## Earlier Minutes of the May LSF Meeting by Rob

Due to our ongoing bout with an overflowing pile of "real business," we inaugurated our new policy of starting the "business portion" of the LSF meeting a half-hour earlier than the usual 2:00 PM. A small but eager crowd showed up at this earlier time to deal with the business items for this month.

Our first order of business was decide on the suggestion that LSF make a bid to host Gaylaxicon in 1999. After much laughter at some of the things we could do with a Space 1999 theme (the "name the emotion" contest with pictures of Barbara Bain was a big hit!), we settled down for a vote. The attendees voted unanimously to approve the proposal; and Philip was asked to add it to his next GNAPA submission. The bid will also be made at the Network Board meeting at this year's Gaylaxicon (in Boston). Although the decision to bid for the convention was unanimous, a number of comments, concerns, and suggestions were made including getting other Gaylactic chapters involved in the planning process (while keeping the admin centers local), making sure to focus on science fiction/fantasy/horror programming (instead of focusing on "gay life" in general), and being sure that our bid is ONLY for the convention in 1999. Although no decisions were made on Con Committee roles, it currently looks like Rob and Jack will co-chair the convention, with Carl repeating his role as Deputy Chair and "Calm Voice of Reason." [Ed. note: ???!!]

In other business-related items, an official announcement for the "Lambda Sci-Fi 'Zine Project" (as yet un-named) will be made at Gaylaxicon VII - and flyers will be distributed there, also. (A probable deadline for submissions to the first issue of the 'zine will be October 31, 1996). An auction for raising funds for the 'zine will probably be held at the August LSF meeting; so be on the lookout for more information soon.



The new Fox made-for-TV movie of Doctor Who premieres on May 14th at 8:00 PM (in fact, already has, by the time you read this); and the season finales of The X-Files, Babylon 5, and Mystery Science Theater 3000 (which

# Classic Genre Films on Video with Gay Influence or Gay Content

Hello, dahlings! No, that's not a misprint - it's HOLLYWOOD! Our Community has given so much to the worlds of science fiction, horror, and fantasy that one would think we invented the genres. Well, we didn't; but we came close - what with directors like James Whale practically starting everything off with Frankenstein! (In case you didn't know, Whale was the earliest Hollywood director to come out of the closet in the late 1920s.) According to the late gay film critic Vito Russo, without our contributions a big part of the genre might never have happened! So, here's a list of "tres gay" genre films now available on home video. (I've placed the name of the distributor's company next to the film title, to make it easier for you should you decide you want to include it in your video library. I've also annotated each film to let you know why I've included it in this list: A = actor/actress, C = content, D = director, ST = subtext.)

By the way, for more insight about these films (and, indeed, for information about gay influence on and in the film industry in general), I highly recommend Vito Russo's book *The Celluloid Closet*.

## Lammas Needs Your Help! reported by Carl Cipra

It was a helluva Winter, wasn't it? As bad as it was on a personal level, however, it was even worse for some of the small businesses in the District. The weather was a real "cash-flow killer." Case in point: Lammas Women's Books and More, a 23-year-old institution in the the DC les/bi/gay Community - owned and operated for several years now by Jane Troxell, former member and continuing friend of Lambda Sci-Fi.

With all the storms and pile-up snow, Jane and the Lammas staff watched their customer traffic drop to nil and their losses mount up to the tune of an estimated loss of \$50,000 in sales - but the bills (rent, food, etc.) kept mounting up (as they always do). The first casualty of this financial disaster will be the Lammas Bookstore in Baltimore, which Jane opened a couple of years ago (closing on June 30th). Among many other people in our Community, I certainly hope that the DuPont Circle store won't be the second casualty!

