American Myths and Legends

two reviews by Carl

Here are a couple of delightful Fantasy books set in the great American wilderness in bygone days.

Six-Gun Snow White by Catherynne M. Valente (Saga Press, 2015)

This first selection is a classic fairy tale as reimagined by the talented Catherynne M. Valente. It's the story of Snow White re-set in the Wild West (or, more accurately, the Weird Wild West) of the early 1860s.

"Mr. H" is a miner and entrepreneur who has made himself into a wealthy and powerful man. (From internal evidence, it would seem that Valente's "Mr. H" is based on George Hearst, father of millionaire newspaper publisher William Randolph Hearst.) One day, while Mr. H is trading with the Crow Indians in the Dakota Territories, he falls in love (more probably "in lust") with a beautiful maiden named Gun That Sings. He pretty much buys Gun That Sings from her family; but then he actually marries her - although he never announces this marriage to his family or business associates. Soon afterwards, Gun That Sings dies while giving birth to a beautiful daughter.

Mr. H loves his daughter (whose name we never learn) "after a kind" - he raises and educates her lavishly (but privately) in his "slowly growing castle by the sea". But, as we all know must happen with ambitious, wealthy men, Mr. H marries again: this time to a coldly beautiful socialite from the East. Also predictably, the new Mrs. H doesn't get along well with Mr. H's daughter – in fact, she considers her half-breed step-daughter to be barely human. She constantly mistreats the girl while ostensibly trying to "civilize" and "humanize" her. (This is, in part, understandable, since Mrs. H was herself brutalized by her own mother while being trained for a life in Society.) And Mrs. H even gave her stepdaughter a name: "She named me a thing I could aspire to but never become, the one thing I was not and could never be: Snow White."

Eventually, the situation becomes more intolerable (not to say dangerous) than Snow White can bear. "So this is what happens: Girl gets her gun, puts on a man's clothes, steals a horse, and lights out for Indian Territory." She is eventually pursued by Mrs. H's supernaturallyengendered son "Charming".

Time and time again, Valente brilliantly re-frames the Snow White story in a delightfully unexpected way. Snow White's six-shooter is named "Rose Red". Mrs. H's magical powers (including her mirror "so full up of dark") are based on Eastern "Puritan magic" and a pact she made with a dark spirit in the woods. I was particularly delighted with Valente's version of the Seven Dwarves: a band of rather unique outlaws in the town of Oh-Be-Joyful, Montana Territory. (I won't tell you any more about them – I don't want to spoil the surprise.)

Six-Gun Snow White is another triumph for Valente; and I highly recommend it.

Fearsome Creatures of the Lumberwoods: 20 Chilling Tales from the Wilderness by Hal Johnson (Workman Publishing Co., 2015)

I ran across this one accidentally on a "specialty items" table in the local B&N. However, this cute little book isn't *exclusively* set in the "Wild West" (Weird or not) – it's based on the folklore from a combination of various American forested locations: whether in the West, the Northwest, or the swamps of the Deep South. It's a real hoot – sly and urbanely witty from start to finish.

The book purports to be a description of 20 fearsome creatures that inhabit the Great American "out back", as written by "one of the last

surviving cryptozoologists". It's also a retelling – or, as the author/editor says, "a reimagining" – of an actual work by William Cox published in 1910, and still available on-line:

Although Cox appears to have conceived his work as a serious compilation of American folklore, Hal Johnson has clearly intended his "update" as a work of humorous entertainment. Consider the following excerpt from its front matter (entitled "Dear Reader"):

...I am a cryptozoologist and, if I do say so myself, at or near the forefront of my field. So many colleagues have been eaten by chimeras, incinerated by salamanders, or pecked to death by barnacle geese; there is not necessarily much competition left... The focus of my study has been the lumberwoods of North America, a land still wild and untamed at the margin, populated only by lumberjacks and their mortal enemies, the cruel trees that once tyrannized this land — and, of course, by fearsome creatures.

In addition to Mr. Johnson's tongue-in-cheek descriptions of encounters with various fantastical creatures, the book is packed with wild and amusing black-and-white illustrations by artist Tom Mead.

As a final comment, I couldn't help but notice that Johnson's work has an interesting element in common with another famous American humorist and teller-of-tall-tales: Mark Twain. Johnson can't seem to go more than a few pages without taking a snide shot at the French (or, indeed, several other European nationalities). By way of belated explanation, Johnson has this to say about Cox's original 1910 work: "Readers should be aware that the book contains racism above and beyond what one might expect from that era and approach it accordingly." Indeed?

To repeat myself, I found Johnson's *Fearsome Creatures of the Lumberwood* to be an absolute delight; and I'm so very glad I stumbled across a
