LSF Business

Attendees voted unanimously to support the online book discussion as an official LSF event (running parallel to the "in person" book discussions).

Movie News

Rob enjoyed the two scenes shown during the closing credits of Doctor Strange in the Multiverse of Madness.

TV News

It appears that the focus of Disney+'s Moon Knight series is mental health, specifically dissociative disorder ("experiencing a disconnection and lack of continuity between thoughts, memories, surroundings, actions and identity)." Dan and Teresa are liking Amazon's Wheel of *Time* series as well as Apple TV's *Shining* Girls (starring Elisabeth Moss, whose main character exists in a constantly shifting reality). Scottish Sex Education actor Ncuti Gatwa will be the first Black lead in BBC's Doctor Who. Two upcoming Disney+ movies; Kenobi and Ms. Marvel. Rob reported that Legends of Tomorrow and Batwoman have been cancelled, while The Flash has been renewed. Quantum Leap has been ordered into production as a direct sequel to the original show. Peter ranted about the Lego Ninjago series

Paramount Plus+'s Picard has been renewed for one more season. Rob

says that actor Alison Pilli (who plays Dr. Agnes Jurati) the role of best actor for Picard; he also labels Picard as the Worst Star Trek series.

Teresa described CBS's Threshold (a series from 2005 that only lasted one season): "A team of experts are assembled after the US Navy discovers an extraterrestrial object that briefly appeared near a ship." The show had 13 episodes. Brent Spiner was one of the cast members.

Science Fiction in the Real World by Norman Spinrad

(Southern Illinois Univ. Press, 1990) a short review by Carl

I picked up this little treasure at this year's Ravencon, courtesy of a seller of used books in the dealers' room.

I've been a fan of Norman Spinrad for quite some time now. I figure I can always count on him for a fascinating and provocative - reading experience. Over the years, I've enjoyed a number of his novels, including: Bug Jack Barron (1969), The Iron Dream (1972), Little Heroes (1987), Russian Spring (1991), Journals of the Plague Years (1995), Osama the Gun (2007, which I reviewed in the November 2020 issue of the LSF newsletter), and The People's Police (2017). And when I say "provocative," I really mean it. Bug Jack Barron caused nationwide controversy (and publishing difficulties) in Great Britain: The Iron Dream ran afoul of censors in Germany: and Osama the Gun was excoriated (and faced publishing difficulties) here in the USA. I always look forward to Spinrad providing a good story, an eye-opening examination of various social issues, and a wild ride.


However, Science Fiction in the Real World is <u>not</u> a work of fiction – it's a collection of essays that examine various aspects of science fiction. Twelve of these essays appeared in *Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine* from 1985 to 1988. The *Asimov's* editors gave Spinrad "carte blanche four times a year to publish critical pieces of some length that need not confine themselves to discussion of current books and need not conform to any stylistic critical conventions... as long as current novels were tied into the discourse."

Spinrad calls this collection of essays "a revisionary examination of where we are and how we got there, and a revisionary redefinition of the concept of 'genre' itself." He also says: "In a sense, I've tried to write a kind of science fiction about science fiction, to relate what gets written to the lives of the characters that write it and the world that shapes their

The Virtual Book Club (VBC) has been officially voted a part of LSF! Folks who can't make the in-person meeting can instead attend a virtual "shadow" meeting via Zoom. consciousness, which is not too different from relating the lives of made-up characters to the made-up world you create for them."



Spinrad turns his penetrating critical eye on all kinds of "big" questions. For example, the first section of the book is entitled "Literature and Genre: A Critical Overview." It includes an essay on "Critical [literary] Standards" and how they're applied (to different degrees and with differing success) to science fiction and to non-genre literature. As you can tell from the title of the second essay - "Science Fiction Versus Sci-Fi" he takes on what he considers the "crucial distinction" between such terms as SF, science fiction, and sci-fi. In the third essay in this section ("Inside, Outside"), he compares the experiences (successes, failures, critical reception) of SF authors

who write non-SF works and non-SF ("mainstream") authors who write works of SF (but deny it).

Succeeding sections of the book include essays dealing with graphic novels, SF books that have been made (or not) into movies, Hard SF, Cyberpunk, "a new collective dream of space," military SF, the role of the Hero, and the careers of such writers as Theodore Sturgeon, Kurt Vonnegut and the fictional Kilgore Trout, JG Ballard, and Philip K. Dick.

Along the way, a wide range of SF works and authors are discussed during Spinrad's analyses, as well as the works of dozens of non-genre authors.

If you're looking for an "easy read," this ain't it. Each essay contains any number of loooong paragraphs consisting of a single sentence strung together with subordinate clauses and asides. Spinrad's vocabulary ranges from the erudite (dare I say "highfalutin"??) to the downright folksy.

What a mind is on display here! Not an *easy* read, but definitely a very *satisfying* one, says I. $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$
