You probably already know a little about Worldcon (the World Science Fiction Convention)---such as it's "the big one," the biggest of the SF conventions, the one where the Hugo Awards for all the best authors of science fiction (and their works) are given out. You also probably know something about Worldcon's latest incarnation, Chicon V---such as it's being held in Chicago this year over the Labor Day weekend. However, there are some things about Chicon V that you might not know about! For instance, did you know that there are going to be "alternative sexuality" programs and panels at Chicon V? Well, there are! Vincent Price Trivia

This is a tribute to the brilliant (if underrated) actor who appeared in countless horror movies.

Below are general descriptions of only a few Vincent Price Movies. Your mission (etc., etc.) is to determine the title of each movie.

- 1. Carol Ohmart co-stars as Price's wife who plans his murder during a party attended by five guests who just survive ghostly apparitions, a suicide, a visit from a witch, and other strange happenings in order to earn \$50,000.
- 2. "Help me! Help me!" This plea was left out of the excellent but gory 1986 remake of a 1958 classic.
- 3. André de Toth directed Vincent in this 3-D movie. He plays an evil genius who "immortalizes" his victims.
- 4. Creative revenge is the theme of this movie. Using the ten plagues of the Old Testament as his inspiration Vincent eliminates victims one by one with bees, boils, bats, and so on. Gruesome but ingenious to the end.
- 5. Vincent had a cameo in this recent movie that starred a former Jump Streeter.
- 6. It would almost seem that Edgar Allen Poe wrote some of his stories for Vincent. In 1960 Roger Corman directed him in this Poe story of a family curse which causes him to bury his sister alive.
- 7. Remember the Beach movies with Frankie Avalon? Well believe it or not Vincent made one with him.
- 8. Vincent narrated this filmette by "the gloved one". λ

Book Review: Only Begotten Daughter by James Morrow by Randy Hagan

This book is a romp through the life of the half-sister of Jesus Christ, Julie Katz of Atlantic City, New Jersey. It focuses on her attempts to live her own life, while being forced to deal with the modern religious nihilists that abound today. (Most people call the religious right-wing but, for a variety of reasons, it seems more fitting to describe them as I just did.)

Born due to an occurrence of inverse parthenogenesis (a sperm acting like a fertilized egg, but entirely on its own), Julie struggles with being divine. As a child, her father warns her against using her powers, saying that they are watching for her to show herself so they can kill her.

They is Billy Milk and his Revelationist Church, a group attempting to manipulate events in order to bring about the Apocalypse. During Billy's first appearance in the book, it's mentioned that he has lost an eye, wearing a patch over the cavity. Before the scene is over, he's described as the person "with the hole in his head." Morrow is not at all kind about this kind of extremist. It's about time someone wasn't.

The pleasant, intelligent read covers 40 years, following Julie through her years of growing up, her time as a supermarket tabloid advice columnist, her sabbatical in hell, and her confrontation with the Believers' Republic of New Jersey, a theocratic dictatorship that may be more plausible than those of The Handmaid's Tale and On Wings of Song. It's a place where children (Girls only, of course!) play with Pro-Life Talking Embryo dolls and are

read books like Ralph and Amy Visit Heaven and Ralph and Amy Learn About Catholics.

The subtext is a look at religious nihilism versus other worldviews. In trying to come to terms with her divinity, Julie (and the book) touch upon issues that are currently facing communities of faith that are gay-andlesbian-supportive. For example, since she was the result of inverse parthenogenesis, Julie has no physical mother. But since she already has a father, God must be her mother, and is referred to as the (not a) Goddess. Yes, Morrow introduces inclusive images (a current hot topic in groups like MCC and Dignity) to science fiction!

The characters have depth, overorganized religion gets its nose deservedly tweaked, and the writing is at something more than a 9th grade basic level. And I haven't even mentioned the lesbian woman who is the mother (thanks to her turkey baster) of Julie's best friend!

For once, the dust cover notes are accurate. The ones on <u>Only Begotten</u> <u>Daughter</u> sum it up as "a novel that has something to amuse, stimulate, and intrigue everyone. It is imaginative, skewed, compassionate, horrifying -- and funny as hell."

