Mars and Venus "The Way They Were" - Part 2 -



A couple of months ago, I reviewed the first of two "old planet" anthologies edited by George R.R. Martin and Gardner Dozois. That was *Old Mars*, an anthology of short stories harking back to the era when classic F&SF authors wrote stories set on a Mars that was a dying, desert planet filled with native lifeforms and Earthly adventurers. Now it's Venus's turn.

Old Venus

Several years after Old Mars, Martin and Dozois put together this companion volume: 16 stories set amidst the ultra-humid swamps and dinosaur-infested jungles of "old Venus", including contributions by such well-known writers as Allen Steele, Joe Haldeman, David Brin, Garth Nix, Elizabeth Bear, Joe Lansdale, Mike Resnick, and Ian McDonald. This time, as Gardner Dozois says in his Introduction ("Return to Venusport"), they wanted "stories set in the kind of nostalgic, habitable Venus... before the hard facts gathered by space probes blew those dreams away." I can't say I was ever as much a fan of the Venusian planetary romances as I was of their Martian relatives; but I must admit that I quite enjoyed this anthology, too.

I was surprised to see that this time several stories contain LGBTO elements. "The Drowned Celestial" by Lavie Tidhar is an action-adventure story, in which a hard-bitten Earth explorer is pitted against a vengeful god-monster from a lost Venusian civilization. (The hero becomes more than just a friend to his male Venusian guide.) Eleanor Arnason weaves a tale of international intrigue carried over onto Venus in her story "Ruins". An Earth journalist is asked to lead a National Geographic expedition in search of Venusian megafauna; but they find themselves up to their necks in mud, slime, and "dark ops" operations. (Se-



veral secondary characters are shown as comprising same-gender couples.) Garth Nix ("By Frogsled and Lizardback to Outcast Venusian Lepers") tells the story of an ex-soldier who is forced by the Terran Space Navy to join a rescue mission into the most impenetrable part of the Venusian swamps; he discovers he must bodily mix with the local flora and fauna in order to survive. (Some ex-militaryturned-lizardranchers in the outback are female-female "life partners".) Finally, in Elizabeth Bear's "The Heart's Filthy Lesson", an Earth scientist out in the Venusian wilds is attempting to prove her theory about "aboriginal Cytherean settlement patterns", at risk to life and limb. (She's had a yearslong rocky relationship with her female "romantic and professional partner".)

Here are some of my other fa-In Allen Steele's "Frogheads", a tough private investigator is sent to Venus to find his wealthy client's son somewhere in the trackless cloud-shrouded Venusian world-ocean. Paul McAuley ("Planet of Fear") spins a tale of biological terror amongst the miners on Venus's equatorial continent. Mike Resnick's "The Godstone of Venus" is a good old-fashioned planetary romance, featuring the same Indiana Jones-like adventurer as in his Old Mars story "In the Tombs of the Martian Kings". Now he's after fabulous riches in the Venusian jungles. Ian McDonald's fascinating and unique story - "Botanica Veneris: Thirteen Papercuts by Ida Countess Rathangan" – brings the anthology to a satisfying conclusion. In this story, a young researcher attempts to determine the fate of a famous artist who disappeared some 50 years previously during her only visit to Venus, using the artist's diaries, sketchbooks, and field notes to trace her route among the turbulent native civilizations. 
