Before I detail some of my personal reminiscences, here are a few "hard facts and details" about Gaylaxicon VI:


--- Membership: the last badge number issued was 238 (which included staff and guests); and there were 15-18 no-shows among the pre-registered guests.

# Outbreak (Close Encounters of the Worst Kind) a film review by Joseph Parra

Ebola virus is, along with HIV, the most deadly of viruses known to man. Not only is there no cure, but no preventative treatments nor symptomrelated antidotes exist. Moreover, no one seems to really know where Ebola comes from or why it comes and goes as it pleases. In the recent sci-fi/fact film Outbreak, the Ebola virus (given the fictional name of "Motaba" for dramatic purposes) strikes out at mankind not only in its normal form, but also in a mutated form that renders it virtually indestructible. Given the recent outbreak of Ebola in Zaire (where it mysteriously appeared and disappeared previously in 1976), the film has a topicality that nothing else can match.

Dustin Hoffman and Morgan Freeman portray U.S. Army doctors trying to track a strain of Motaba which has somehow gotten into the United States and, at a fantastic rate, almost completely infected a small northern California town. The normal Motaba virus seems to be liquid-borne, but this new strain is both liquid- and airborne! Joining Hoffman and Freeman in their quest is Rene Russo, who plays Hoffman's ex-wife, a top scientist with the Center for Disease Control in Atlanta. Thwarting their every move is an Army general played by Donald Sutherland, who has quite another agenda than the destruction of this new viral monster.

What it all boils down to is that a rare, adorable (naturally) little monkey has been smuggled out of Africa and into the U.S. Unfortunately, the little beastie is a carrier for Motaba. At first, the disease is spread by an infectious bite from the monkey to its human caretaker -- and from there, wildfire! Once the Army and the CDC get involved, the whole nation is panicked. What sparks this fear is that the "powers that be" have quarantined the entire town and have, in fact, instituted martial law in hopes of containing the deadly virus.



The story behind the inspiration for the making of this film is perhaps the most frightening tale of all: In 1989, in nearby Reston, VA, research scientists had an outbreak of the Ebola virus among their test monkeys. All the animals were quickly destroyed, for they were afraid the disease would spread out of the lab and infect nearby Washington, DC. Though the story was supposed to be "hush-hush," an article appeared in the October, 1992, issue of The New Yorker called "Crisis in the Hot Zone," Warner Brothers immediately began pre-production work and set about securing all necessary rights and top-notch personnel for both behind-the-scenes and in front of the camera. Their efforts were not in vain. Outbreak is a marvelously-crafted motion picture. Through all of its grandiose-ness, it still maintains a marvelous air of fear and paranoia. Director Wolfgang Petersen has put together an intricately-woven tale of an all-too-possible future. The parallel between the Motaba virus and HIV/AIDS is so obvious as not to be the subject of discussion here and now -- but if not now, when?

Every performance in the film is delicious. Hoffman is wonderful as the maverick doctor intent on finding out just what is behind the virus and its mutated properties. Russo is equally as impressive as the CDC scientist who must be two steps ahead of the game in order to remain a player in the life-anddeath stakes. Freeman and Sutherland make wonderful allies/adversaries. (I have a feeling that Donald Sutherland will be the next Vincent Price, what with all the horror and sci-fi flicks he's done lately.) The special effects by Helen Elswit and John Frazier are excellent, as is Matthew Mungle's makeup work. Outbreak is indeed a film well worth seeing -- exciting, warm, profound. A sure cure for the movie doldrums.

## Many Minutes of the May Meeting by Rob

Despite my attempts to make previous minutes incoherent, I was again chosen to take minutes at our May meeting. I suppose I should resign myself to it; it seems that no matter how strange my minutes are, I keep getting asked for more!

Our meeting began with some discussion of Network issues, led by our Network Rep, Philip. In preparation for the upcoming Board meeting at Gaylaxicon VI, Philip wanted to know how we felt about the current charter and other Network-related issues. Philip pointed out some particular items in the current charter that he felt we should discuss. The first was a section of the charter that prohibited any chapter or member of the Network from publicly discussing any disagreements between Affiliates, members, or the Network. After some strong discussion, we discovered that we all seemed to agree that this was at best an attempt to legislate etiquette and at worst censorship; we asked Philip to suggest striking the section. The second issue related to some inconsistencies and unclear wording regarding how voting is handled, especially related to how many Affiliates must vote for something that is binding upon all Network Affiliates. We asked Philip to suggest making that section clear in the charter. Finally, there was an issue related to the definition of autonomy as it related to Affiliates and the Network - a section of the charter detailed specific things that the Network could do in regards to the workings of an individual Affiliate. However, those present at the meeting were very uncomfortable with the inclusion of a statement that said the Network could do things "including but not limited to" those actions listed. It was suggested that this wording should be replaced by a statement to that affect that the Network could "amend the charter as new specific items need to be added to the list" (or words to that

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effect); and we asked Philip to work on this, too.