I wish I'd said that. λ

SPACED OUT

Michael Collins used to be an astronaut. Now he's just a space cadet. In his new book, Mission to Mars (Grove Press, \$22.50), Collins, who circled the moon while Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin walked on it, suggests that gays have no place in space.

"I think enough interpersonal problems will develop among a totally heterosexual crew," Collins writes. "Introducing an element of homosexuality could only serve to make matters worse. I guess the same principle applies to lesbians."

If Collins did more reading than writing, he might have a different opinion, says Ralph Smith, a member of the Gaylaxian Science Fiction Society, a gay and lesbian science fiction and fantasy club with over 1,000 members.

"The man is behind the times," says Smith, who believes gay and lesbian characters in science fiction "are everywhere. They're almost more everywhere than we are." Smith believes sci-fi authors have more freedom to create a world different from our own "sexually uptight society."

Gaylaxians are holding their annual convention in Tewksbury, MA, over the weekend of July 19-21. But don't expect to find Collins there.

Book Review: Vendetta by David Frost

This is the latest attempt of the giant novel concept in The Next Generation series. In previous giant novels, such as Metamorphosis, the larger size was to allow a more detailed and involved story development. The basic plot of Vendetta is quite interesting. It links the past mystery of the planet eater from the original Star Trek series with the current problem of the Borg. Also intertwined in this plot is the ever present moral lesson. In this case it is the danger of the obsession brought about by anger and revenge. This, in itself, is enough to build a sufficient story to fill the giant novel. However, the author did not choose to stop there. In addition to the main plot, there are at least four other sub-plots to further illustrate the dangers of obsession. As a result, I found the main story line to be under developed and lacking in many areas. Please do not let this stop you from reading the novel, as many parts are quite interesting. However, the distraction of the multiple sub-plots does make it difficult for the story to capture your attention for very long. λ

This taken with the content of this season's "The Host" episode tells this writer that there is hope of seeing an openly Gay character on ST:TNG!!!!!

"What can I do?" you may wonder... Frank is asking all Gaylaxians to write to Gene Roddenberry and to Brandon Tartikoff, Chairperson of the Board of Paramount Pictures to request an openly Gay permanent character on ST:TNG. At our next meeting, we will set aside a time to discuss this issue in more detail and to write letters for those of us who wish to do so. Lee checked out the hotels in Philadelphia and chose the Guest Quarters Suite hotel by the airport. Instead of single rooms, Guest Quarters provide a living room and small coffee bar in addition to the bedroom and bath. This hotel is set up around a huge open atrium, has 250 rooms, and contains a restaurant and bar. Lee described it as "elegant." He also reported that his sleuthing revealed that we should be welcomed by the staff -- one server told him about half the staff is gay. Other amenities: indoor pool with jacuzzi, nearby outdoor pool, a weight room, saunas, and jogging track. Currently the offered rate is \$89/night for up to 2 people (\$15 more for each additional person), including continental breakfast. Lee will see if he can get the rate any lower. Dates are: July 17, 18, and 19, 1992.

One idea proffered at the meeting was to show home movies at Gaylaxicon '92. The Committee will consider it.

Carl reported that he has located a room for us to use for a party at Disclave on Saturday, May 25th. He also passed around a program from last year's Disclave and a book on Disclave 91's guest artist Alicia Austin's work. Also passed around was a flyer on ChiCon.

Movie Review: FX-2

Sometimes luck is with me as it was on May 6 when I tuned in to B104 and heard they were giving away free tickets to the Baltimore premier of FX-2. Putting my fast fingers to work, I managed to secure a pair of tickets for the Tuesday showing of this much anticipated movie.

To familiarize you with the first movie, it's about a movie special effects man (Bryon Brown) who is hired to stage a phony "hit" with a mafia man as the target, only to discover he's been double-crossed.

In FX-2 Bryon Brown's character is coaxed out of retirement to help catch a slasher who has been killing models. In the process he stumbles upon evidence of police corruption with mafia underpinnings. Brown turns for help from Brian Dennehy, who plays a gumshoe (he was a cop in FX), and a clown named Bluie (because of his hair).

With out going into further detail which would spoil the movie, I'll simply say that on the whole FX-2 was enjoyable, despite several holes in the script. My companion and I felt some scenes with important clues were edited out, which made other scenes a bit confusing. λ
