LAMBDA SCI-FI BOOTH AT DC PRIDE DAY





Not only was The Return of Jafar released directly on video; but one wonders how quickly it will be sold to a TV network. (Every 15 minutes, the scene conveniently wraps up for insertion of a commercial.)

And, to add insult to injury, the voice of the Genie in this video is NOT provided by Robin Williams! Enough said. On Joe's scale of "1 to 4," I give The Return of Jafar a ½, for Gilbert Godfried's return as Iago. (Some of his ad-libbing was hysterical!)

2084: A NOVEL by Larry W. Poland, Ph.D. reviewed by Scott Roberts

Okay, gang, you aren't going to find this book under "science fiction" at B. Dalton's. I bought 2084: A Novel at a local Christian bookstore. (I can hear some of you sighing.)

Before I can begin outlining the plot, a quick review of the "end times" is necessary, for those of you who may have missed this part in Sunday School. Some believe that we are currently living in the last days of Earth as described in the Bible's books of Daniel and Revelation. The end times. which are intended to herald the return of Jesus Christ to Earth, are characterized by plagues, earthquakes, famine. etc. At the end of the "end times." commonly referred to as the Great Tribulation, Jesus Christ establishes the Millennial Kingdom for all of His believers. The Kingdom of the Millenium, a.k.a. Zion, is immeasurably beautiful, full of peace and righteousness, as described in the book of Isaiah. At the end of the 1000 years, God holds the final day of judgment. Are we caught up? Now on to the plot:

Three 33-year old people (non-Christians, of course) from our present are transported to the year 2084, which is after the Great Tribulation, during the 1000 years of the perfect Earth. God has instructed a governor of one of Zion's provinces to expose our unsuspecting visitors to life in the Millennial Kingdom -- as well as the Kingdom of Darkness. After a few days, each of the three must decide which kingdom to choose for all eternity. At first, they are not pleased at being removed from their time period or being held against their will. However, as each of them -- a black female mortgage banker, an Irish womanizer, and a science-as-sav-

iour Korean - attempts to adjust to a perfect world, they also face spiritual seduction to each of their weaknesses by a general from the World of Imprisoned Spirits. As part of their journey, they also are allowed to witness the final judgment of sinners -- in terror, they watch those people whose names are not written in the Book of Life cast into the Lake of Fire. As a group, they almost unwittngly commit themselves to the Dark World. The trio is saved by an angel and forced to make their choice. But why do they need to make a choice? Why not just return them to their own lives back in our present? They learn that they have all been snatched at the moment just prior to their deaths due to a stray gunshot on the freeway, a laboratory explosion, and a brain aneurysm (a familiar plot twist). So they must choose which kingdom to serve, because they won't have an opportunity once they return. The Irish womanizer reforms and chooses the Cross, as does the black female mortgage banker; the Korean scientist chooses the pentagram and ends up in Hades.


Sorry, there wasn't any gay or lesbian connection here, but 2084: A Novel readily falls into the "end-of-the-world" category. Since I am an end-of-the-world fan, I couldn't pass it up. The author crafted a clever story while being true to Scripture. Symbolic and archetypal references to the biblical Apocalypse abound in science fiction; 2084: A Novel is about the actual end times and final judjment -- which is welcome, since there are only a few other fictional tales of the "end times" that attempt to be true to Scripture.

Upon initial observation, Brainscan would seem like a genre-film-lover/s dream: it's about a teenager's obsession with video games. Unfortunately, things are not what they seem; and what should be magic comes off as a cheap trick.

Edward Furlong (the kid from Terminator 2) plays Michael, an emotionally-scarred (and slightly physicallyscarred) youngster. He is told by a friend (and an ad in Fangoria magazine) about a new, completely different interactive video computer game, Brainscan. When Michael contacts the B'scan company, they promise that Brainscan is absolutely unique. They prove this by giving him a force shock of energy that sends him reeling. The first disk of a 3-disk set arrives and propels the boy into an interactive game all right -- murder! He is egged on to this bloody task by a materialization of a monster called "Trickster." Trickster is apparently a manifestation of the devil or a demon -- or is completely in the boy's mind.

