

Kate Wilhelm 1928 – 2018

... [Kate Wilhelm] and Damon [Knight] helped Robin Wilson found the Clarion workshops and for more than twenty years they taught the final two weeks. I saw Kate in action once, about ten years ago, and marveled at her ability to analyze a story and gently but firmly bring out the weaknesses in a constructive manner. It is no wonder that writers can quote her twenty years later. It is no wonder that the roster of writers she helped foster includes such luminaries as Kim Stanley Robinson, George Alec Effinger, Nina Kiriki Hoffman, Robert Crais, Nicola Griffith, Lucius Shepard, and dozens more. In the year 2000, all four winners of the Nebula Award for fiction were former students of Kate's.

Kate Wilhelm was a multitalented writer, with a long and distinguished career in the science-fiction, fantasy, and mystery genres. Her first published short fiction was "The Pint-Size Genie" (Fantastic, October 1956); but her first accepted story, "The Mile-Long Spaceship", was published the following year by John W. Campbell in Astounding Science Fiction (April 1957). Ten of her speculative fiction stories were published during 1958 and 1959. Her first published novel was a murder mystery (More Bitter Than Death, 1963); and her first published SF novel was The Clone (1965), a finalist for the Nebula Award. Her works have been published in Quark, Orbit, The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction, Locus, Amazing Stories, Asimov's Science Fiction, Fantastic, Omni, Astounding Science Fiction, and Cosmopolitan.

In addition to F&SF works, Wilhelm also wrote 30 murder/mystery/suspense novels and had stories published in *Alfred Hitchcock's Mystery Magazine* and *Ellery Queen's Mystery Magazine*.

In 1962, Kate divorced her first husband (Joseph Wilhelm, married 1947); and the following year she married author/editor Damon Knight. Wilhelm and Knight mentored many authors over the years and helped to establish the Clarion Writers' Workshop and the Milford Writer's Workshop. They were the Guests of Honor at the 1980 Worldcon (Noreascon 2, Boston). After Knight's death in 2002, Wilhelm continued to host monthly workshops until her death.

The Nebula Award trophy (designed by J.A. Lawrence) was based on a sketch by Wilhelm. She herself won three Nebula Awards for short fiction: "The Planners" (1969), "Forever Yours, Anna" (1988), and "The Girl Who Fell into the Sky" (1987). Her novel Where Late the Sweet Birds Sang won the Hugo, the Locus, and the Jupiter (from science fiction instructtors) Awards in 1977 (as well as garnering Nebula and John W. Campbell Memorial Award nominations). In 2006, she won another Hugo (best related book) and Locus (best nonfiction) for Storyteller: Writing Lessons and More from 27 Years of the Clarion Writers' Workshop.

Kate Wilhelm was inducted into the Science Fiction Hall of Fame in 2003. In 2009, she received one of the three inaugural Solstice Awards by the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America, recognizing "significant impact on the science fiction or fantasy landscape"; and in 2016, SF-WA re-named it as the Kate Wilhelm Solstice Award.