Philip informed us that he will be heading a Network committee that is looking into working with some other fan groups on organizing for a possible new letter-writing campaign to get more of a gay presence in genre TV shows. No plans are set yet, and Philip is interested in any suggestions we have for this. We all agreed that it would be best if any such campaign is pursued along the lines of being FOR inclusion of gay characters/themes. rather than AGAINST any particular show for not including them.

After this heavy business, we were eager to move on to lighter notes. The plans for an LSF table at D.C. Pride Day are still tentative. We have reserved a space with the Pride Day organizers ("One in Ten"), however our participation is still pending a decision by the organizers regarding provisions of tents/canopies for the booths. Everyone seemed to be in agreement that it would be unwise to spend the day on the "granite griddle" (Freedom Plaza) without proper shading. The Pride committee will be letting me know as soon as a decision has been made, and we'll keep you posted! We also decided that it would be wise to contact the Sysop for GLIB to ask him to change the name of the science fiction area on the service. At present, the area is called "Lambda Sci-Fi" (for various historical reasons). While we recognize the value of such an area on GLIB, we decided it would be best to seek ways to clearly identify our lack of connection to it. Some good suggestions for alternate names were made. and these will be offered to the Sysop. Finally, we settled down to our usual anarchy of movie and book notes. Of particular note were comments regarding the Batman Forever movie posters of Chris O'Donnell, which apparently keep disappearing all over town, and some excitement about the impending opening of Johnny Mnemonic.

We arrived in Niagara Station about 7:15 PM; and Joe wasn't too tired to win the opening session of "Gaylaxicon Jeopardy" held in the con suite. Before the con officially started, Joe and I wandered over to the Canadian side to get the best view of the natural splendors. 
Monday (5/22)

As you might be aware, I attended the annual Board meeting of the Network; and I'm pleased to announce that the Gaylactic Network has created a new position to serve as the proxy or alternate for the Speaker for the Network, in the event that the Speaker cannot fulfill his/her job. This position (called "Listener," since he/she will listen and do nothing until needed) will allow the Network to continue its work in the event of a crisis where something has happened to the Speaker.


As for the issues that I tried to bring before the board for LSF, I am sorry to say that these issues were tabled for the time being. Although I did make it clear that LSF was strongly concerned about the issue of censorship, an unofficial poll of the Board members saw nothing wrong with the amendment to the charter as it presently stands, feeling that for the sake of uniformity all Affiliates should always at least seem to be in agreement on policies. However, I was not able to make clear the pitfalls of this idea. (For example, I am technically in violation of this amendment now by publicly informing you of our dissenting position.) I have been asked to draw up LSF's position for the GNAPA (the official dialogue correspondence of the Network); and hopefully this will persuade the Board about the unacceptability of this arbitrary form of censorship.

Finally, I would like to say that although I had a great time up in Niagara, I am disappointed that little of that pleasure came from the convention itself. Correct me if I am wrong, but I thought I was going to a science fiction/fantasy/horror convention. I found little to do with that theme at Gaylaxicon VI this year. I realize that Gaylaxicon is a gay/lesbian/bisexual-specialized science fiction/fantasy/horror convention; but too much time and activity was devoted this year to non-genre-related topics.

Personally, I am not so insecure in my sexuality that I have to have constant unrelated reminders, nor am I so jaded to the science fiction/fantasy/horror genre that I could not possibly find relevant topics or programs that relate both to the genre and to our special approach to it. I cannot say that official activities such as "Line Dancing" or "Massage" or videos like Zero Patience were inappropriate, as punctuation for the main theme of the convention. However, these non-sequiturs watered down the main theme of this convention, which I understood to be "science fiction/fantasy/horror from the gay/lesbian/bisexual point of view." Gaylaxicon VI seemed more like an excuse for gay/lesbian/bisexual people to get together, rather than a reason for people to get together in order to share a common love of the genre. Perhaps this feeling was best expressed by a friend of mine who could not go to Gaylaxicon VI: "If we [the Network] get a reputation for straying so far from the genre, people who come expecting a science fiction/fantasy/horror convention will stop coming; and the convention will become merely a feel-good session for gay/lesbian/bisexual people who have nothing else to fill their lives."

All in all, Gaylaxicon VI was a mixed bag of fun and frustration. Better luck next time, Gaylaxicon VII.





### May Minutes




