Millionaires in Space!


On Feb. 27th, SpaceX (Elon Musk's space company) announced plans for a ground-breaking mission, flying two private citizens on a trip around the Moon in late 2018. The release stated: "They have already paid a significant deposit to do a moon mission." (If the experience of Richard Garriott is any indicator, it was probably a "significant" amount of money indeed. Garriott paid \$30 million to spend 12 days on the International Space Station in 2008.)

SpaceX's "Dragon 2" spacecraft will apparently launch from the same launch pad at the Kennedy Space Center used by the Apollo program. This flight, however, will not orbit the Moon like Apollo 8 did – instead, it'll fly close to the lunar surface ("for a spectacular photo op") and then use the Moon's gravity to slingshot itself back to Earth in a "free-return trajectory". (This is what Apollo 13 did after being crippled by an explosion.) The whole trip is planned to take about 6 or 7 days.



The names of the "space tourists" have not yet been announced, pending confirmation of health and fitness tests to be conducted; and initial training will begin later this year. Said Elon Musk: "There will be training for emergency procedures." (I should hope so, since they'll apparently be riding a "fully autonomous" version of the Dragon 2 spacecraft no human pilot.) When reporters asked Musk about the mission's risks, he responded: "I think they're going in with their eyes open, knowing that there is some risk here. We're doing everything we can to minimize that risk, but it's not zero."

Rob reported that the 2017 Hugo 2017 nominations have been announced. The "dramatic" nominations include an episode of *Black Mirror*, a *Doctor Who* episode, and some *Game of Thrones* episodes. There appear to be a few Sad Puppies titles among the nominees. How much drama will there be at this year's Hugo announcements in Helsinki?

LSF's upcoming panel at Awesome Con is called "Beyond Labels: Finding Intersections in Fandom". It was also reported that Geeks Out! has teamed up with Awesome Con to host a gay track called Pride Alley: a spotlight on queer authors, etc. LSF has paid for its table at this year's DC Pride Festival in June. There will be an LSF Gaming Party on the day of the Pride Parade; and the LSF post-Pride event will occur two weeks after Pride.

Peter displayed his "bigger, blacker box" of *Cards Against Humanity*. Do you know about the Cryptozoology and Paranormal Society, headquartered in Alexandria VA? (UFO's and Bigfoot... got it?) Peter passed around the latest issue of *Parsec* (from a Pittsburgh PA scifi group).

TV News: Karl likes The People of Earth, a comedy series about an alien abductee support group. Dan spoke favorably about Dimension 404, an anthology horror series reminiscent of The Twilight Zone. Teresa is enjoying The Magicians, and Rob loves The Expanse! The third and final season of The Leftovers is coming out soon. The new Twin Peaks series is due out in May.

Film News: Ghost in the Shell has had mixed reviews. Rob was unimpressed and claimed that the thematic core of the anime was gutted in the movie. (Don't look for a sequel.) According to Dan, M. Night Shyamalan's latest movie Split has a genre reference at the end. Mi-

chael Crichton's novel *Micro* is being made into a movie. Teresa says she wants to see Colossal, a new sci-fi comedy movie starring Anne Hathaway. (The giant monster on the other side of the world moves whenever Anne Hathaway's character moves.)