After the first disk (murder), the second disk is about eliminating the evidence and/or witnesses; and the third is about tidying up everything/everyone. The boy realizes that this isn't a game -- it's actually happening. What's worse, he is suspected by a wily police lieutenant, who feels the boy is psychotic. After each act of carnage, Trickster sees to it that there is some connection to the boy. The cop is closing in....

The first 20 minutes or so are quite good. After that, this film dies a horrible death quickly: no gradual demise, but sudden and sharp decline into complete predictability and, thusly, boredom. There are some interesting special effects, courtesy of Renee Daalder and Art Durinski, executed by John Allen. The makeup, by Steve Johnson and Andrew Schoenberg, is alright. The three leads - Edward Furlong, Frank Langella, and T. Ryder Smith - try their damndest in the roles of (respectively) Michael, the cop, and Trickster. However, the material and John Flynn's direction are so lackluster that it becomes impossible to overcome them. In fact, one begins to wonder whether there was even a brain in sight to scan. You won't enjoy much!!

Gaylaxicon V Con Chair Peter reminded us that the next two LSF meetings will each be preceded by a 2-hour Gaylaxicon V con-comm meeting (Noon - 2 PM) - the June 12th meeting at Jaime's and the July 10th meeting at Peter's (including a light lunch for committee members).

Members were reminded of the following upcoming LSF events: (1) LSF will host a room party at Disclave on Saturday night, May 28th. Carl is organizing the party. (2) LSF will have a booth at DC Pride Day, June 5th. Carl and Philip will open; members are encouraged to drop by during the day to help out.

Carl described a current exhibit of artwork by 19th Century artist Thomas Cole, until August 7th at the Smithsonian's National Museum of American Art (Gallery Place). The exhibit includes some incredible fantasy-themed multi-painting cycles: "The Course of Empire" and "The Voyage of Life." Carl passed around various TV Guide excerpts, including information on the following: a profile of Babylon 5's Lt. Cmdr. Ivanova; the Fox Network's upcoming TV-movie Alien Nation: Dark Horizon (which will supposedly tie up loose ends from the series); David Duchovny ("Fox Mulder" from The X Files) played a transvestite FBI agent in Twin Peaks; information on the mini-series based on Stephen King's The Stand (which starts tonight); some background information on Time Trax; and an photo-filled

article on the upcoming Flintstones movie (opens May 27th). Carl also passed around the first issue of Sci-Fi Entertainment magazine, which is being published by the same company that's publishing Science Fiction Age; it includes articles on Jack Nicholson's Wolf and Alec Baldwin's The Shadow.

Peter passed around the Star Trek Encyclopedia and sang its praises as the definitive concordance for the various ST series and movies (although not the ST cartoon series). He also passed around the latest issue of Dr. Who magazine, which included an ad for a Dr. Who chess set. (The chess set includes all the Doctors, so you can choose which one you want to use as the king.) It was also reported that Spielberg has bought the rights to make a Dr. Who movie.

The upcoming movie Star Trek: Generations was discussed - it's reported that Kirk, Checkov, and Scotty will be the only representatives of the original cast and that the plot is kinda dubious. Various media rumors were discussed: possible live-action movies of Jonny Quest and The X-Men; the film version of The Witching Hour is apparently shelved; Spiderman is still in production.

Carl reported that Melissa Scott's new book Trouble and Her Friends is now out in hardback. It's about the "closing of the virtual reality frontier." William announced that The Black Orchid (DC Comics) has been revealed as the current incarnation of the Spirit of Mother Earth. An advertisement for X-Men bedsheets was passed around. (Groans all around.)

Philip had been cleaning out closets and sold off a huge box full of F&SF boardgames and role-playing games, with all proceeds donated to the club. (Thanks, Philip!) Finally, Adina had made copies of the Ferengi Rules of Acquisition for anyone who felt they just couldn't live without them.


