The Relic: A Valuable Artifact

One of the most wonderful places that man has invented to visit is the museum. Of all the varied and sundry types of museums, the most interesting is the natural history museum. From it, we are told of where we have been, are now, and probably are headed in the future, in terms of the natural progressions of nature on Earth. The most interesting features tend to be the prehistoric monsters and ancient civilizations. Every now and then, evidence shows up linking the two. Many extinct peoples have worshiped gods that in their symbolic renderings appear to be "things" akin to dinosaurs and other creatures. Most of these "deities", when examined, are proven false images culled from dinosaur bones or cave dwellings --- most

An ancient South American tribe, older than the Aztecs, Mayans, and Incas, has been unearthed by an archaeologist working for the Chicago Museum of Natural History. He hasn't merely found old pottery and such - he's found the tribe. In order to gain their confidence, he must face Kothoga, their god-monster protector. They prep him with a tea/potion made from a rare plant that will enable him to meet Kothoga. He screams... Cargo is being loaded at a Colombian port to be unloaded in Chicago. The archaeologist is at the port, stressing to the captain that the cargo mustn't be loaded. Ignored, he stows away amid the artifacts and is never heard from again... The ship shows up at a Chicago Lake Michigan dock (how this is accomplished, Lord knows) with the crew having been slaughtered!

The cargo is delivered to the museum and couldn't have arrived at a better time. Contributions have been negligible to the museum as of late and the Kothogan exhibit is being used as a black tie fund-raiser. The research teams at the museum are divided against each other for funding, and if things weren't already bad enough, someone or something is killing off personnel at the museum by ripping their brains out,

specifically the hypothalamus area.

This is a classy production from Paramount that for some reason or other (pick up any fan/genre mag and find a dozen or more) sat on the shelf for 6 months. Performances are uniformly good, with Penelope Ann Miller doing her best as both tough dame heroine and horrified scream queen. A little gem of a performance comes from Audra Lindley as a forensic coroner commenting on a victim of Kothoga. Her real life husband, James Whitmore, is also in fine form as an expert on American Indian cultures & folklores. Linda Hunt is also fine and funny as the head of the museum. Tom Sizemore satisfies as the lead detective.

The real star of the show though, is Kothoga. Stan Winston and crew have done an outstanding job creating this unique monster which appears to have many traits of different animals, each of whom definitely pissed off Mother Nature. But it is the very nature, if you will, of the monster that is so unique, that to describe it would be detrimental to the incredible mystery of this thriller. There are two major changes from the book - one we won't discuss, the other is naming the beastie Kothoga rather than the tribe, but under director/ cinematographer Peter Hyams, these changes are integrated smoothly.

Hyams has designed this production so that it should play well on both large and small screens, but it gave me quite a chuckle to see people in the theater scream like Hell when Kothoga is shown initially. Yes, there are Alienesque moments which are more homage than rip-off, but the original moments are just that. So the next time you are at an antique shop, junkyard, or natural history museum, don't look too close; don't step too near; but most of all — DON'T TOUCH!!! You'll be sorry - it might be a dangerous RELIC—BUT SEE THIS MOVIE!!! Enjoy!!!

The Unrealized Potential of Voyager

Voyager has all the basic ingredients of the other Star Trek shows. The acting is decent and some of the characters are even well developed. The ensemble cast is diverse enough that the writers can play off their strengths and weaknesses and pair them up in different combinations. So what's wrong with the show?

I don't think the writers use their characters to their full potentials. A good example is the relationship with Kes and Neelix. For almost three seasons they have been love birds. Then we learn that they have broken up between episodes and we see no ramifications of the breakup. How do the writers expect the audience to be sympathetic to characters who don't even mourn the breakup of their relationship?

Another problem is that the cast of characters remains static. Being stranded in the Delta Quadrant means that supporting characters can not be added. With very few exceptions we have never seen a guest star appear more than once. In comparison, DS9 is full of supporting characters that weave a complex tapestry that complements the nine principles.

More realistic writing for the main cast and a supporting cast would enrich the monotony that is Voyager. What's your view?

And then we had to put To Order to bed, as the Red Queen called our gathering to a close. What the future holds for the infant meeting, no one knows, but for a while it was fun.



Celebrating Comets

For the second time in two years, a bright comet shines in our spring skies. Unlike the case with Comet Hyakutake last year, however, we've had plenty of notice of the arrival of Comet Hale-Bopp, discovered in July 1995 by two amateur astronomers in the southwest. I've been able to follow Comet Hale-Bopp in my binoculars even from downtown DC since last summer, but right now, only a clear western sky is needed to spot this unique visitor by eye after sundown.

