THE NETWORK? WHY?

Members of LSF have recently been asking this question. With Gaylaxicon V over, it seems like a good time to explore what the Network means to us, as a club and as individuals.

For those of you who don't know, Lambda Sci-Fi: DC Area Gaylaxians is currently a member of a larger organization called The Gaylactic Network, Incorporated. The Network is a not-for-profit corporation made up of chapters all over the United States, as well as a new chapter in Winnipeg, Canada. Each chapter has a representative on the Network Board. These Representatives, along with seven officer positions, work together to run the Network.

The Network's purpose is to promote science fiction in the gay/lesbian/bisexual community and to promote positive gay/lesbian/bisexual elements in the general science fiction community. What the Network does to accomplish these goals varies from year to year as new clubs and members become active. The Network also promotes Gaylaxicon and the creation of local clubs to provide forums to share mutual interests.

Over the past year and a half, the Network Board has had a very inward focus, trying to stabilize the running of the Network. The major project of incorporation is mostly complete. Other current projects include: organizing the Officers to work effectively; working to refine the Network-Chapter relationship; and beginning to raise funds. Unfortunately, this has meant that the Network Board has had little time or energy to do anything else.

Currently, the Network is primarily funded by local chapters. Each year, each local chapter pays Network dues of \$1 per club member, plus a \$5 chapter fee. The Network also generates funds through other sources, such as Gaylaxicon, from which it receives a 40% share of excess funds. Finding

sources of funding for Network projects has been (and continues to be) a major roadblock to many things the Network would like to accomplish.

Now that the Network's ship is pretty much in order, what do we gain from being members? Well, first there are the benefits of being part of a not-for-profit corporation. The Gaylactic Network, Incorporated, is the entity that is *legally* responsible for Gaylaxicon, chapter meetings, and any official Network or chapter functions. This incorporated status provides an umbrella to protect individual members and chapters from legal liability.

But there's another side to what the Network has to offer; and that is as an organizing "political" force. A few years ago, the Network participated in and helped organize a letterwriting campaign to Paramount Studios to get some "gay positive" storylines or characters on Star Trek. We could debate how effective that campaign was, but there is no doubt that our voices were heard. Many feel that this is what the Network should be about. and that it has been lacking in such efforts for a couple of years. But whose fault is it? If you ask the Network Board (all volunteers) if they could do more, they would answer: "No, not without volunteers and funding."

Perhaps the answer is not to idly criticize the Network, but to take an active part in making the Network a useful tool. There are many ways the Network could be more useful. For instance, it is said from time to time that there is no gay science fiction fanzine; yet there are undoubtedly people all across the country, in local chapters and "at large," who would contribute and read one if it existed. But how could an individual from, say, Washington find all the people needed to work on a project like this, or advertise to a potential base of readers? Through the Network, of course. Or perhaps someone would like to see a letter-writing camDARK WATERS, by Blaise Bulot (Croker Sack Books) reviewed by Wayne #1

paign to the creators of *Babylon 5*, encouraging a recurring gay character. How could this become a national campaign? You guessed it, through the Network's help.

But there are a couple of things the Network needs in order to make anything like this happen. First, the Network needs to be constructively pushed! The Network Board can't come up with all the ideas and then do all the work. Individual members need to come up with ideas and offer to do the work, or to organize the project. If LSF wants to start a letter-writing campaign through the Network, we have to be willing to work. Secondly, the Network needs to be willing and able to help. Once an idea is brought to the Network, they need to spread the word and help people get together. With the internal workings stabilized, it seems that they are ready now to do just that. The mechanisms are in place; we just need to use them. Now that the Network is more organized, it's time for us all to put it to work. ΦΨΛ

PALEOWORLD ON TLC

Are you a dino-freak like me?* If you are, then have I got some good news for you! There's a new half-hour documentary series on The Learning Channel (TLC) that's all about prehistoric life. The series is called Paleoworld. OK, so it's not exclusively about dinosaurs; but we dino-freaks typically have a high tolerance for other forms of prehistoric life, too.

The first three episodes have been quite good: "Flight of the Pterosaurs," "Back to the Seas" (the evolution of whales), and "Carnosaurs." Each episode has been well-rounded. albeit brief, dealing with various sides of the issues relating to a particular form of prehistoric life. For example, the episode about pterosaurs contained a fascinating discussion of the controversy regarding how those creatures got around, both in the air and on the ground; and the one about carnivorous dinosaurs got into a discussion of the mechanics of carnosaur movement and predation. A particular strength of this series is its reliance on current research in the field of paleontology. How "current"? "Back to the Seas" showed that most of the breakthrough research on the evolution of whales has occured within the last 4 to 5 years. I was fascinated to learn just how solid the chain of fossil evidence has become in such a short time (after decades of being "stalled") - even to the point of having fairly well established where the wolf-like creatures that would become whales probably first ventured back into the sea. (It was in the fishrich, shallow waters of the Tethys Sea, between India and the Asian mainland. in case you're interested.) The series also includes really great visuals - from computer-animation to old movie clips to "dinomation," and lots of filming at actual "dig-sites" and in behind-thescenes research rooms in various museums.

