An Embarassment of Riches

Argh! It's a literary avalanche! So many of my favorite authors have had new books hit the stores recently that I find itvery difficult to figure out just where to begin on my "read itnow" list! All of the following works will (I have no doubt) provide me with hours of excellent, enjoyable reading. (And, since many of themunfortunately - are only out in hardback at present, they're also doing quite a number on my bank account!) In no particular order, here's a listing of my faves:

I just finished reading Mary Doria Russell's *Children of God*, the sequel to her previous best-seller, *The Sparrow*. Both these novels were reviewed in last month's newsletter. Suffice it to say that they're both great!

Not long ago, I read Harry Turtledove's excellent alternate history novel, *How Few Remain* (now out in paperback, by the way). It's a "novel of the 2nd War Between the States," some 20 years after the Civil War of our own history. Now Turtledove is continuing the action of this timeline in *The Great War: American Front*. It's an alternate WWI novel, in which the USA (under Pres. Teddy Roosevelt) enters the war on the side of the Kaiser's Germany and the Confederacy (under Pres. Woodrow Wilson) enters on the side of its old allies England and France.

Big news! Melissa Scott's newest novel has just hit the stands! It's entitled *The Shapes of Their Hearts*. The multiple-Lammy-winning author appears to be carrying on her exploration of things "cyber" with a story about some sort of cyber-God. If you've read any of Melissa Scott's works over the past few years, you know you can't afford to miss this one!

Mike Resnick has always been a favorite author of mine. His latest novel, A Hunger in the Soul, is another of his explorations (via space opera) of African history themes. This time is looks like an SF version of the Stanley & Livingtone story.

I haven't even gotten around to reading Jack McDevitt's *Eternity Road* (a

Skin, by Kathe Koja

At the end of the 1980's, horror was a dying genre. Stuck in neutral with tired old plots and lifeless stories, it just seemed to be waiting for someone to pull the plug. But like the terrifying beasts of old, the horror genre fought back; and it did so with people like Kathe Koja. The power of the reborn horror movement was in the acknowledgement that blood did not scare us any more, monsters didn't scare us anymore - what scared us was ourselves and the things we could do and think. Sure, the weird and macabre unknown, the world of vampires and beasties, has its place in horror; but for horror to come alive again it had to be infused with emotion - the emotion of people. The biggest purveyor of this new breed of horror was Dell's "Abyss" line of books (long since faded away). Abyss gave rise to a bevy of new and powerful writers who could scare the bejezuz out of us - not with blood and gore, but with the mind. Kathe Koja was one of their biggest breakout stars. Her first novel, The Cipher, stormed the horror establishment; and she was well on her way to remaking the genre into not only a scary one, but a literary one, too. She continued with Bad Brains and followed that with Strange Angels. Skin

is her fourth novel, and the experience shows.

Skin is the story of two female artists - one a metalsmith and the other a dancer-cum-performance artist. Both are seeking perfection through their chosen art; and their collaboration leads to obsession and beyond. Together they create a horrific mix of humanity and machine, in a new form of performance art that brings them both to the brink, testing the boundaries of art. Inevitably, their shared passion for expression leads them to a physical relationship; and this relationship only serves to push one of the two into darker realms of body modification, pain, and oblivion.

As with all of her stories, Koja creeps quietly into the back of our minds, teasing us with images and actions that each take us one step further along a dark path - until we suddenly realize that (like our fascination with accident scenes) we can't turn away, despite the discomfort. And the reader is made to feel uncomfortable because, after all, there's only a fine line separating us from *Skin*'s two protagonists; and that thin line's edges are blurry. Rating: 8.5 out of 10

post-Apocalyptic novel) and *now* he's got another new book out - *Moonfall*. It deals with what has become a *very* popular storyline recently - a cometary collision. But this time "ground zero" is the Moon.

Kim Newman (of Anno Dracula fame) teamed up with Eugene Byrne to write Back in the USSA. It's an alternate history novel where "the Revolution of 1917" didn't happen in Czarist Russia - it happened here in the good old US of A!

A fairly new favorite author of mine is Michael Flynn. His most recent novel, *Rogue Star*, is a dynamite follow-up to his *Firestar*. Together (along with a 3rd novel in the works) they form a panoramic near-future series about one woman's drive to save Earth from a possible future collision with any NEO (near-Earth object). She's literally trying to get

the world to change its wasteful ways so humanity can concentrate on saving itself.

Fortunately, there are a few *pa*-perbacks in the list, too:

Tanya Huff (author of the terrific "Victory Nelson" novels) has a new standalone contemporary fantasy novel out - Summon the Keeper. It's a "felines and fantasy" novel. Tanya's partner, Fiona Patton, has her second big "high fantasy" novel on the stands. The Painter Knight takes place in the same universe as her first novel, The Stone Prince, although Painter seems to take place in a previous generation. Finally, for those of you "military SF" fans out there, there's More Than Honor. It's a collection of three new adventures of "Honor Harrington," SF's female version of Horatio Hornblower, as



Small Soldiers. Joe Dante's tale of military action figures that come to life and battle each other...and nearby humans. Sound familiar? (7/10)

Mask of Zorro. Antonio Banderas in a mask and black cape - hubba, hubba! (And Anthony Hopkins as a Spaniard?) (7/17)

Billy's Hollywood Screen Kiss. A gay love story that got good reviews at Sundance. (7/24)
