

#### David Prowse 1935 – 2020

David Prowse – bodybuilder, weightlifter, and character actor – died of COVID-19 at a hospital in London on November 28<sup>th</sup>; he was 85 years old. He had announced his retirement from all public appearances and events in October 2016, attributing the decision to ill health and the wishes of his family.

The six-foot-six Prowse was, of course, world famous as the body that filled Darth Vader's armor in the original Star Wars trilogy. But he had a number of other F&SF connections. He portrayed Julian (Frank Alexander's bodyguard) in A Clockwork Orange (1971), where he was first noticed by George He portrayed Frankenstein's Lucas. monster three times: Casino Royale (1967), The Horror of Frankenstein (1970), and Frankenstein and the Monster from Hell (1974). Among many other roles, Prowse appeared as a Minotaur in the Doctor Who serial The Time Monster (1972), as "the Creature" in the Space: 1999 episode "The Beta Cloud" (1976), and as the Black Knight in Jabberwocky (1977). He helped to train Christopher Reeve for the title role in Superman (1978); and he trained Carey Elwes for his role as Westley in The Princess Bride (1987).

In the United Kingdom, Prowse was well known as the Green Cross Code Man, a superhero invented to promote a pedestrian safety campaign for children. Public service films featuring Prowse were shown from 1975 to 1990. In recognition of his services to charity and to promote general road safety, Prowse was made a Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE) in 2000. Prowse reprised his role as the Green Cross Code Man in a couple of 2014 commercials, at the age of 80.



Jan Morris 1926 – 2020

Jan Morris was a Welsh historian, author of over 40 books, and a "historian of places". (During an interview in 2016, she told Michael Palin that she did not like to be described as a travel writer, because her books are about people and places, not about movement and journeys.) She was known particularly for the *Pax Britannica* trilogy (a history of the British Empire) and for portraits of such cities as Venice, Trieste, Hong Kong, and New York City. She published under her birth name until 1972, when she had gender reassignment surgery, transitioning from male to female.

During the closing stages of WWII, Morris served in the 9<sup>th</sup> Queen's Royal Lancers and was posted to the Free Territory of Trieste in 1945 during the joint British-US occupation. Morris had a distinguished career as a newspaper reporter. As a reporter for The Times, Morris was the only journalist to accompany Edmund Hillary during the 1953 British Mount Everest expedition, which made the first ascent of the mountain. As a reporter for the Manchester Guardian during the Suez Crisis in 1956, Morris produced the first "irrefutable proof" of collusion between France and Israel in the invasion of Egyptian territory. In 1961, Morris reported on the trial of captured Nazi war criminal Adolf Eichmann.

Morris married Elizabeth Tuckniss in 1949. They had five children and lived together in the village of Llanystumdwy (North Wales) for over 50 years (until Morris's death). Morris began transitioning to life as a woman in 1964. She traveled to Morocco in 1972 to undergo sex reassignment surgery, because doctors in Britain refused to allow the procedure unless Morris and Tuckniss divorced, which Morris was not prepared to do at the time. They were forced to divorce later because same-sex marriages were not recognized in the U.K.; but they remained together and were legally reunited in 2008 when they formally entered into a civil partnership. Morris detailed her transition in *Conundrum* (1974), her first book under the name Jan Morris; it was one of the first autobiographies to discuss a personal gender reassignment.

Morris had a long and distinguished literary career. She wrote numerous books about her travels around the world and other subjects. In 1961, she was made a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature; and in 1999 she was made a Companion of the British Empire. (Despite being a Welsh nationalist republican, she accepted the CBE "out of polite respect".)

Morris wrote only two novels, both of them F&SF-related. *Last Letters* from Hav (1985) is an "imagined travelogue and political thriller" – it was shortlisted for the Booker Prize. The followup novel Hav of the Myrmidons was published together with Last Letters in 2006 (under the title Hav) and was shortlisted for the 2007 Arthur C. Clarke Award. (Hav was the subject of the LSF Book Discussion Group in August 2012.) At her request, Morris's final work – Allegorizings – is scheduled to be published posthumously.

Jan and Elizabeth have specified that their joint headstone will read: "Here are two friends, at the end of one life."

#### Minutes of the December LSF Meeting taken by Scott

There was discussion about the traditional LSF book exchange that occurs at the January LSF *meetings*. Rob described how the process works at inperson meetings. Wess suggested postponing the January 2021 book exchange until the first live in-person LSF meeting. Everyone seemed to like the idea.

