


Fossil Evidence of Dinosaur Molting? info passed along by Carl

Microraptor was a nonbird feathered dinosaur that lived about 120 million years ago. New analysis of a *Microraptor* fossil shows indications of sequential molting: the shedding of only a few feathers at a time, just like modern songbirds. This, in turn, suggests that *Microraptor* was a frequent and adept flyer capable of more than just gliding from tree to tree.

As reported on July 15 in *Current Biology*, an odd gap in the fossil plumage on the right forelimb could have been created by molting, with three new feathers coming in. The different lengths of the new feathers suggest sequential molting – with the longest feather being fully grown and the other new feathers at different





stages of growth. This would have enabled *Microraptor* to fly year-round.

Genetic reconstructions have previously suggested that sequential molting has existed in birds for at least 70 million years and was a trait of the common ancestor of all modern birds. This new *Microraptor* find could push back the estimated origins of sequential molting by another 50 million years.

Steve Brusatte, a vertebrate paleontologist at the University of Edinburgh, said that this new find suggests "that not only could *Microraptor* fly, but could fly well, and [that] flying was an indispensable part of its lifestyle."



I'm sure you all know that I'm a big fan of all things "Sherlockian" – or is that "Holmesian"? Over the years I've occasionally written short reviews of novels and anthologies where the Great Detective has wandered over into F&SF Territory. Here's another one.

Sherlock Holmes and the House of Pain is written like a rollicking adventure story from the era of Pulp Magazines, rather than a true pastiche in the style of Sir Arthur Conan Doyle. Still, it's a lotta fun.

The novel purports to be the true story behind the (untold) adventure of the "Giant Rat of Sumatra" (mentioned in passing in Doyle's "The Adventure of the Sussex Vampire"). Seitz has cleverly woven elements of HG Wells's The Island of Dr. Moreau into the storyline. It is revealed that a much-younger Holmes had thwarted Moreau's horrific researches in London many years before. Now, Moreau is back; and his giant, intelligent rats are infesting the Spitalfields district in London. When Holmes and Watson are called in to locate a missing young missionary, they discover that she has been abducted by Moreau's rats. Meanwhile, another of Doyle's characters, George Edward Challenger (many years before the events described in The Lost World) is also attempting to locate Moreau. However, the ambitious young Challenger wants to prevent Holmes and Watson from once again foiling Moreau's research. The

Minutes of the July LSF Meeting taken by Scott


The meeting was once again held via Zoom due to COVID-19 concerns.

Cthulhu Deep Down Under, Vol. 1 edited by Steve Proposch, Christopher Sequeira, and Bryce Stevens

Ah, My Dear Cthulhu... H.P. Lovecraft was perhaps a tad off with his general thinking - and certainly in his ridiculous bigotries and such - but if there was one thing the old boy knew, it was how to capture the imagination of those of us who love horror, fantasy, and sciencefiction. How wonderful that it occurred to him to create a whole new world of wonder set oddly enough on our own globe, save for beings in a separate dimension/reality for the most part and the group of them being something profoundly other than human. We know the bulk of the names, at least the more popular ones, due not only to Mr. L's fiction but also to Mr. August Derleth, who is largely responsible for the organization of the works, as well as his own otherworldly adventures with these beings. Today's peoples might know them best from popular media. Cthulhu, Yog-Sothoth, Dagon, the witches and warlocks of the Wheatley clan, and others who might peer through a rift in the barriers or from deep in the ocean where perhaps there are no barriers that are steadfast.

In his Intro, the always sublime author and horror enthusiast Ramsey Campbell tells us of the mind workings of both Mr. Lovecraft and Mr. Derleth, and how the seemingly (to them) mundane worlds of what we take for black magic, white magic, demons and monsters, and

the supernatural in general were at best trifling and piffle. No, on to further "utopias" where The Old Ones (who ruled our world before mankind usurped their power and forced them into dimensions and dark depths) and where in their wonderful tales, these new monsters make their presence known in our world. Mr. Campbell also tells us of Mr. Lovecraft's fascination with both Australia and Antarctica. Could the very different fauna and flora of said continents be the engaging factor, or perhaps the lack of them in Antarctica's case, at least to a degree? Unknown-and perhaps best as these wonderful tales by other authors may make things clearer....

"A Pearl Beyond Price" by Janeen Webb tells us of an adventurous young woman from a seacoast village on the Kimberley Coast (which is primarily comprised of people of Japanese descent) and her search for the most beautiful pearl and the perhaps awful (perhaps wonderful) monster Akkorokami, with lessons to be learned by all... before it is too late... Wonderful tale!

"Haunting Matilda" by Demetri Kakmi tells of a young girl's fascination with the land and her parents' unhealthy fascination with her. The family's encounters with dreadful humans who might well have been monsters is riveting. as is the final encounter of Matilda and her uncle. "Haunting" is the right word – don't read before bed!!!!

"Wife to Mr. Lovecraft" by Lucy Sussex is a very short and very, very funny tale told by postcards that Mrs. L sends to H.P. while on a very odd vacation, and how she encounters things her husband might well understand better, but not nearly with her humor and grace!!!

"Darkness Beyond" by Jason Franks is a very eerie tale of just desserts and then some, as told from a prisoner's found diary in Port Arthur Prison. It deals with a prisoner's account of terrible mistreatment by the guards and how through the calling of The Old Ones, a type of retribution may be achieved... but what price glory? Nicely laid out!!!

"The Diesel Pool" by Kaaron Warren tells us of how a guard at Old Parliament House encounters ghosts both good and evil and how both try to warn her off of a horror to be found in the basement and lower levels of the old sort of haunted building, where an ancient monster might (or might not) be trapped... Nice cat-n-mouse tale well done!!!

"Dreamgirl" by Stephen Dedman tells us of a man contacted to be a mortal vessel, but through his dreams, and by a girl who may well need his help to get away from... or is it TO a horror led by Cthulhu itself. Very, very unnerving and subtle – nicely dished up!!!

"The Thing in the Bidet" by William Tevelein is a delicious, very darkly humored tale that takes place in an area near Massachusetts slowly set upon by a horror brought back from space, but with odd ties perhaps to Australia... Much fun with a wink-nudge!!!

"The Return of ... " by Christopher Sequeira (who also helped edit this volume) is very much fun and would make for a wild mini-series or decent budgeted movie. This wild one tells of a young lawyer in a small town on the Eastern coast of the continent and his "adventures" dealing with a man who claims to be H.P. Lovecraft's son and how he wants a movie company stopped from making one of his father's works into a film, or a film roughly based on the work - he is very unclear here. The wild and wooly tale's conclusion of modern technologies meeting ancient sorceries and the emergence of Cthulhu in a somewhat different form is a hoot and a half!!!! YAY!!!

"The Elder Things" by B. Michael Radburn takes place on Antarctica and tells us of the dangers of helping out friends when no one knows what is at stake and how the Elder Gods may be out there but not totally visible at all times – but still there, nonetheless... Very well told tale of mental disintegration.

"Vanguard" by Aaron Sterns is a wonderful blend of cops-n-robbers and supernatural terrors, all working in tandem after a fashion. Nicely layered and spilled forward like a noir detective story, never forgetting the monsters either. A must read, or too much can be given away in description!!!

This is the first volume, and I, for one, am looking forward to the next volume. Watch out, Coober Pedy!!! You have been warned!!!
