What? You didn't know there was a convention like that? Well, sure there is! In fact, this year will be the 16th Darkover Grand Council Meeting, a fanrun convention devoted (but not exclusively) to the "Darkover" series of Marion Zimmer Bradley and the "Deryni" novels of Katherine Kurtz. Marion and Katherine continue to be, of course, the featured guests at these conventions---but wait, there's more! This year, the Guests of Honor will be author Elizabeth Moon and artist Nancy Halpern; and other guests will include Lisa Barnett, Julia Ecklar, Janet Kagan, Jacqueline Lichtenberg, Nancy Janda, Diana Paxson, Don Sakers, Melissa Scott, and Hannah Shapero. The Darkover convention has always been very gay/bi/lesbian-friendly---which should be of particular interest to the readers of this newsletter! It's even been described as a sort of "mini-Gaylaxicon within a convention of very friendly straights." Ah, you ask, but is it fun? 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"Q" ENCOUNTERED AT FARPOINT

Fortunately for the folks at the Farpoint Convention (Oct. 9/10 in Hunt Valley, MD), actor John DeLancie has a much higher tolerance level than "Q," the character he portrays on ST:TNG. Someone walking into the room during his guest appearance could easily have thought they had walked into a re-enactment of the Saturday Night Live skit where William Shatner addressed a Star Trek convention.

Among the more memorable of the less-than-memorable questions were: "What is the most embarassing thing you have ever done?" (DeLancie did not recall any.) and "Have you ever mooned anyone?" (DeLancie said he hadn't.) Although almost half of the questions were of this calibre and DeLancie had not slept in over 36 hours, he maintained his patience---although at times he seemed to have an "is this for real?" look on his face. At one point, however, he did lose patience with some people who were standing behind the curtain and talking, despite three requests that they quiet down so he could hear the audience questions. DeLancie finally put down the mike and went backstage himself to tell them to quiet down.

DeLancie reported that he is filming *Deep Red*, the first TV movie being made for the Science Fiction Channel. He plays an evil

scientist. To one questioner, he responded that he would not want to return to Days of Our Lives and that only actors who could not find work returned to the Soaps. When asked why "Q" picks on Worf, DeLancie replied (in his best "Q" mode): "Because he deserves it!" When asked about his nude appearance in one episode of ST:TNG, he related that they had filmed that scene a number of times with him wearing a supporter but that the strap kept showing up on film---so he decided to remove it and told anyone who might be offended to leave the stage.

Also making highly enjoyable appearances were June Lockhart (from Lassie, Lost in Space, etc.) and William Campbell ("Trelane" from the ST episode "The Squire of Gothos" and the Klingon "Kolof" from "The Trouble With Tribbles"). Campbell indicated that there has been talk of doing a ST:TNG episode in which both "O" and "Trelane" appear. He also said that during the original Star Trek series, they had considered making "Kolof" a recurring role, attempting to destroy Kirk over the course of some 15 episodes.

Outstanding entertainment was provided by the filking group "Boogie Knights."