Movie News: Peter and Rob had limited favorable comments to make about the movie Tenet and its handling of multiple-timelines. Film director Dennis Villaneuve is upset with the Warner Brothers announcement that its 2021 movies will be released simultaneously between theaters and streaming without consulting the film-makers. Disney announced a huge "to do" list of genre material. For Star Wars, Disney announced an Ahsoka Tano series; Star Wars: Andor, Star Wars: Bad Batch; a Lando Calrissian film; and Rogue Squadron. For other F&SF material: Limitless (with Chris Hemsworth); a liveaction Pinocchio; Peter Pan and Wendy. On the Marvel side: Fantastic Four; Black Panther II (without T'Challa); Wanda Vision; a Loki series; She Hulk; Moon Knight; Secret Invasion; Captain Marvel II. A second trailer for Wanda Vision has been released. Soul, Pixar's first film to feature an African American protagonist, is to be livestreamed.

<u>TV News</u>: The fourth season of *The Expanse* premieres this week; *The Mandalorian* has one episode left in the current season; and *Star Trek: Discovery* also has one more episode left in the current season. Ben likes the nonbinary gender character Adira Tal on *Star Trek: Discovery*. Did you know that *Star Trek: Discovery*. Did you know that *Star Trek: Next Generation* actor Michael Dorn did voice acting in the animated TV show *Captain Simian & the Space Monkeys*? A *True Blood* reboot is in early development at HBO. A new mini-series of *The Stand* starts this week on CBS All Access. Current Walking Dead spin-offs include:


#### Hayabusa2 Returns Asteroid Samples to Earth info passed along by Carl

The Japanese spacecraft *Haya-busa2* successfully completed its mission on December 5th by returning asteroid samples to Earth. The samples were dropped by parachute in a special container at a location in the Outback of southern Australia and retrieved the same day for secure transport to labs of the Japanese Space Agency (JAXA).

Hayabusa2 (Japanese for "Peregrine falcon 2") is the successor to the Hayabusa mission that returned the firstever asteroid samples in June 2010. Hayabusa2 was launched on December 3, 2014; and it reached asteroid 162173 Ryugu on June 27, 2018. Hayabusa2 surveyed Ryugu for a year and a half before taking samples.

Ryugu is a "primitive" carbonaceous asteroid, of a type thought to preserve the most pristine, untainted materials in the Solar System. It's a mixture of minerals, ice, and organic compounds that interact with each other. Studying the Ryugu samples is expected to add to our knowledge of the origin and evolution of the Solar System's inner planets – in particular, the origin of water and organic compounds on Earth.

Hayabusa2 is equipped with improved ion engines, guidance and navigation technology, and attitude control systems. It carries multiple science payloads for remote sensing, sampling, and four small rovers to investigate the asteroid surface and analyze the environmental and geological context of the samples collected. Its Mobile Asteroid Surface Scout (MASCOT) collected data on the asteroid's surface structure and mineralogical composition, thermal behavior, and magnetic properties. MASCOT successfully landed and performed its surface mission in October 2018. It was discovered that C-type asteroids like Ryugu consist of more porous material than previously thought. Another discovery was that Ryugu consists of two different almost black types of rock with little internal cohesion.

The first surface sampling was completed on February 22, 2019. It obtained a "substantial amount of topsoil", so the second surface sampling was postponed and eventually cancelled (to decrease the risks to the mission). A second sample was collected from "pristine" material dislodged from beneath the surface by a "kinetic penetrator" (*i.e.* a bullet) fired from a distance of 300 meters. All samples were stored in separate sealed containers inside the sample return capsule (SRC).

*Hayabusa2* left Ryugu in November 2019 to begin its year-long journey back to Earth

With the successful retrieval of the sample capsule on December 6th, *Hayabusa2* will use its remaining 66 pounds of xenon propellant (from the initial 146 pounds) to extend its service life and fly out to explore new targets – other asteroids and exoplanets and possibly a Venus flyby.

<u>Book News</u>: Carl enjoyed Elizabeth Hand's latest "Cass Neary" novel *The Book of Lamps and Banners*; he described its "borderline Lovecraftian" elements (such as the Necronomicon-like occult book of the title). Teresa is reading Leigh Bardugo's *The Six of Crows*, which is to be made into a NetFlix series. She is also reading a new graphic novel version of *Dune*.

<u>Other News</u>: Rob described a video game called *Cyberpunk 2077*, in which male characters get to select their penis size. The video game *Jedi: Fallen Order* was also mentioned. Carl cited the passing of Jan Morris, author of *Hav*, which the LSF book club discussed back in 2012. There was an animated discus-



sion about Hallmark and Lifetime Channels' gay-themed Christmas movies (nongenre). David discussed Elliott Page's coming out as transgendered; NetFlix has gone back and changed the credits of his prior movies.