One need not miss encountering a comet while waiting for clear skies, however. Comets have been the subject of many stories in science fiction and fantasy over many years, and I've enjoyed reading them while waiting for cloudy spells to pass, or in between cometary visitations.

Most comets have their origins in the Oort Cloud, a cloud of material left over from the formation of the solar system, surrounding our sun well out beyond Pluto, though some orbit in the inner Kuiper Belt. In Camelot 30K, antlike intelligent life — called Keracks — is discovered on a cometoid in the Kuiper Belt. In this fascinating "first contact' novel, study by astronauts from Earth leads to a devastatingly deadly discovery about the Kerack life cycle. The action in Arthur C. Clarke's 3001 (the final sequel!) opens in the Kuiper Belt as well, also with the discovery of an unusual life form. Life in a star's Oort Cloud is behind the danger encountered in Dragonsdawn and other "Dragonriders of Pern" novels by Anne McCaffery. Fleeing the technocracy of Earth, a few thousand humans seeking to create a life more in harmony with their planet colonize Pern, orbiting the star Rukbat [Alpha Sagittarii]. Unbeknownst to the colonists, indigenous life in the system's Oort Cloud is inimical to carbon-based life forms, and is transported to Pern by a planet that orbits through the system in a cometary manner. McCaffery has written many novels and short stories about Pern, several of which include Gay male characters in quite a positive way.

Though comets have struck

fear in people's hearts for no reason, the visitations we rightfully fear are those in which a comet strikes the Earth. In Lucifer's Hammer, Larry Niven and Jerry Pournelle collaborate in writing about the discovery of Comet Hamner-Brown independently by two amateur astronomers out west - yes, very reminiscent of the discovery of Comet Hale-Bopp, and also known by the initials HB! Unlike Hale-Bopp, however, Hamner-Brown is discovered to be on a collision course with Earth. The social impact of the disaster on survivors in southern California makes for an exciting book. In The Hammer of God, set in the early 22d century, Arthur C. Clarke takes a very good turn at the cometary impact novel, focusing on attempts by Earth's astronauts to divert the intruder, and the reaction to this decision by religious fundamentalists.

The return of Halley's Comet in 1985-86 inspired a number of cometbased books. Isaac Asimov, Martin H. Greenberg, and Charles G. Waugh that year published a collection of short stories under the title and theme Comets. Among the standouts are Ray Russell's "Comet Wine", about a Russian composer's Faustian bargain, and an excerpt from Mark Twain's "Captain Stormfield's Visit to Heaven". Twain was born just before Halley's 1835 return and died at Halley's 1910 return, a set of circumstances put to good use in another story in the collection, Fritz Leiber's "The Death of Princes", 2061. Clarke's second sequel to 2001, features a visit to Halley's Comet on its next pass through the inner solar system in the year of the title. A fey Gay couple are supporting characters. In Heart of the Comet, David Brin's and Gregory Benford's darkly visionary novel explores a possible future after Halley next passes by in 2061: a colony is set up on the comet, and soon discovers evolution — and human nature — taking some interesting turns. And it was the approaching 1910 return of Halley that inspired H. G. Wells in 1906 to write In the Days of the Comet, in which Wells sets his ideas on social equity, free love — at least in a heterosexual context and pacifism against the background of a comet's tail brushing the Earth.

Also deserving of mention is The Gripping Hand — the sequel to the Mote in God's Eye - in which Niven and Pournelle continue their story of first contact and interstellar intrigue, and include a comet-manipulating civilization in the Mote system. Finally, wonderful examples of comet-inspired art, from comic postcards to fantasy art to stunning jewelry, can be found in two collections: Roberta J. M. Olson's Fire and Ice: A History of Comets in Art, published in conjunction with the National Air & Space Museum's 1985-86 exhibit of the same name, and Halley's Comet: Memories of 1910, a wonderful book of Hallev memorabilia, by Roberta Etter and Stuart Schneider.

Annual LSF Treasurer's Report

1996 was a good year for LSF. Our total income surpassed our expenditures by \$25.91 - and we ended the year with a balance of \$692.84 in our bank account. We had 5 more members in LSF for whom we paid Network dues in January 1997 - so we've seen a growth in membership back to the levels of 2-3 years ago. In addition, postage was purchased near the end of 1996 which will carry us through the first third of 1997!

There are still a few important numbers to watch. One is our "Sales Income" which although accounting for over 22% of our incoming funds was down by about \$125 from 1995's totals. The second is our copying costs, which accounted for over 41% of our expenses. That number is likely to rise in 1997 with the soon-to-be-published Gayteways. The publication of Gayteways will likely leave us with a net loss for the year 1997...unless income for the year rises to meet the added expenses.

In general though, LSF is on solid financial ground right now and looks to remain there for the foreseeable future.
