MOVIE NEWS: Peter enjoyed the movie *Inside Out*, especially the anthropomorphizing of the main character's emotions. Peter said that the Marvel Cinematic Universe is ahead of the DC movie universe; but DC might have the first female lead superhero movie. Lots of discussion about the rumored (and long-anticipated) Wonder Woman movie. Neill Blomkamp, the director of District 9, is also directing a new Alien movie starring Sigourney Weaver. Carl says he enjoyed Jurassic World, despite the unexplained "retro" dinosaurs. Peter reported that most of the ten US topgrossing movies are F&SF genre. Robert O'Brien's Z for Zachariah has been made into a film starring Chris Pine, set to come out in August; a disaster has left most of civilization dead, leaving only a few people to survive. The Martian, the new movie starring Matt Damon as an astronaut stranded on the Red Planet, looks good; it's based on the recent novel by Andy Weir. The plot of the new movie Self/Less is reportedly predictable. (Yawn!) The new Man from UNCLE movie might actually have sci-fi content. Peter and Carl plan to see the new Ian McKellan film Mr. Holmes this week at a special AARP showing.

TV NEWS: The spinoff series based on Walking Dead will air its first episode on Sunday, August 23rd. Philip K. Dick's classic novel The Man in the High Castle – Japan and Nazi Germany have occupied the US - is being made into a TV series by Amazon Studios. AMC's eight-part series Humans (based upon a Swedish sci-fi drama called Real Humans) has just premiered - AI servants in a parallel present-day world. SyFy's Killjoys and Dark Matter have darkthemed formats and sets similar to Firefly/Serenity. Dan reported that DC/ Vertigo's Preacher is coming to the small screen; and Image Comics' The Authority may also be adapted for TV. Xena says she is enjoying Hannibal.

OTHER: Dan reported that he enjoyed Michael Crichton's 2001 posthumously-completed novel *Micro* (completed by Richard Preston), which has parallels to Asimov's *Fantastic Voyage*. Peter passed around some free comics he received at AwesomeCon. He also announced WashingCon, a tabletop gaming con to be held at the Westminster Presbyterian Church (401 "I" St SW) on Saturday, September 12th. Carl highly recommends the interactive "Indiana Jones and the Adventure of Archaeology" exhibit at the National Geographic Museum.

AND NOW FOR SOME-THING COMPLETELY DIFFER-ENT: Peter played a number of fascinating videos for us: a trailer for *Superman vs. Batman: Dawn of Justice*, which includes Wonder Woman; a trailer for *Star Wars: The Force Awakens;* a preview of *Doctor Who*'s next season; and two short, funny Strongbow Apple Hard Cider commercials featuring Patrick Stewart. Finally, have you watched any of the Google Deep Dream videos? We did. Hallucinogenic and totally creepy.

The Soul of an Octopus: A Surprising Exploration into the Wonder of Consciousness by Sy Montgomery

It's certainly been a long time since I last reviewed a non-fiction book in the LSF newsletter. I just couldn't pass up *this* book! Not only did I find it fascinating, but I think it also has lots of resonances for SF fans.


One of the staples of the SF genre is the "alien intelligence" story, where Humans contact an alien race and then try (often unsuccessfully) to figure out "how the aliens think". (I'm sure you can easily think of half a dozen examples right off the bat.) Well, we don't need "a five-year mission" into space to find one; we've got a truly "alien intelligence" right here on Earth: the octopus. And we're only just beginning to figure out some of how their minds work.

Yes, Virginia, octopuses have "minds". (By the way, "octopi" is an incorrect plural form.) In fact, they seem to have the ability to ascribe thoughts to other creatures, thoughts that might differ from their own. This is called "theory of mind", which is an important component of consciousness because it implies self-awareness. Octopuses are, in fact, intelligent. But, unlike most of the other non-human animals that we consider "intelligent" such as chimpanzees, elephants, parrots, and whales - octopuses are not vertebrates; they're mollusks (related to clams and snails). Also, unlike intelligent vertebrates, octopuses are shortlived and (on the whole) notoriously solitary creatures. In fact, octopuses developed their complex brains (and eyes) by a very different path from all us vertebrates. The closest common ancestor of humans and octopuses was a primitive, tube-shaped creature that

lived so long ago that neither brains nor eyes had yet evolved. "Short of Martians showing up and offering themselves up to science," the author quotes neuroscientist Cliff Ragsdale (University of Chicago) as saying, "cephalopods are the only example outside of vertebrates of how to build a complex, clever brain."

As it turns out, the octopus brain is even more different from ours. Human brains have four lobes: octopus brains have 50-75 different lobes. Yes, humans have about 100 billion neurons, and octopuses have only about 300 million; but a surprising three-fifths of an octopus's neurons are located in its arms, not in its brain. In fact, the arms seem to be caindependent pable of thought! (Shades of Doctor Octopus in Spiderman 2!!)

In The Soul of an Octopus, naturalist Sy Montgomery leads the reader through a series of her encounters with a number of octopuses, both in sea-quariums and in the wild. Her narrative includes discussions with and research from a number of other naturalists, animal psychologists, neuroscientists, aquarists, and others. In addition to all the evolutionary and physiological information about octopuses and other cephalopods, she provides a number of surprising revelations: octopuses dream, play, and use tools (although they don't actually make tools). Despite being primarily solitary and short-lived animals, they are curious and exploratory; and they are famously able to learn how to solve multi-step problems.



But The Soul of an Octopus isn't simply a compendium of "goshgee-wow!" factoids about octopus intelligence - it's got a lot of "heart" to it, too. Despite all her attempts to avoid anthropomorphizing the animals she studied, Ms. Montgomery couldn't help but become emotionally attached to several octopuses she has known at the New England Aquarium in Boston: Athena, Octavia, Kali, and Karma. Starting from the same basic level of ignorance and misunderstandings about octopuses that most people have, she finds herself developing "a deeper understanding of what it means to think, to feel, and to know."



As I was reading this fascinating book, I kept having SF-related thoughts (some of which I've already mentioned). For example, there was that wonderful 2002 documentary The Future Is Wild (available on DVD), which purported to show how life could evolve if, for whatever reason, humans and many other larger mammals and birds disappeared. One of its 13 episodes featured an intelligent treeswinging octopus-creature that lives among the mangrove swamps. (Did you know that some contemporary octopuses have come out of the water after prey? And that they can survive for about 10-15 minutes out of water?) And then there's H.G. Wells and the Martians he featured in both his 1897 novel The War of the Worlds and his 1897 short story "The Crystal Egg". Even knowing as little as he did about cephalopods, is Wells really so far off the mark when he says of his octopuslike Martians that they possessed "intellects vast and cool and unsympathetic [and] regarded this earth with envious eyes, and slowly and surely drew their plans against us"? After reading The Soul of an Octopus, I can't help but wonder. Good book!
