Rob attended this weekend's well-attended WashingCon gaming con. He played *Mystic Vale* and *Pathogenesis*. There were also panels about game design.

Carl described *The Technol*ogists by Matthew Pearl, author of *The Dante Club*: an historical thriller in 19th-century Boston, with MIT students attempting to stave off citywide destruction by an unknown enemy. Carl also mentioned that he's seen – and enjoyed – a couple of episodes of *Con Man*, which features many *Firefly* actors.

There was discussion on the Voynich Manuscript – a mostly plagiarized medieval treatise about women's health. No code, but just Latin shorthand. (As a side note, Linear A is currently undeciphered.)

Tonight is the premiere of Fox's *The Orville*, a *Star Trek* homage/parody starring Seth McFarlane, which has received unfavorable reviews.

For those of my friends who are not in the comics community, you may not realize that just a few names are behind the creation of a large percentage of the characters that become popular beyond comics. You've probably heard of Stan Lee, maybe Jack Kirby, possibly Steve Ditko. But Alan Moore, Marv Wolfman, Frank Miller, Mark MIllar, Len Wein you're less likely to have heard of.... but if it's on the big screen or the small, odds are good that at least one of the men on that list had a hand in it... and up until today, all but Jack Kirby were still with us, which means that most comics creators have had a chance to know at least some of these guys.

Len Wein, who just passed on, was one of the ones I knew. He was an amiable chap, lived locally, and I'd run into him from time to time, in line for the movies or some such. He wasn't hard to recognize, with his scraggly facial hair, usually wearing a jeans jacket with some of his characters. He tended toward the upbeat, at least when I ran into him. We'd talk about pop culture; he was not one of those guys who turned off his love for it when there wasn't money at hand.

While he was writing the Incredible Hulk comic, Len co-created Wolverine - you know, that guy who has now been the sole lead of three major motion pictures. When Len was charged with revitalizing the X-Men, he introduced other new characters like Colossus, Storm, and Nightcrawler. He co-created Swamp Thing, who has had two movies and two TV series so far. Even his Human Target series, relatively obscure even within the comics world, spawned two live-action prime time shows.

Granted, outside media exploitation is not an inherent measure of how good a comics writer is. But Len's writing was solid. He knew how to set up characters, he knew how to pay off on what was special about those characters. It's not at all surprising that his material translated beyond the medium.

Len's influence will not dis-
appear from the culture anytime soon.I just wish he were still here to enjoy
it. $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$

Jerry Pournelle 1933 – 2017

A Remembrance by Y^e Olde Editor

Jerry Pournelle was a science fiction writer, essayist, and journalist who contributed for many years to the computer magazine *Byte*. (I've never read any of his technology articles and essays; but I'm sure that doesn't surprise any of you.)

It's difficult for me to write about Pournelle with any degree of objectivity. I didn't know him well; but I had met him a few times over the years



the years. I found him to be a "difficult" person to deal with – and this opinion was certainly not unique to me. He was sometimes quoted as describing his politics as "somewhere to

the right of Genghis Khan". (Oddly enough, he was opposed to the Gulf War and the Iraq War, maintaining that the money would be better spent developing U.S. energy technologies.) He certainly wasn't known as a friend of the LGBTQ community.

Pournelle often cited how he'd "swung a sword in the Society for Creative Anachronism". As Jerome Robert of McKenna, he'd certainly been involved with the SCA from its very earliest days and even served as a Knight Marshall for the Kingdom of the West (1972-1976). He was, however, bitter about never having been knighted for his services to Kingdom and Society; and those of us in Southern California have "mixed" memories about Laird Jerome Robert "Couldn't Kill Him with a Battleax" McKenna.

All that aside, however, Jerry Pournelle was one of my favorite SF authors. I've always considered his military SF (such as his "Falkenberg's Legion" stories and his "Kzinti" stories) to be top-notch. *King David's Spaceship* (1981) and *West of Honor* (1976) are a couple of my favorite novels.

In the mid-1970s, Pournelle began a wildly successful series of collaborations with his longtime friend Larry Niven. The Mote in God's Eye (1975 – a first contact story) and Lucifer's Hammer (1977 – a planetary disaster novel) are simply some of the best SF going. Footfall (1985 – an alien invasion novel) even reached the number one spot on the New York Times Best Seller List. Pournelle and Niven also partnered with Steven Barnes to write another of my favorite novels: Fallen Angels (1991), a near-future, climate-change novel featuring sci-fi fans as the heroes.

Finally, I've always admired



Cassini-Huygens Oct. 1997 - Sept. 2017

Last month, the *Cassini* unmanned robotic spacecraft was commanded to fly into Saturn's upper atmosphere and burn up, ending its almost-20-year mission. Its signal was lost on September 15.

The *Cassini-Huygens* mission (commonly called "Cassini") was a collaboration between NASA, the European Space Agency, and the Italian Space Agency to send a probe to study the planet Saturn and its system. Originally, the mission was planned to last four years, but was extended two additional times.

Cassini was launched from Cape Canaveral on October 15, 1997, aboard a Titan IVB/Centaur rocket. The *Cassini* space probe performed two gravitational-assist fly-bys of Venus in April 1998 and June 1999, providing it with enough momentum to travel all the way to the asteroid belt, at which point the Sun's gravity pulled it back into the inner Solar System. In August 1999, *Cassini* made a gravitational-assist fly-by of Earth and headed back out. In January 2000, it performed a fly-by of asteroid 2685 Masursky.

Cassini made its closest approach to Jupiter in December 2000. About 26,000 images of Jupiter, its

Pournelle's advocacy during the Bush years of re-useable single-stage-toorbit (SSTO) technologies. Many of us had high hopes for the McDonnell Douglas DC-X ("the Delta Clipper") and its kin. < sigh > (By the way, the Delta Clipper makes a "guest appearance" in *Fallen Angels.*) $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$ rings, and its moons were taken during this 6-month fly-by.

On October 10, 2003, the mission's science team announced the results of tests firmly supporting Einstein's general theory of relativity. Radio waves had been transmitted from *Cassini*; and scientists measured a frequency shift in the radio waves to and from the spacecraft as they passed close to the Sun.

In 2004, *Cassini* entered the Saturn system. In December 2004, *Cassini* released the *Huygens* probe, which entered Titan's atmosphere in January of that year and deployed its fully-instrumented robotic laboratory by parachute to the surface.

Cassini discovered two new Saturnian moons in 2004 (Methone and Polydeuces), another in 2005 (Daphnis), another in 2007 (Anthe), and another in 2009 (Aegaeon). In September 2005, it detected spokes in Saturn's rings. In March 2007, JPL announced that it had found strong evidence of seas of methane and ethane in the northern hemisphere of Titan.

Cassini's "Grand Finale" involved a series of close Saturn passes (April – Sept. 2017), ending with an entry into Saturn's atmosphere to destroy the spacecraft (and prevent possible biological contamination to any of the Saturnian moons thought to possibly be habitable).

For all you number-crunchers: the *Cassini-Huygens* mission traveled 4.9 billion million miles since launch, collected 635 GB of science data, and took 453,048 images. It has been described by the JPL as "a mission of firsts".
