

Rob described Snow Piercer, an independent post-apocalyptic-themed sci-fi film. All life on the planet has died, except for a lucky few aboard a train, which appears to travel around the globe. While in Maine, Peter and Rob saw the new Tom Cruise film Edge of Tomorrow; they enjoyed the film, except for the ending. They also visited the home of Stephen King.

Other News: Peter passed around the latest Parsec newsletter from the Pittsburgh sci-fi group. Teresa mentioned that the Capital Fringe festival has some genre plays. Dean Foster has written a new tale of Mad Amos Malone (a wandering, larger-than-life mountain-man) Worthless (his rather unusual horse); in "Holy Jingle", Malone is hired to rescue a hapless coach-driver from a powerful Oriental succubus. Rajan Khanna weaves an intricate tale (with a twist at the end) about sorcerous card sharps battling their competitors in a murderous quest for decks of cards imbued with powerful magic ("Second Hand"). Elizabeth Bear's "Madam Damnable's Sewing Circle" is a delightful steampunk-ish story in which a madam and her girls defy a Seattle gangleader to save two brutalized prostitutes from further harm. "Sundown" (by Tobias Buckell) is an unusual alternate history story, with a black lawman and Frederick Douglass (yes, that Frederick Douglass) battling an insidious alien invasion in 1877 Colorado - while hoping (quite literally) that the U.S. Cavalry will come to the rescue. The story I got the most pure enjoyment from, however, was "The Golden Age" by Walter Jon Williams: masked avengers battling equally flamboyant villains (and each other) in Northern California during the wild-and-woolly days of the Gold Rush. What a romp! (Eat your hearts out, Zorro and Batman, 'cause you ain't got nothin' on these heroes!)

Some of the stories in *Dead Man's Hand* weren't exactly what I was expecting in a collection of Weird Western stories; but, on the whole, I think any fan of the genre will get a kick out of this anthology.



Black Pulp

edited by Tommy Hancock, Gary Phillips, & Morgan Minor (Pro Se Press, 2013)



I discovered this anthology purely by accident, as I was surfing around Amazon.com. It looked interesting, especially since the Introduction was written by Walter Mosley (one of my favorite authors). I couldn't help but be intrigued by a collection of 12 all-new stories written in the manner of classic Pulp fiction — with an added fascinating twist: all the stories in *Black Pulp* feature black protagonists.


I've always been a big fan of F&SF from the Pulp Era. Sure, a lot of less-than-wonderful stuff made it into print during those years – but the Pulps also saw the rise of some of my favorite authors: Dashiell Hammett, Sax Rohmer, C.L. Moore, Robert E. Howard, H.P. Lovecraft, Harold Lamb, and Leigh Brackett, just to name a few. The Pulps weren't intended to be Great Literature. Walter Mosley describes the function of Pulp fiction this way:

"Literature for the masses kindled the imagination and used our reading skills so that we could regale ourselves in the cold chambers of alienation and poverty. We could become Doc Savage or The Shadow, Conan the Barbarian or the brooding King Kull and make a difference in a world definitely gone wrong."

And, ya know, the "New Pulp" stories in this anthology are (on the whole) pretty faithful to the best traditions of my favorite Pulp Era writers. Action, adventure, intrigue, and (yes) sometimes questionable morality. (I've mentioned my interest in *noir* fiction, too, haven't I?)

I was surprised to find that all but three of the stories in this anthology are in some fashion F&SFrelated. However, even the three exceptions deal with very important Pulp Era subjects: crime fiction and Westerns. (Joe Lansdale's "Six Finger Jack" and Gar Anthony Hopwood's "A Seat at the Table" are both stories of gangland assassinations and betrayals. And Ron Fortier's "The Lawman" is a fictionalized retelling of some of the events in the life of real-life U.S. Deputy Marshall Bass Reeves, who died in 1910. All three of these stories are *excellent!*)

The other nine stories in this anthology all deal with F&SF themes: everything from a lost African city and a dark god ("Drums of the Ogbanje" by Mel Odom) to a black Tarzan analog ("Mtimu" by Charles Saunders), and from superhero crimefighters ("Black Wolfe's Debt" by D. Alan Lewis) to a boxer and a blasphemous cult in 1930s Hollywood ("Decimator Smith and the Fangs of the Fire Serpent" by Gary Phillips). Even the one story that's set outside the expected Pulp milieu - Michael Gonzales's "Jaguar and the Jungleland Boogie", set in 1980s Harlem definitely reflects its antecedents amongst the masked crimefighter stories of the Pulp Era. Lots of fun.
