TV News: Peter and Rob enjoyed the two Doctor Who "Spyfall" episodes. Peter did not like the third (and final) episode of BBC's/Netflix's Dracula. Picard starts up soon. Peter is watching For All Mankind series on Apple TV - an alternative history of the early days of the space race - the Russians land on the moon first, ERA passes and there are lesbians. Peter and Rob gave up on Dark Crystal: Age of Resistance: nice puppetry, but a slow plot development. The Mandelorian has finished its first season. 

Mike Resnick 1942-2020

If you sensed "a disturbance in the Force" on January 9th, there's a good possibility that it signaled the death of Mike Resnick. Resnick was a long-time Big-Name F&SF author; and he's been a particular favorite of mine for a very, very long time. Over the course of his long F&SF writing career, he authored about 80 novels, (mostly F&SF), something like 280 short stories, and 10 nonfiction books. He won five Hugo Awards (with a record 37 nominations), a Nebula Award (with 11 nominations), and more other awards (both here and abroad) than there's space for on this page).

Resnick was born in Chicago and attended the University of Chicago, where he met his wife Carol. He worked as a file clerk in Chicago until 1965, when he began to focus on writing and editing.

Resnick's F&SF writing career began (as Michael Resnick) with the novella "The Forgotten Sea of Mars" (1965), the novels The Goddess of Ganymede (1967) and Pursuit on Ganymede (1968) - all Burroughs pastiches - and Redbeard (1969), a barbarian-amongthe-mutants swashbuckler. He then stepped away from F&SF. During the 1960s and 1970s, he edited men's magazines and tabloid newspapers and wrote a weekly column about horse racing and a monthly column about purebred collies. (He and his wife bred and showed purebred collies and ran a kennel.) He is also reputed to have written over 200 "adult" novels (erotica and Gothic, under various pseudonyms). Resnick returned to F&SF


with Battlestar Galactic 5: Galactica Discovers Earth (1980, with Glen A. Larson).


Many of Resnick's novels, stories, and series take place in his "Birthright Universe", a sprawling space-operatic setting where humanity (and other nonhuman races) comprise a fabulous intergalactic civilization and anything can (and does) happen. Some of my favorites are his "Widowmaker" novels (the adventures of a famous intergalactic bounty hunter), his "Galactic Midway" novels (a rip-roarin' circus traveling the interstellar reaches), and the "Velvet Comet" novels (the most famous and notorious bordello in the galaxy). Some reviewers have called them all "Westerns in space" (somewhat like *Firefly*); but that's not all that goes on in Resnick's "Birthright Universe".

Resnick had long been interested in Africa, its history and its civilizations; and this lifelong interest is featured in a number of his works. A favorite of mine is his "Galactic Comedy" series (think of Dante's "Divine Comedy"). In three novels (Paradise, Purgatory, Inferno), he depicts the exploratory, colonial, and post-colonial experiences of humans with the ecologies and indigenous races of three different planets. The novels present thinly-disguised histories of Kenya, Zimbabwe, and Uganda. Then there are Resnick's "Tales of Kirinyaga", a series of stories and novels set on an artificial planetoid that the Kikuyu tribe have created as a method of preserving their traditional culture and ecology. All of the Kirinyaga stories are thought-provoking, some are controversial, and some are heart-breaking. His 1998 novel Ivory: A Legend of Past and Future follows the "travels" across time and space of a pair of huge African elephant tusks; the linked stories describe how various individuals and organizations came to possess the tusks via purchase, war, theft, etc. Finally, there's his novella "Seven Views of Olduvai Gorge" (winner of both a Hugo and a Nebula Award), which describes an alien archaeological expedition to Earth after the extinction of humanity.

Throughout his life, Resnick and his wife were heavily involved with F&SF fandom. They appeared in five Worldcon masquerades in the 1970s (winning four of them). Resnick was Guest of Honor at about 42 science fiction conventions and Toastmaster at about a dozen more. He also wrote a number of non-fiction books dealing with his experiences as a fan and as an F&SF author, including: *I Have This Nifty Idea* (2001), *Once a Fan...* (2002), *The Science Fiction Professional* (2002), *Worldcon Guest of Honor Speeches* (2007), *...Always a Fan* (2009), and *Q&A for Science Fiction Writers* (2018). He was also a regular contributor to the *SFWA Bulletin*.

Resnick was first on the *Locus* list of all-time award winners for short fiction, and 4th on the list of science fiction's all-time top award winners in all fiction categories. In 1995, Mike Resnick was awarded the Skylark Award (or the "E.E. Smith Memorial Award for Imaginative Fiction") for Lifetime Achievement in Science Fiction.






Gahan Wilson 1930 – 2019

I was saddened to learn that Gahan Wilson, one of my favorite cartoonists and an icon of F/SF/H, passed away in November 2019 from complications due to advanced dementia. His style was unique and unmistakable. I'm pretty sure you've seen his work somewhere, at some time – usually appearing as a single panel with a *very* weird twist of some sort. To quote Michael Maslin (one of Wilson's longtime fellow contributors to *The New Yorker*): "Weird was his specialty—he thought that way, and he drew that way."

Wilson's cartoons and prose fiction appeared regularly in Playboy, Collier's, and The New Yorker for almost 50 years. He provided all the interior linedrawing illustrations for Roger Zelazny's A Night in the Lonesome October (1993), although the cover isn't his work. He also illustrated a slew of children's books, such as the "Matthew Looney" series of Jerome Beatty Jr. (starting with Matthew Looney's Voyage to the Earth, 1961, and ending with Maria Looney and the Remarkable Robot, 1978). In 1992, he wrote an animated short film entitled Diner. (It's possible to view *Diner* on-line; but the only version I've been able to find was recorded off a TV screen – not the greatest quality.)

Wilson was a movie columnist for *The Twilight Zone Magazine* and a book critic for *Realms of Fantasy* magazine. He contributed short stories to *The Magazine of Fantasy & Science Fiction* and other publications. He even wrote and illustrated a short story for Harlan Ellison's *Again, Dangerous Visions* (1972). (The title of that particular short story, by the way, is simply an inkblot.)

Wilson's short fiction has been collected in such works as *Gahan Wilson's Graveside Manner* (1965), *Gahan Wilson's Cracked Cosmos* (1975), and *Gahan Wilson's Out There* (2016). There are a couple of remarkable collections of Wilson's cartoons: *Gahan Wilson: 50 Years of Playboy Cartoons* (2009) and *Fifty Years of Gahan Wilson* (2010).

In 1981, Wilson received the World Fantasy Convention Award. (The trophy itself featured a bust of H.P. Lovecraft, as designed by Wilson himself in 1975.) He was given a World Fantasy Life Achievement Award in 2004. In 2005, he received the National Cartoonists Society's Milton Caniff Lifetime Achievement Award. He is also the subject of a featurelength documentary: *Gahan Wilson: Born Dead, Still Weird* (2014, directed by Steven-Charles Jaffe and featuring contributions by Guillermo Del Toro, Stan Lee, Neil Gaiman, Mike Mignola, Hugh Hefner, Randy Newman, and others).
