Julian May 1931 – 2017

Julian May passed away on October 17th. She was a multi-talented author who wrote books in the sciencefiction, fantasy, horror, science, and children's genres. She is perhaps most famous for her "Saga of the Pliocene Exiles" series.

May's first professional fiction sale was the 1950 short story "Dune Roller", which appeared in an issue of *Astounding Science Fiction* in 1951, accompanied by her own original interior illustrations. After selling one more short story to *Thrilling Wonder Stories* ("Star of Wonder", 1953), May dropped out of the science fiction field for several years.

Starting in 1954, she wrote thousands of science encyclopedia articles for various publishers. Between 1956 and 1981, she (under her own name and various pseudonyms) wrote more than 250 books (mostly non-fiction) for children and young adults.

Julian May was a long-time and distinguished member of Fandom. She met her future husband – editor, anthologist, and publisher Ted Dikty – in 1951 at a sci-fi convention in Ohio. (She married him in 1953.) In 1952, May chaired the 10th World Science Fiction Convention in Chicago, becoming the first woman to chair a worldcon. In 1957, May and Dikty founded Publication Associates, a production and editorial service for small publishers.

After a couple of decades hiatus, May returned to Fandom during the early 1970s. At Westercon 29 (Los Angeles, 1976) she wore "an elaborate diamond-encrusted space suit" she designed for the costume show. She soon started accumulating a folder of ideas for what would become the "Galactic Milieu" series. starting with Intervention (1987). And in 1978, she began writing what would become her famous "Pliocene Exiles" series: starting with The Many-Colored Land (1981) and continuing through 5 more novels. From 1977 through 1982 (under the name Ian Thorne), she also wrote nine monster-film-related novels, such as Frankenstein Meets Wolfman (1981).

In August 2015, Julian May and her late husband were inducted into the First Fandom Hall of Fame in a ceremony at the 73rd World Science Fiction Convention (Spokane, WA).

What Color Is a Dinosaur (Egg)? by Carl (with additional info

from Wayne #1)

[Ed. Note: This is a continuation of an article from the November issue of the newsletter: "What Color Is a Dinosaur?"]

In October 2017, Jasmina Wiemann and her colleagues published research results on the color of dinosaur *eggs*. Fossil dinosaur nests and eggs are fairly common in certain Late Cretaceous sites in the deserts of Mongolia and China. When looked at with the naked eye, these eggs have a blackish/brownish color. But was that their *original* color?

Wiemann and her colleagues sampled fossilized eggs from three oviraptor nests and analyzed them with a technique called liquid chromatography-mass spectrometry, which separates the chemical components of a mixture and identifies them based on their molecular mass. To confirm that the pigments aren't the result of contamination from an outside source – such as bacteria in the surrounding sediments – a sample of the surrounding fossil matrix was also analyzed.



The eggshell chromatograms show two major peaks, indicating the presence of two different molecules: protoporphyrin IX (for a reddish-brown color) limited to the outermost eggshell layer and biliverdin (for a green-blue color) throughout the inner core layer of the eggshell. Based on these peaks and on known concentrations in emu shells (which have blue-green eggs), they calculated the concentration of pigments in the fossil eggshells. In all three fossil samples, the concentration of biliverdin is higher than that of protoporphyrin, which suggests that these oviraptor eggs were originally blue-green in color – possibly to blend into concealing vegetation deposited on the nest. Modern-day emus and cassowaries lay blue-green eggs and cover their nests with leaves and vegetation.

But there's another fascinating possibility. In living birds. blue-green eggs are associated with paternal care and communal nesting. It seems that biliverdin is an antioxidant and its presence in the eggshell may signal the health of the female. If this is the case, more colorful eggs would represent more healthy females, and males are expected to contribute more to raising offspring resulting from such colorful eggs. Paternal care and communal nesting have been inferred based on the large clutch size laid by oviraptors and related species; and the presence of blue-green oviraptor eggs might provide additional evidence for this. Emus and cassowaries lay dark blue-green eggs and practice communal nesting, in which several females built a nest, lay their eggs in it, and all participate in incubation, defense, and food delivery. Communal nesting is difficult to test in fossil animals; but a preliminary unpublished 2015 study has identified chemical signatures of several maternal individuals in oviraptor nests.

So, this is the first time that scientists have reconstructed the color of dinosaur eggs. It not only pushes the existence of colored eggs from modern birds all the way back to theropod dinosaurs of the Cretaceous – it also lends support to certain theories about dinosaur behavior (at least in some species). $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$
