# Have You Visited the "LSF Bookstore"?

A few months ago, Lambda Sci-Fi joined forces with one of the World Wide Web's most successful business ventures, Amazon Books. Amazon Books is the world's biggest bookstore, with millions of titles and doors that are open 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.... because it only exists "on-line."

Late in 1996, Lambda Sci-Fi applied for and was granted "Affiliate" status with Amazon Books, an alliance with great potential for both Amazon and LSF. The process was simple: all Lambda Sci-Fi had to do was set up virtual links from books mentioned in reviews, booklists, etc., to Amazon's web page for that title. Then, if someone goes from LSF's website to Amazon's through one of these links and purchases the book in question from Amazon, here's what happens: said individual will get great service from Amazon Books and will be indirectly supporting Lambda Sci-Fi - because LSF receives 8% of the sale price! Amazon is better than your local bookstore, because they offer many books that just aren't available at most bookstores (about 75-80% of LSF's recommended booklist, including some of those "hard-to-find" titles).

Amazon Books sends LSF a report each week on how many people (continued on page 2)

Roche (Cleis); Swords of the Rainbow, edited by Eric Garber & Jewelle Gomez (Alyson); Women Who Run With Werewolves, edited by Pam Keesey (Cleis).

One of the nominees in the "Anthologies/Fiction" category - Night Bites, edited by Victoria Brownworth (Seal) - also contains stories in the sf/fantasy genre (vampire stories).

(For a complete listing of nominees in all the categories, check out a recent issue of *The Lambda Literary Report* or *The Blade* - or drop by a "friendly neighborhood bookstore," such as Lambda Rising or Lammas.)

And there you have it. The clock is now ticking. The judges (110 total, divided amongst the various cat-



egories) will have until April 30th to evaluate the nominees for literary excellence. For you, however, the deadline isn't quite so tight - the recipients won't be announced until May 30th. (That's the date the Awards will be presented at a gala banquet at the Midland Hotel in Chicago - on the eve of the BookExpo America Convention.) So, that gives you a couple of months to get out there, read 'em, and make your choices before the winners are announced! (It certainly sounds like a labor of love to me!)

# Bending the Landscape: Fantasy

(White Wolf/Borealis, 1997) reviewed by Carl Cipra



The first volume of *Bending the* Landscape, a new

three-volume anthology of gay/lesbian F&SF short fiction, hit the bookstands about a month ago. It's called *Bending the Landscape: Fantasy*; and if this book is any indication of what the entire series will be like, then I'm really looking forward to the upcoming two companion volumes (reportedly entitled *BtL: Science Fiction* and *BtL: Horror*).

In this volume's Forward, editors Nicola Griffith and Stephen Pagel say that their intention was to have "queer writrs write fantasy for the first time and genre writers explore queer characters" and to feature works by "a group of talented newcomers and award-winning genre veterans." And, to my mind, they've made some great choices for this anthology! This is a collection of well-written fantasy with "queer themes" by authors who seem to have a "feel" for the genre - not just gay/lesbian erotica with a thin veneer of fantasy slathered on.

In case the names of the editors seem somehow familiar to you, just let me remind you that Nicola Griffith is a two-time winner of the Lambda Literary Award in the category of "Fantasy and Science Fiction" (for her novels Ammonite and Slow River); and Stephen Pagel is Director of Sales at White Wolf Publishers (known for publishing fine works of F&SF), as well as a frequent Gaylaxicon guest.

Bending the Landscape: Fantasy features an excellent collection of 22 all-original pieces of gay/lesbian short fantasy fiction. Virtually all aspects of "fantasy" literature are explored: contemporary urban fantasies, a vampire tale, a few "Orientalist" fantasies, some ghost stories, some classic "high fantasy" tales - as well as a couple of stories that I personally would have classified as "science fiction."

