

As reported in the last newsletter, Jack Frost had asked us to elect a successor for the role of Network Representative. Having duly reported the vacancy and informed folks that elections would be held in May, we rolled along with electing a new Network Representative. After a quick recap of what the position entails, Tim stepped forward to nominate himself for the role. No one else was nominated and Tim was elected with cheers and whoops.

After some discussion, the club voted for the following plan: paid members of the club will be able to order books at 20% off the cover price, while non-paid members will be able to order books at 10% off the cover price. All books must be pre-paid to LSF; and orders will be sent to Meisha Merlin whenever at least 6 books have been ordered. All books will be shipped to the same address and distributed at LSF meetings. LSF will keep a 20% commission on books bought by paid members and a 30% commission on books bought by nonpaid members. Rob is dealing with Stephe to get the new project rolling. and we should be ready to begin ordering at the June meeting!

Jen reported that she hadn't yet received new listings for the "LSF Recommends" reading list. New listings must be sent to her no later than May 30th - either to the LSF PO Box or by email to gryphon@clark.net. Listings received after May 30th will be added to the online listing but won't make it to the print version until the \*next\* print run. Jen also brought up the idea of contacting publishers about receiving "review" copies of books. The club gave her a hearty go-ahead. Finally, Jen and others suggested that LSF look into getting more local authors to show up for readings at meetings or at non-meeting events. Everyone thought this was a good idea. Jen and Peter reminded everyone to watch for the upcoming MW Magazine, with a cover photo and article about gays & science fiction and Lambda Sci-Fi.

Finally, we scheduled several LSF events for June. LSF will have a table at Montgomery County Pride in Rockville on Sunday, June 6th. On Saturday, June 12th, we will have a combined June meeting & "Pre-Pride Video/Potluck" Party at Kay & Nan's home in Rockville beginning at 4:00PM.

# Destroying Angel by Richard Paul Russo

a review from Rob

Well, the whole point of our annual book exchange is to share our favorites with others in the club. This year, following the suggestion that size \*does\* matter, I managed to garner a collection of three books as my booty from the book exchange. The three books were all cyber-ish in nature, and had been brought by our very own Uber-Geek. Kay. One of the three books was one I had specifically been looking for for a while, so regardless of how the others turned out, I knew I'd be happy. It turned out that only one of the three was a real disappointment...boy did I win! Here's my review of the one I'd been searching for.

Destroying Angel is the first of Russo's hard-edged future San Francisco novels. The main protaganist of the later books. Detective Frank Carlucci, plays a secondary role here, as ex-cop Tanner struggles to solve a grisly string of serial murders. As bodies pile up - found in pairs, chained together in a death embrace, angel wings tattooed on them - Tanner races to find the killer. Thrown into the mess is a mysterious young woman who may be Tanner's long-lost daughter. The city is a gritty, dark place in Russo's novels - life is cheap, chaos stalks the streets, and yet hope somehow survives. The layers of the mystery are unfolded slowly, as Russo pulls us deeper into the underbelly of the city on Tanner's quest to end the murder spree. The atmosphere is intense, and Russo's skill is evident in the development of this decaying world of the future.

Having already read the later novels, it was a treat to see the beginnings of Russo's future San Francisco. If I were to identify one weakness it would be in Russo's main characters. He often seems afraid to really delve into their psyches, instead skimming the surface and letting events and atmosphere carry them along. In another type of setting, it wouldn't work; here it can succeed because that's

#### How to Get There?

The party will be held at Julian's home in Georgetown (site of numerous LSF "Video Madness" parties in the past). It's located at 1928 37th St., NW, several blocks west of Wisconsin Ave.

By Metrorail/Metrobus: Take the Red line to Dupont Circle. Exit at

either side of the station; then head for the part of P Street west of the Circle. (That's the part with all the bars, restaurants, etc.). Go to the 2nd Metrobus shelter from the Circle (across the street from Oasis Deli and Pan Asian Restaurant) - NOT the first one, which is in front of the old public restrooms. Take the D2 Metrobus, which will stop just up the street from Julian's house. Or, you can take the D4 and get off at R & 37th streets (about 5 blocks from Julian's). For the bus schedule, call Metro information at (202) 637-7000.

Driving, from the North: Going south on Wisconsin (from the direction of National Cathedral), you'll pass Mass. Ave. Just after Calvert St., 37th St. splits off to the right from Wisconsin (as Wisconsin swerves to the left). In about a half mile, 37th St. passes through Whitehaven Park and intersects White Haven Parkway. Julian's place is just beyond White Haven Parkway, on your right.

Driving, from the South: Going north on Wisconsin (from the direction of "M" St.), you'll need to take a left on some street to get to 37th St. If you turn left on Reservoir Rd. or on "R" St., you'll need to turn right on 37th St., and Julian's place will be a ways on your left. If you go further up Wisconsin to White Haven Parkway (near the "social Safeway"), you'll turn left on White Haven Pkwy, and then left again on 37th St. Julian's home will be on your right.

Where to Park: Your best bet for parking is either along White Haven Parkway or along "T" St.

the nature of the world Russo portrays.