Not bad for a half-hour show (minus commercials, about 23 minutes). In fact, the shortness of each episode is probably the greatest drawback to this series. The lackluster narration by Ben Gazzara comes in a close second, though. (Who picked him to narrate anyway? He's certainly no Richard Attenborough!)

Check out *Paleoworld*. It's on The Learning Channel (Channel 53 on District Cablevision), with each episode airing Sundays at 9 PM and Midnight, and again Wednesdays at 8 PM and 11 PM. I think it's well worth the time. (Besides, even if you *don't* like it, you've only blown a half hour!)

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*How can you tell if you're a dino-freak? Well, if you got all misty (like I did) when Sam Neill's character got his first glimpse of live dinosaurs in *Jurassic Park*, then you're definitely a dino-freak!

After a brief explanation of the battle of words between Tom Clancy and William F. Buckley, we learned (thanks to Michael C.) that there would probably be no more "Jack Ryan" films (Hunt for Red October, etc.), due to Clancy's opposition to Harrison Ford being cast as Jack Ryan in Clear and Present Danger. (Go figure!)

Jaime, who could not attend this meeting, called in and offered his place for a November "Video Madness" Party. This was discussed, but it remained unconfirmed as of the close of the meeting. [Ed. note: Surprise! See article starting on page 1 of this newsletter.]

Then we all watched a videotape of the latest episode of *The Tick*, a campy, funny new Saturday morning cartoon series. The meeting ended with a raucous roomful of laughter at this new superhero!

what food to bring, so everyone should just bring something from one (or more) of the following "basic food groups": appetizers (veggies, chips, etc.); a main course (enough to serve at least 4-5 people); dessert (of course!) non-alcoholic drinks (both diet and regular).

How to GET THERE

The party will be held at Jaime's home in Georgetown (site of numerous "Video Madness" parties in the past). It's located at 1928 37th St., NW, several blocks west of Wisconsin Ave.

From the North: Going south on Wisconsin (from the direction of National Cathedral), you'll pass Mass. Ave. Just after Calvert St., 37th St. splits off to the right from Wisconsin (as Wisconsin swerves to the left). In about a half mile, 37th St. passes through Whitehaven Park and intersects White Haven Parkway. Jaime's place is just beyond White Haven Parkway, on your right.

From the South: Going north on Wisconsin (from the direction of "M" St.), you'll need to take a left on some street to get to 37th St. If you turn left on Reservoir Rd. or on "R" St., you'll need to turn right on 37th St., and Jaime's place will be a ways on your left. If you go further up Wisconsin to White Haven Parkway (near the "social Safeway"), you'll turn left on White Haven Pkwy. and then left again on 37th St. Jaime's home will be on your right.

Where to Park: Your best bet for parking is either along White Haven Parkway or along "T" St.

MURDER BY THE CLOCK (Hourly Fun)

One of the best pieces of luck I had at Gaylaxicon V was to have Troll Video as one of the dealers there. (Thanks, Philip!) I lucked upon a copy of a "lost" film, the 1931 Paramount film *Murder by the Clock*. Let me share my good fortune with you...

The wealthy Endicott family has several problems: (1) a matriarch with a morbid fear of death and a rigormortis-like grip on the family purse strings; (2) a psychotic idiot of a direct heir; (3) a nephew who is as weak as his wife is strong and evil and manipulative; and (4) a crypt which includes a "fear horn," in case someone is buried alive.

With all these classic elements of a haunted house whodunit, what's missing? A murder!! Nasty old Mrs. Endicott gets hers; but who is responsible? Phillip, the idiot psycho? The nephew? The shrewish wife? Perhaps the governess of the addled Phillip? A ghost?...

Finding the answer is not half as much fun as watching this wonderfully hoary old chestnut, with its archaic acting styles and bizarre camera angles and antique direction by Edward Sloman. Irving Pichel plays Phillip, the moron with a murderous bent. Mr. Pichel is best known as Dracula's Daughter's aid-de-camp, Sandor, as well as an action film director during the 1940s. Lilvan Tashman marvelously overplays the evil wife, who uses every man she comes across like a dishrag. There are other marvelous performances as well - so many, in fact, that this is a camp lover's delight! If you have the good fortune to come across this gem, don't look at it for plot content, let alone construction. (There is none to speak of; and what there is becomes glaringly obvious after five minutes!) What is so awesome here is that in 1931 this was regarded as an "A"-grade chiller; but by today's standards it's hilariously dated. William




"Stage" Boyd (who took that odd "middle" name so as not to be confused with William Boyd, who was Hopalong Cassidy) portrays the cop who brings this plot together. He can often be spotted smirking at the dialogue he spouts. There is also a science-fiction element here: the existence of a drug which can restore partial life(?!!).

Murder by the Clock runs about 65 minutes, during which you will be confused, entertained, and stupified. You cannot help but ENJOY!!

Rating: 3 out of 4 (For all the wrong reasons!)