It's always difficult to figure out which of an anthology's stories to include in a review, so I'll just mention a few of my personal favorites here. There's K.L. Berac's witty little magical mystery "Magicked Tricks," in which some friends try using unfamiliar magick to solve the apparent murder of a one-night-stand. There's Lisa Silverthorne's "The Sound of Angels," the poignant tale of a lesbian couple's last moments together - just the two of them, a mind-link, and a pod of killer whales. In "Expression of Desire," Dominick Cancilla relates an eerie story about a lesbian vampire-artist's unique "closet lifestyle." For fans of the "Thieves World/Sanctuary" shared universe, Robin Wayne Bailey has written a new story about the gladiator/ lovers Dismas and Gestus: it's entitled "The Stars Are Tears" and it's definitely a new twist on the old "boymeets-?" story. Ellen Kushner and Delia Sherman have teamed up (and what a high-powered team it is!) to coauthor "The Fall of Kings," which is set in the same world as Kushner's fabulous novel Swordspoint - but two generations later. And then there's perhaps my favorite, Tanya Huff's "In Mysterious Ways" - a delightful new story about Terizan the thief and her intrigues with the powers-that-be in the Thieves' Guild, this time involving the theft of a creatively-vengeful godling's eye.

There's some very entertaining reading in here! Not a clunker in the lot! If you're looking for enjoyable, well-written fantasy stories featuring gay and/or lesbian characters, then this book is a "must read." And definitely look for Bending the Landscape: Fantasy (and probably it's companion volumes, too!) among future lists of Lammy nominees!

#### Incident at Balticon 31

I spent this Easter weekend as I have so many other weekends over the years - enjoying a science fiction convention. This time it was Balticon 31, at the Omni Inner Harbor Hotel in beautiful harbor-side Baltimore (or is that *Blatimore*?).

Yessireee, a weekend of fascinating discussion panels to attend, favorite authors' autographs to get, lots'a great artwork to view in the artshow (yes, I bought more!), and, of course, books, books, books... All this and the Inner Harbor, too - plus the added treat this year of dinner and romance with Mike! (Sigh!) All in all, a wonderful, enjoyable weekend - BUT there was an unexpected blot of darkness and bigotry in this otherwise idyllic holiday weekend...

This is the first time in twentysomething years of attending science fiction conventions that I have ever heard of artwork being defaced in one of the art shows!

I had, of course, already made a pass through the artshow on Friday night - scoping out the earlybirds and looking to see if there was anything worth bidding for. So far, so good. On Saturday afternoon, however, when I was contemplating another run-through to see what had been added, I ran into Lara Van Winkle in the hallway and she asked me if I'd heard that someone had defaced some of the artwork that Tristan Alexander had displayed in the



art show! As you may know, Tristan's art tends toward the erotic and is often controversial, due to the apparent prepubescent nature of some the figures depicted. Well, two such watercolor pieces had, indeed, been defaced with broad black ink marker slashes across the genetalia. Tristan was, understandably, distraught - he'd never heard of this sort of vandalism at a con either! Oh, to be sure, over the years some pieces have been stolen from con artshows; but, as Tristan told me: "That's not quite the same thing. At least you can sort of view theft as a compliment - that someone liked your art well enough to steal it! But this ...!?"

I'm happy to report that no other artwork in the show was damaged, not even a couple of "blatantly male" fantasy pieces by Heather Bruton. (She's really quite good at animé-style male erotica!) Of course, her works were displayed much higher up on the panel and covered with clear plastic; but that certainly doesn't excuse the vandalism of Tristan's art on the grounds that it was "easier to get at." The way I figure it, if someone

doesn't like Tristan's art, then he/she shouldn't look at it! And if someone really objects to it, then he/she should complain to the ConComm, write a letter to the editor, and/or stay out of the artshow altogether! What gave this scumbag the right to "censor" what other people see!? And the stealthy, sneaky, cowardly nature of this particular act of vandalism really frosts me, too! (At least that wacko who went after the Piéta all those years ago had the guts to try it in front of witnesses!)

Tristan chose to leave the art displayed in its vandalized state, along with a handwritten note deploring the perpetrator's actions and asking that anyone with knowledge about said scum please contact the con authorities.
