Postponement of Pride Events in Washington DC

The Board of Directors of the Capital Pride Alliance (CPA) has voted to postpone their annual June events, including the Pride Parade and Festival, in addition to the previously announced postponements of Capital Trans Pride and API Pride. Also, events produced by partnering Pride organizations, Youth Pride, Silver Pride, DC Leather Pride, DC Latinx Pride, and DC Black Pride will be similarly postponed or cancelled. New dates for these events, if applicable, will be announced in the coming weeks. In addition, the annual Guide to Pride in the Nation's Capital will be online only. CPA will offer free ad space to support local small businesses that have been supportive of our LGBTO+ community, and will create a virtual Pride exhibition, for all the registered organizations, businesses, and advocates.

"Like our fellow Pride organizers around the world, the Capital Pride Alliance has been monitoring the escalating impact of the COVID-19 pandemic and has determined that the safest course of action will be to postpone all planned Capital Pride events in May and June," said Ryan Bos, Executive Director of CPA. "Throughout, we have worked and will continue to work closely with our federal, state, and local partners as we make decisions to ensure the safety of the entire community," emphasized Bos." We will collaborate with all the agencies and our partner Prides to identify new dates and potentially new ways that our community can come together in Pride," Bos explained.

"Our theme this year, #StillWe, resonates with all of us under the current circumstances and also in what will surely be new and uncharted territory for Pride organizers," said Ashley Smith, Board President of the Capital Pride Alliance. "I know the LGBTO+ community is always determined and resilient in the face of a challenge," expressed Smith. "Our history is one of struggle, and with the care and support of the hundreds of thousands of people who participate in Capital Pride events, I can say with confidence that we will persevere and be there for each other in these unprecedented times," concluded Smith.

Really Small Dinosaur Discovered

As reported in the March issue of Nature, the discovery of a small, birdlike skull encased in amber reveals a new species that could represent the smallest known Mesozoic dinosaur in the fossil record. This species has been named Oculudentavis khaungraae. The fossil measures about 1.5 centimeters from the back of its head to the tip of its snout. The skull's proportions suggest that the animal was about the same size as the modern bee hummingbird, which would have made the newfound dinosaur lighter than a dime. It lived about 99 million years ago.



While working on fossils from northern Myanmar, Lars Schmitz (associate professor of biology at the W.M Kick Science Department) and a team of international researchers discovered the seemingly mature skull specimen preserved in Burmese amber. Schmitz said: "Amber preservation of vertebrates is rare, and this provides us a window into the world of dinosaurs at the lowest end of the body-size spectrum. Its unique anatomical features point to one of the smallest and most ancient birds ever found."

The team studied the specimen with high-resolution synchrontron scans to determine how the Oculudentavis skull differs from those of other birdlike dinosaur specimens of that era. The shape and size of the eye bones suggest a diurnal lifestyle, with surprising similarities to the eyes of modern lizards. The skull also shows a unique pattern of fusion between different bone elements, as well as the presence of 40 sharp teeth

in its upper jaw. It's tiny size and unusual form suggest a combination of features never seen before. This find demonstrates the extreme miniaturization of avian body sizes early in the evolutionary process. It also highlights the potential of amber deposits to reveal the lowest limits of vertebrate body size. Said Schmitz: "This discovery shows us that we have only a small glimpse of what tiny vertebrates looked like in the age of dinosaurs."

Oculudentavis appears to be most closely related to feathered dinosaurs like Archaeopterix; and researchers suspect that this small dinosaur also had feathery wings. Without more fossils, they can't determine how well it flew. Based on how much its bones had fused together, researchers determined that this tiny creature died at or near adulthood, which makes its tiny size all the more unusual. Its eyes appear to have been so large that they would have bulged out of the sides of its head.

Oculudentavis actually first came to light in 2016, when a Burmese amber collector acquired two specimens from a mine in northern Myanmar, including the tiny skull. The collector later donated the fossil to the Hupoge Amber Museum in Tengchong, China.

Scientists are on the lookout for more pieces of Oculudentavis. The amber piece containing its tiny skull reportedly came from a bigger lump with preserved feathers - but the two pieces were subsequently separated, cut, and polished.

This was LSF's first virtual meeting. Approximately 16 people attended – including a person from the UK!

Our UK attendee was Trevor Barton, author of the "BroBots" trilogy: Brobots, Red Gods Sing, and Balance of Esturbia. ("Rod burners. Scaff dawgs. Laggers. Bucket dumpers. Lerps. Duct monkeys. Tin knockers. Lumbergs. Artificial big guys. Product of a troubled firm. Brobots.")

Bob Angell advised that his novel *Best Game Ever* will be part of the Pride Bundle Package. Rob will share the details at the LSF Facebook page. [Ed. Note: Also see article on this page.]

<u>Movie News</u>: The *New Mutants* movie rollout in theaters has not been announced. Maybe it will go directly to video rather than appear in the theaters. *Avatar II* is supposed to come out in 2021.

TV News: Dan loves the DC Universe animated Harley Quinn series. The new *Stargirl* series will be premiering this month. Dan also shared his passion for an HBO/BBC genre production titled Years and Years: a six-episode mini-series covering future history with social changes. Rob described the fairy tale-like alternative history NetFlix series Hollywood. Teresa mentioned that one of her favorites is the 16-episode series For All Mankind, which explores what would have happened if the global space race had never ended. Teresa said she also enjoyed the first season of Altered Carbon: the AI that appeared in the first season returns in the 2nd season. Teresa is watching the just-released Upload (Amazon Prime), a comedy satire about virtual afterlives -Dan loves it, too. Production of Season 5 of The Expanse has been completed. Who's excited? The next season of Star Trek: Discovery will be released later this year. The long-awaited WandaVision series should be premiering on DisneyPlus later this year. Teresa briefly reviewed movies scheduled to come out: Black Widow, Godzilla vs. Kong, Tenet, Wonder *Woman*, *Antebellum*. Rob reported that a reboot of Battlestar Galactica is in the

works for the upcoming Peacock streaming service. Steve Carell will be starring in NetFlix's *Space Force*, which is set to premiere later this year. There is as yet no consensus on the new season of *Penny Dreadful* (set in 40s/50s Los Angeles). There was lots of random discussion about *Doctor Who*; Rob said he loved the "Kablam" episode, which had the feel of the 1970's *Doctor Who*. The trailer for the new series *Lovecraft Country* looks appealing – this new series is set to air in the late summer.

<u>Book News</u>: Dan is currently reading John Brunner's 1968 classic *Stand on Zanzibar*, which he finds is a difficult read. Carl said he really enjoyed it (having read it when it was first published) and recommended another Brunner novel: *The Sheep Look Up*. Trevor (our English visitor) plugged Maureen McHugh's *China Mountain Zhang* – which the LSF book discussion group read a few years ago – with a big thumbs up!