Make no mistake, Destroying Angel is not for the soft of heart. The book is gruesome and disturbing at times, but it tells a fundamentally powerful story. Russo is a writer to watch, and I highly recommend it and the other two books in the series: Carlucci's Heart and Carlucci's Edge.



# Rainbow Mars by Larry Niven

In this story Hanvill Svetz, our hero, lives on a future Earth that is environmentally degraded from ours. Humans have 'evolved' and can breath an atmosphere higher in carbon dioxide. Many life forms are extinct. It is Svetz's regular job to travel back in time and bring samples back. He gets a new assignment: go to Mars when it had life and find out why it no longer does.

He and his crew find the ultimate 'beanstalk' and it is soon being fought over by the various Martian species. The beanstalk is a useful 'natural' orbital tower. But it loves water - enough said. So when it disengages itself from Mars and heads for Earth, things really get interesting. Our hero uses time travel to try and save Earth from the same fate that befell Mars.

Apparently, this novel meshes several of Larry Niven's earlier works from as far back as 1969; but he is able to hold all of this together and weave a very believable story. You may enjoy it, too.

# William Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream

What's this?! A review of a film based on a play by *Shakespeare?!* Why on earth is *this* in the LSF newsletter?! Several reasons, actually...

First of all, the content. Most people think of Shakespeare's plays as historical dramas, historical comedies, period pieces, or "costume" pieces. Yet Shakespeare often included fantasy elements in his plays - the ghost of Hamlet's father comes to mind. He also wrote a couple of outright "high fantasies" - A Midsummer Night's Dream is one of them. Fairies, spirits, magic potions, and magical transformations abound in the play - and this latest film version (adapted for the screen and directed by Michael Hoffman) relies on cinematic "magic" to make this Shakespearean fantasy all that much more visually appealing.

True, the setting is no longer Shakespeare's version of classical Athens in the time of the legendary Theseus. Hoffman has successfully transplanted this gentle comedy to the walled town of "Monte Athena," somewhere in the hilly Tuscan countryside circa 1895. (Trust me, it loses nothing in the translation!) The term "gently picturesque" comes to mind. To heighten the visual contrast between the mundane world and the Realm of Faerie, the sights and fashions of late 19thcentury Italy are set against a very different set of stylistic values. The motifs and images for Oberon, Titania, Puck, and their fantastical friends are drawn primarily from ancient Etruscan frescoes and the works of Pre-Raphaelite and Symbolist painters (such as Burne-Jones and Gustave Moreau). juxtaposition of "reality" and "unreality" is charmingly carried even into the final scene of the film, when Puck delivers the closing lines dressed as a poor street-sweeper, his satyr-horns revealed in the moonlight when he takes off his cap. Nicely done! Kudos to Luciana Arrighi, the production designer!

Then there's the cast. The "big names" are Michelle Pfeiffer (Titania), Kevin Kline (Bottom), Calista Flockhart (Helena), Rupert Everett (Oberon), and Stanley Tucci (Puck) - they're all wonderful, of course! (And you've certainly got to commend them for the inspired choice of Rupert Everett as the King of the Fairies!) The "supporting" cast also puts in a nice job: Anna Friel (Hermia), Dominick West (Lysander), David Strathairn (Theseus), Christian Bale (Demetrius), Sophie Marceau (as a stunning Hippolyta), and many more.



And, guys, if you're up for a bit of "perving" (as the Aussies put it), then this is the film for you. West and Bale are charming when dressed in their Victorian finery - but, trust me, they're positively yummy when wandering around the forest in less than full attire! West spends much of the time with only a gauzy something wrapped around his hips - and both West and Bale are artfully (and tastefully) "displayed in the all-together" toward the end of that fantastical Midsummer Night. let's not forget Rupert Everett as Oberon! (Sigh! I certainly can't!) Now, where was I? Oh, ves...

One of the key characters of the play is, of course, Nick Bottom the Weaver - here portrayed so very well by Kevin Kline - but Hoffman has gone beyond Bottom the buffoon and egotist to bring us Bottom the dreamer. Yes, Hoffman's version of Bottom still gives

us lots to laugh about and laugh at; but, by the end of the film, Bottom has also become a figure of remorse, one who evokes our sympathy as well. Bottom's magical transformation is handled uniquely and brilliantly. Rather than simply capping Kline with a donkey's head (the usual strategy for this play), Gabriella Pescucci (designer) and Paul Engelen (make-up artist) have devised a brilliant variation that is both charming and comic. (You'll just have to watch the film to see what I mean.)

Finally, if you're looking for laughs, then you'll find 'em here, too. Yes, A Midsummer Night's Dream is a Shakespearean "comedy"; and there are occasional bits of "business" throughout the film that will evoke giggles and smiles and titters. But the performance of "Pyramus and Thisby" (the playwithin-a-play at the Duke's wedding feast) is a comedy in every sense of the word - it's definitely played for laughs, with schtick and slapstick enough to crack up any audience. (And yet, at the same time, it also contains one of the most endearing scenes in the entire film!)

There's certainly a lot to enjoy about William Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream. At the close, Puck says: "Give me your hands, if we be friends..." I've always assumed that was Shakespeare's way of asking the audience for applause. If so, then this film has certainly merited my applause! (And I'll definitely want a copy for my video library when it becomes available!)
