
Cancellations of Upcoming LSF Events




Roving Scoundrels - Part 2 -

book review by Carl

In last month's newsletter, I reviewed two F&SF books featuring major characters who are scoundrels: Forays of a Fat Man by Matthew Hughes and Dr. Potter's Medicine Show by Eric Scott Fischl. I pointed out that these works are part of a long literary tradition of popular scoundrels, although in these cases filtered through the lens of F&SF. Forays is a collection of short stories featuring the interstellar adventures of Luff Embry, described as "a thief, a forger and an adept at several of the varied arts of relieving the careless—or even those who were merely not quite careful enoughof the burden of owning precious goods." In contrast, Dr. Potter's Medicine Show is a Weird West novel featuring an itinerant medicine show whose apparent head - Dr. Alexander Potter - sells a typical phony cure-all; but there are sinister forces at work against which Potter is vainly struggling.

Maybe you'd never heard of Mat-thew Hughes or Eric Scott Fischl, the authors whose works were featured in my previous review. But surely you've heard of the author of *this* collection: Ben Bova? He's been writing F&SF for over

Lots of chat about the Coronavirus (COVID-19). It was noted that EmeraldCon (Seattle) has been canceled. Will Awesome Con at the Washington Convention Center likewise be canceled?

Peter showed off his latest toy acquisitions: Robbie the Robot and Iron Giant, plus some Lego dinosaur skeletons. He also passed around a flyer for the July Confluence Con 2020 in Pittsburgh.

Peter and Rob shared their experience at the new Star Wars Galaxy Edge exhibit at Disneyland – a totally immersive experience. Rob loved the Rise of the Resistance, Smuggler's Run, and Guardians of the Galaxy rides.

Movie News: The new "James Bond" movie, No Time to Die (starring Daniel Craig) has had its release date pushed out to November, thanks to box office concerns due to the Coronavirus. Carl talked about The Color Out of Space, a film based on an HP Lovecraft story, starring Nicholas Cage ("alpaca farmer"). Christian Bale has been cast as an unspecified villain in the Thor: Love and Thunder. Teresa announced that Quiet Place II and New Mutants are coming out soon; New Mutants will include a lesbian couple.

TV News: Peter enjoyed the final episodes of the current season of *Doctor* Who. Some members of the fan community are upset because of perceived continuity changes. (Eight earlier Doctors? Heresy!) The Magicians has been canceled after five seasons. (Sad faces.) NetFlix has released the entire 2nd season of Altered Carbon; Anthony Mackie is taking over the lead role of Takeshi Kovacs. WandaVision, Loki, and Falcon and the Winter Soldier will be the first Marvel films to be shown on the new Disney Plus channel. NetFlix's Lock and Key suspense fantasy features a family (including three children) that inherits an estate with magical keys; there is also a demon searching for these keys. Teresa likes Dispatches from Elsewhere (starring Jason Segal): four people stumble across a world of possibility and magic; one of the characters is a trans woman. Teresa also watched the first episode of FX's The Devs, about a Silicon Valley software engineer who believes her company is responsible for her boyfriend's disappearance.

Other News: Carl is jones-ing for a new book: *The Visual History of Science Fiction Fandom Volume 1: The 1930's*; it costs about \$30 in e-version and \$150 in hardback.

<u>Upcoming LSF Events</u>: Upcoming LSF Book Discussions: *Night Circus*, by Erin Morgenstern (March 26); *Love-craft Country*, by Matt Ruff (April 23). And Rob reminded everyone about the LSF Gaming Party to be held on April 4th (see article on page 1 of this newsletter).

Then we celebrated LSF's 30th Birthday. Carl brought a delicious strawberry ice cream cake for the celebration; and we all sang "Happy Birthday". Thanks to everyone who helped found LSF thirty years ago!

Then we watched the first two episodes of NetFlix's *I Am Not Okay With This*.


half a century, and he's still going strong. Following the death of John Campbell, Bova became the editor of *Analog* (1972 – 1978), where he won 6 Hugo Awards for Best Professional Editor; after that, he served as fiction editor for *Omni Magazine* (1978 – 1982). From 1990 to 1992, he served a president of the Science Fiction and Fantasy Writers of America (SFWA); and he is currently President Emeritus of the National Space Society. In 2008, Bova was awarded the Robert Heinlein Award for his work in science fiction.

Sam Gunn first appeared in print in the October 1983 issue of The Magazine of Fantasy and Science Fiction - included in this Omnibus as "The Supervisor's Tale"). The Sam Gunn Omnibus collects all of Sam Gunn's adventures to the date of publication (2007) - over 40 of 'em (including 3 never before collected in book form). I've been a big fan of Bova's "Sam Gunn" stories, catching them whenever possible over the years when they appeared in Analog, F&SF, Omni, or Science Fiction Age. It was a delight to get them all gathered up in one big collection. As an added treat, I even got Bova to autograph my copy at Balticon in 2011!

So, who is "Sam Gunn" and how does he qualify as a "scoundrel"? The *Omnibus*'s blurb makes Gunn's qualities quite clear. He's described as "a hero without peer or scruples", with "a nose for trouble, money, and women—though not necessarily in that order" and with "the ego (and stature) of Napoleon, the business acumen of P.T. Barnum, and the ra-

ging hormones of a teenage boy." But... "more than money, more than women, Sam Gunn loves justice." In virtually every story, Gunn takes on "the powers that be" - whether in the form of interplanetary corporations, governments, or religious authorities - to fight on the side of individual rights, entrepreneurial spirit, and "the little guy". And, of course, to make a few bucks whenever he can. The collection's dedication - and accompanying quote – give you a pretty good idea of Bova's guiding spirit for Sam Gunn. The Omnibus is "dedicated to the entrepreneurs who are striving to open the space frontier for all humankind-and make a few bucks in the process." This dedication is followed by a quote attributed to W.C. Fields (a lovable scoundrel if there ever was one): "A thing worth having is a thing worth cheating for."


The stories in the *Omnibus* are loosely strung together in a rough chronological order (based on the content of each adventure, rather than date of publication) and connected by a frame story. In his Preface, Bova admits: "It isn't easy to put all the tales of Sam Gunn together in any sequence that even vaguely resembles chronological order." Little inconsistencies were bound to creep in. (I'm sure that fans of Robert E. Howard's "Conan the Barbarian" stories understand this.) All of the Sam Gunn adventures are "near future SF". With each story, you'll follow Sam Gunn as he - and humanity - moves further and further out into the Solar System. From Earth-based space tourism to orbital stations (where Gunn takes a hand at developing space hotels featuring "zero gravity sex"); to the surface of the Moon (where Gunn's attempts at lunar tourism run hand-in-hand with lunar settlement), to Mars (ditto), to the Asteroid Belt and the moons and atmosphere of Jupiter (featuring extraterrestrial mining operations – and, oddly enough, the "virtual sex trade"); to the outer rim of the Solar System and (possibly) Gunn's contact with an alien race via a "star gate" of some kind.

I can't say as I have a favorite Sam Gunn story. I like 'em all. In addition to providing a real romp through the Solar System, Bova uses Gunn to explore the challenges that humanity will probably face in colonizing (and exploiting) the Solar System. A very satisfying combination, says I. A couple of the stories even include positive portrayals of Queer characters – for example, Frederick Mohammed Malone, Sam's partner in the space hotel business.