Lammas has certainly been beneficial to gay fantasy/science-fiction fans over the years. Lammas has hosted readings by prominent les/bi/gay (and friends) writers at the storeamong them Melissa Scott, Jewelle Gomez, and Forry Ackerman. And if you're looking for a nice little selection of les/bi/gay F&SF or spirituality/religion books (particularly those hard-to-find books with a feminist, lesbian, and/or "wimmin's" angle to them), then there's no better place to look for them than Lammas.

"But what can I do about it?" you ask. OK, you probably can't afford to pass along a couple of thousand to keep Jane afloat; neither can I. But we can still help out How? It's simple!

Drop by the store and buy something!! (Shopping? What a concept!) I highly recommend a trip to Lammas for a leisurely little stroll around the bookshelves. For example,

The Trial of a Time Lord a movie review of *Doctor Who* by Philip Wright & Peter Knapp ?∑?

PHILIP: Well, Peter, Dr. Who finally made it to FOX. But don't you think that it fell a little short of what it could have been? I mean, didn't you feel that it seemed to pander a lot to American tastes, instead of keeping the British humor and charm that made Dr. Who so popular in America in the first place?

PETER: Yes, I did think the movie pandered to what the producers felt were American tastes. I'm not surprised that they did this, as Universal (the production company that made the movie) and FOX (the network that bought it) both wanted to make something that would hopefully be watched by mainstream American audiences.

While always popular in this country, I think that in the past both the commercial and PBS affiliates aimed the original British show to fill a niche. They never showed *Doctor Who* during prime time. FOX, on the other hand, did show their movie at 8:00 PM on a Tuesday night. I think that necessitated changing the flavor of the show to hopefully appeal to a broader American audience, not just those willing to stay up late on a Saturday night to catch the latest episode.

on a recent trip to the store, I found a copy of an out-of-print fantasy novel by Francesca Lia Block (a recent interest of mine), a book I hadn't previously known about! And, guys, if you're worried about going into "a women's bookstore," let me assure you that there's nothing to worry about. You won't run up against some rabid labryswielding feminist who's out to defend "wimmin's space." I've been shopping there for years now and everyone there has been "nice folks!" So, drop on by Lammas - it's located at 1426 21st Street, downstairs at the corner of 21st and "P," a block or so off DuPont Circle. Lammas needs your help!

PHILIP: But you have to agree that at points they went too far. For example, to have the Doctor become romantically involved with his doctor was completely out of character for Doctor Who as a character and as a series - particularly when it was thrown in so haphazardly. When I watch Doctor Who I watch it, in part, for the exotic British flavor. I don't want to hear the Doctor use a phrase that is exclusively American, such as "I am the guy..."

I will say that one thing the show did try to do is capture a lot of the really good things about the British original: playing much of the story tongue-in-cheek; showing the actual transition from the seventh Doctor to this new one; and particularly the way in which they played with the story, giving it lots of twists and turns, just like the stories in the original series. By these, I think they accomplished what they set out to do.

PETER: I agree. Disarming a tense cop with a Jelly Baby was classic Who. So were the constant references to the show's past. But probably my favorite line occured late in the movie. The Master has just changed into an outrageous costume and is proclaiming that "...we have no time to waste." The Doctor quips back, "But time to change." To which the Master proclaims, while sashaying down the staircase, "I always dress for the occasion!" This dialog was very reminiscent of the original show - a little campy, a little irreverent, very tongue-in-cheek.

**PHILIP:** I agree. That sequence was making fun of itself. However, what happens next will be debatable.

**PETER:** You mean if they do turn the movie into a series, will anyone watch it?

PHILIP: Yes. They have miscalculated, because they want to make absolutely "mainstream" something that is not only "cult" within the general

television audience but also within the science fiction community. They're trying to make it into something with a ST:TNG kind of appeal; but this is so specialized (because of the very nature of the show: the eccentric characters, the very subtle humor, for example), it's never going to appeal to Mrs. Joe Blow from East Podunk. They need to approach it the same way they've approached Babylon 5. B5 has its own flavor and has gone off on a completely unique direction.

