It was a large meeting: 13 people attended; a mixture of new faces, "regulars", and "rare appearances".

Movie News: Carl and Gus both recommended *Glass*, the new M. Night Shyamalan movie. Rob said that *Into the SpiderVerse* is the best superhero movie ever; it even includes an animated appearance by Stan Lee. The sequel to the Finnish movie *Iron Sky* is now out; it's called *Iron Sky: The Coming Race*.

<u>TV News</u>: Carl passed around a *TV Guide* article about *The Orville*. The Disney streaming service might role out in 2020; the company is ending its streaming deal with Netflix, so that it can launch its own service as the exclusive streaming home for Disney movies and TV shows.

<u>Book News</u>: Rob thinks that *The City in the Middle of the Night*, a new book by Charlie Jane Anders, reminds him of Ursula K. LeGuin. Carl is currently reading *Black Leopard, Red Wolf*, an African-themed Fantasy novel by queer author Marlon James.

Other News: Peter solicited suggestions for nominees for this year's **Hugo Awards** for Dramatic Works (Long and Short formats). He likes "Rosa" (the Rosa Parks episode) of *Doctor Who* Season 3 for the Short Dramatic Work. Scott reminded everyone that Washington, DC is the only bidding city for **2021 WorldCon** (with the decision to be made at WorldCon 2019 in Dublin, Ireland); and he asked if anyone wants to volunteer to help put on WorldCon right here in DC.

## Ancient Myths Retold by Modern Authors (Part 1)

a couple of reviews by Carl

Circe by Madeline Miller (Little, Brown & Co., 2018)

Back in 2012, Madeline Miller's first novel debuted: *The Song of Achilles*. It's the story of Achilles as told through the eyes of his lover Patroclus: an impressive retelling of the Greek myth, with solid, positive LGBTQ content throughout. Besides really enjoying the story itself, I was especially impressed by Miller's depictions of Greek divinities – primarily through the character of Thetis, the seanymph who was the mother of Achilles. The novel won several awards, including the Gaylactic Spectrum Award for Best Novel (2013).

And now comes Miller's second novel: Circe. It's another tour de force, says I! As the title implies, it tells the story of Circe, daughter of the sun god Helios and the sea nymph Perse. You probably know of her from Homer's Odyssey: she's the "sorceress" who turns Odysseus's men into pigs, is then outsmarted by wily Odysseus, and finally becomes his lover for a year. But if that's all you know about Circe, then let me assure you that there's a lot more to her life; and Miller has deeply researched Greek and Roman mythology, poetry, and drama to bring together all the various strands of Circe's life story.

Circe's early life among the gods is difficult. She's the daughter of the glorious, golden Helios (Titan god of the sun) and the coldly beautiful Perse (a sea nymph, daughter of the Titan Oceanos). Although beautiful by human standards, Circe is just "so-so" when it comes to the shining beauty of her family. And (except for being non-mortal) she doesn't seem to have inherited any of the magical powers that run in her family. Her brother Aeëtes ("the eagle") becomes the sorcerer-king of Colchis and owner of the Golden Fleece. Her sister, the beautiful but sinister Pasiphaë, is married off to King Minos of Crete (a son of Zeus) and eventually gives sorcerous birth to the Minotaur. Even her mortal niece, Medea, daughter

of Aeëtes, is renowned as a sorceress in the story of Jason and the Argonauts. To all intents and purposes, Circe would appear to be "the runt of the litter".

Miller's novel follows Circe's life through her difficult childhood, her discovery of her own type of herbalmagical witchcraft (pharmakeia, the use of medicine, drugs, or spells), her earliest love affair with a beautiful sea-god that ends in disaster, her solitary exile to the Mediterranean island of Aiaia, and her eventual meeting with Odysseus – as well as what comes after that. It's the story of a woman struggling against life's challenges and her own very difficult family background to ultimately achieve powerful self-agency. Along the way, Miller shows how Circe's legend intersects with hosts of other characters from Greek myth and legend, including her meetings with Daedalus, Ariadne, Jason, Medea, and Odysseus.

As I said earlier, I was impressed by Miller's depictions of Greek divinities in the earlier Song of Achilles, which tended to center around the frightening sea-nymph Thetis (mother of Achilles). Now, in Circe, Miller provides her readers with a far wider view of the Greek pantheon. There is, of course, the whole host of minor "oceanic" deities and nymphs that live in her grandfather's court. In addition to her own Titan ancestors - such as Helios, Oceanos, and Tethys – many of the major Olympian deities come "on stage", too. Through Circe's contacts with Apollo, Athena, Hermes, and Zeus, the reader is shown that "Olympian" doesn't always equate with "heroic" or "praise-worthy". In fact, with the possible exception of Circe's long-time friend Hermes, the members of the Greek pantheon mostly come across

as vain, selfish, self-centered, jealous, scheming, spoiled, and frighteningly powerful beings. (Greek mythology never exactly hides this fact; but Miller skillfully brings this to her readers' attention.) Circe doesn't afford as many opportunities as Song of Achilles for Miller to depict the stunning effect of "the divine" on mortal humans – a major attraction for me in the previous novel. In Circe, most of the "action" occurs within the "mythological community", with relatively few scenes involving mortaldivine interactions. Plus, of course, Circe herself (as noted earlier) may be "beautiful" but she's not "divinely beautiful" like all her relatives – it takes a while for humans (such as Odvsseus) to realize that they're dealing with a semi-divine woman.

And, of course, there's queer content. How could there *not* be queer content in a story about the Greek pantheon? But it's mostly minor background details and relationships mentioned in passing. This novel is, after all, Circe's story; and Circe herself is demonstrably heterosexual. Perhaps the most endearing (and unexpected) gay content comes way toward the end of the novel – but I don't intend to include any "spoilers" in this short review.

I loved every minute of *Circe*. I certainly hope to see more of this kind of novel from Madeline Miller.  $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$