PETER: I don't know if I'd go as far as saying that they are trying to mimic ST:TNG (though the movie did have great special effects and production designs - two hallmarks of the Trek universe); but I do agree that if they

Americanize the show too much, it will look like a cheap Star Trek ripoff, which non-Whovians won't watch, and it will alienate Whovians who might feel that it strayed too far from the mold. To draw a parallel, most of my Trekker friends have stopped watching Star Trek: Voyager.

What were the ratings of Doctor Who? The producers were hoping for a Nielsen rating of 17. The overnight shares in 33 markets were 11/10/10/11 (by half hour), which is average for a FOX Tuesday night movie. I found the demographic breakdown interesting: an 8 share among women 18-49, a 12 share for men 18-49, and a 14 share for teens. For a show that hasn't had a new episode in six years, I'm surprised more younger people watched it than adults who may have

grown up on the show. Not that I'm complaining - the more the merrier.

#### WHEN TO BE THERE

The Lambda Sci-Fi meeting and the potluck dinner will start at 5:00 PM on June 8th, and at 2:00 PM on June 29th. The videos will begin as soon as we get the "business" out of the way. So, try to get to each party a little before the scheduled "start time," especially if there's any last-minute fixin' you need to do on your potluck contribution.

#### WHAT TO BRING

Both parties will be typical LSF "Video Madness" parties, so bring along your favorite genre videos (science-fiction, fantasy, horror). Attendees will vote on which videos to watch; and there'll be different "tracks" of programming shown on each of three screens throughout the house. As usual, each party will include our traditional pot-luck pig-out, so bring along something scrumptious to eat. We don't pre-assign categories of what food to bring, so everyone should just bring something from one (or more) of the following "basic food groups": appetizers (veggies, chips, etc.); a main course (enough to serve at least 4-5 people); dessert (of course!); or nonalcoholic drinks (both diet and regular).

#### How to Get There - June 8th (5:00 PM)

The party will be held at Philip-and-Jeff's home in Silver Spring, MD (site of several "Video Madness" parties). It's located at 312 Highview Ave. - a couple of miles east of "downtown Silver Spring," just south of the intersection of Colesville Rd. and Franklin

<u>Driving</u>: Take Colesville Rd. east from George Ave. ("downtown Silver Spring"). Turn right on Franklin. Take the 3rd right onto Highview Ave. The house is up the street a bit, on your right.

Metro: Take the Red Line to the Silver Spring Metro Station. We'll plan a couple of "shuttle runs" from the Metro station to the party (4:15 PM and 4:30 PM). All you have to do is wait at the "Kiss & Ride" area of the parking lot, and we'll pick you up and take you to the party. (Look for a maroon 1995 Ford Escort station wagon.) If you'd rather walk from the station (or if you miss either of the "shuttles"), it'll take about 30 minutes to walk there. (Just follow the directions re: "Driving" above.)

How to Get There - June 29th (2:00 PM)

The party will be held at Jaime's home in Georgetown (site of numerous "Video Madness" parties in the past). It's located at 1928 37th St., NW, several blocks west of Wisconsin Ave.

From the North: Going south on Wisconsin (from the direction of National Cathedral), you'll pass Mass. Ave. Just after Calvert St., 37th St. splits off to the right from Wisconsin (as Wisconsin swerves to the left). In about a half mile, 37th St. passes through Whitehaven Park and intersects White Haven Parkway. Jaime's place is just beyond White Haven Parkway, on your right.

From the South: Going north on Wisconsin (from the direction of "M" St.), you'll need to take a left on some street to get to 37th St. If you turn left on Reservoir Rd. or on "R" St., you'll need to turn right on 37th St., and Jaime's place will be a ways on your left. If you go further up Wisconsin to White Haven Parkway (near the "social Safeway"), you'll turn left on White Haven Pkwy. and then left again on 37th St. Jaime's home will be on your right.

Where to Park: Your best bet for parking is either along White Haven Parkway or along "T" St.
