A first novel by Ray Vukcevich, *The Man of Maybe Half-a-Dozen Faces* is a delightful title that covers a wonderfully quirky story. While a mystery, is it weird enough to be called a fantasy. The lead character is a private detective with multiple personality disorder; really, these are lead *characters*. This "group" is tracking down a serial killer who is strangling people who wrote bad documentation to computer programs. And if you have not yet run out to your local bookstore screaming "Give me this book!", wait, there's more.

The story opens in Eugene, Oregon, with Skylight Howell, the personality with the PI skills. His is a sort d noir perspective, with beautiful women and bad liquor, but all with a different twist, such as hallucinations of trained seals. His other "disguises" include Dennis (the Math guy), Lulu (who has a feminine outlook), and Dieter (who knows the secret ingredient in good Mexican food). All these and a few other personalities get along fine and cooperate. Actually they make doing detective work easier, for as Skylight muses, he can see the cases from various perspectives at once. While the multiple personality disorder may be a plus, our heroes still have a problem, a monkey on their back: an addiction to tap dancing. When the mood calls, a night -- or maybe even days -- can be spent in such seedy dives as Gotta Dance, where one can get "Karaoke tap 24 hours a day".

Skylight and crew are hired by the beautiful-but-slang-impaired Prudence Deerfield to find her missing brother Pablo and clear him of charges that he murdered his business partner. The team checks though many channels, starting with the Internet, looking at such sources as alt.dicks and www.deadguys.com. The Internet is a valuable resource of news, gossip and therapy for Skylight and Co.: they even use private chat rooms to discuss the

case amongst themselves. The book is not all armchair mystery and highlights of downtown Eugene. Nor is this the only case that the agency has: one involves following a high school nemesis (now police lieutenant) to prove marital infidelity; the other is a client who want to track down one of the personalities to start up a computer software company.

While not essential to enjoying the book, a passing familiarity with computers and the Internet is helpful, as some of the plot rests on them. Many of the interesting twists revolve around these topics. For example, as the plot thickens, a software company named EES keeps cropping up. Eventually it is revealed that this company is based in Russia and is an acronym for Evil Empire Software. But this book is not all keyboard and networks. There are break-ins and fights, trailings and interrogations: all one could hope for in a mystery. But, again, with a unique twist. So if you have not yet run out to your bookstore, go out and demand your copy now. ΛΨΦ

According to Rodney, "I first heard of LSF through Bob Summersgill, who was spending time with me on a volunteer computer programming project for SMYAL back in 1993 and who dragged me to a meeting. I have always been very impressed with LSF, mostly because it is the only volunteer organization that I belong to that has a regular, published, monthly newsletter."

Two members wrote in to say that they heard about LSF from the Gaylactic Network. Allan M. remembers, "I heard about LSF by invitation when the Gaylaxians International, for those of us at a distance, was closed. I think I ran across the Gaylactic Network online...but I forget exactly how... In any case I was happy to find some folks who shared my interests." 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Lord Raglan and *Dune* by Carl Cipra

At the Jan. 25th meeting of the LSF Book Discussion Group, the topic was Frank Herbert's *Dune*. Had I been able to attend, I would have liked to discuss how Paul Muad'ib's story reflects the life patterns of the mythical "hero". Unfortunately, I wasn't able to attend that meeting; and Rob suggested that I put the information into an article in the LSF newsletter. (If you haven't heard *why* I wasn't able to attend, feel free to ask.) OK, here goes...

Eons and eons ago, Frank Herbert made a guest appearance at a college science fiction class I was attending. During the Q&A session at the end of his presentation, Herbert informed us that he had written *Dune Messiah* in order to complete "Lord Raglan's hero cycle" for Paul Muad'ib. OK, so who's "Lord Raglan," you ask? (*We* certainly did.)

FitzRoy Richard Somerset, 4th Baron Raglan, was an eminent English ethnologist. He theorized that the various "hero" stories were all reflections of some long-forgotten, ages-old reality: the figure of the sacred hero-king who figured as a part of prehistoric religious ritual. Raglan researched the parallel "lives" of various mythical heroes and classified their stories into a series of 22 archetypal incidents (sometimes called "Lord Raglan's Scale"). The "higher" a hero's "score" on this scale (*i.e.* the more of these 22 incidents that show up in the hero's life story), the more closely that particular hero reflects the "sacred hero-king" archetype. Raglan formally published his theory in *The Hero: A Study in Tradition, Myth, and Drama* (1936). Here's the list of 22 archetypal incidents from that book:

(1) The hero's mother is a royal virgin. (2) His father is a king and (3) often a near relative of the mother, but(4) the circumstances of his conception are unusual, and (5) he is also reputed to be the son of a god. (6) At birth an attempt is made, usually by his father or maternal grandfather, to kill him, but (7) he is spirited away and (8) reared by fosterparents in a far country. (9) We are told nothing of his childhood, but (10) on reaching manhood he returns or goes to his future kingdom. (11) After a victory over the king and/or giant, dragon, or wild beast, (12) he marries a princess, often the daughter of his predecessor, and (13) becomes a king. (14) For a time he reigns uneventfully and (15) prescribes laws but (16) later loses favor with the gods and/or his people and (17) is driven from the throne and the city, after which (18) he meets with a mysterious death, (19) often at the top of a hill. (20) His children, if any, do not succeed him. (21) His body is not buried, but nevertheless (22) he has one or more holy sepulchres.

According to Raglan's study, Oedipus has the highest "score" (21). Some of the others he rated were: Theseus (20), Moses (20), King Arthur (19), Dionysus (19), Romulus (18), Hercules (17), Bellerophon (16), Gilgamesh (15), Jason (15), and Robin Hood (13). Raglan also demonstrated that actual, historical personages always score much lower on this scale than mythical heroes. Depending on how certain aspects of his life are interpreted, Alexander the Great (7) scores rather higher than all other historical personages. Raglan "declined" to apply the scale to Jesus of Nazareth; but in a more contemporary study, "The Hero Pattern and the Life of Jesus," folklorist Alan Dundes gives Jesus a score of 19.

While searching around in the Web, I was able to find the following scores for a couple of F&SF characters: James T. Kirk (13); and Harry Potter (8 out of a possible 11 -- after all, his story isn't finished yet). By my own count, Luke Skywalker also scores 8 out of a possible 11. (We're still missing Episodes 2, 3, 7, 8, and 9.)

Having said all that, I leave it to you to check over the list and see for yourself how many "points" Paul Muad'ib racks up. Have fun! (There'll be a test later.)

Business Meeting

Carl advised that he is still looking into the details for a possible LSF trip to Luray Caverns in Virginia. Rob reported that Severna Park has agreed to do a reading at the May LSF meeting. Rob, Peter and Carl asked for volunteers who would be willing to receive the LSF monthly newsletter electronically. (The newsletter would be in Adobe Acrobat PDF format.)

Kay reported that the Atlanta Outlanders group appears to be adopting a version of the LSF bylaws. (The ultimate compliment!) She reported that Hal Halmer Hague advises that function room space is probably available for us to use at the Balticon hotel. A GLBT party would be held at the room between 9:00 PM and 12:00 PM on May 25th (Saturday night).

Proposals

<u>Michael's Proposal</u>: "I propose that all voting pertaining to club business be conducted by secret ballot." There was discussion about the mechanics of implementing a secret ballot.

<u>Kay's Proposal</u>: "Propose that Lambda Sci Fi authorize funds to support DC Pride based on the following contingencies: Need commitment from at least 2 volunteers to coordinate the ΛΨΦ

entire day's information booth, involved in setup and take down (*i.e.* two bodies must be available at all times; they don't have to be the same bodies). Costs do not exceed 10% of last year's table."

<u>Barrett's Proposal</u>: "Lambda Sci Fi will participate in Black Lesbian and Gay Pride 2001 by sponsoring and staffing an information booth at the festival at a cost of \$150 and any other expenses incidental to staffing and supplying the booth."

Kay's Emergency Proposal: Because Youth Pride is scheduled in the very near future, Kay asked for an

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emergency vote for participation in the event. "Propose that Lambda Sci Fi authorize funds to support Youth Pride based on the following contingencies: Need commitment from at least 2 volunteers to coordinate the entire day's information booth, involved in setup and take down (*i.e.* two bodies must be available at all times; they don't have to be the same bodies). Costs do not \$60"

This emergency proposal did not pass, because it did not achieve the required ³/₄ "yes" votes from members present. Therefore, this proposal will be voted on as a regular proposal at the April meeting.

Since Carl's abstention was one of the reasons for the proposal not passing, he offered to "front" the \$60 for Youth Pride, in case it proved necessary for the \$60 to be paid over before the club could vote on this measure next month..

Kay expressed interest in obtaining information from new LSF members on how they learned about the club. Peter agreed to revisit the LSF registration form to see if it could accommodate a new field for "How did you hear about us?"

The Speaker had submitted a proposal last month which was voted on at this meeting. **The proposal passed.** Text of her proposal is as follows:

The rule, "A written proposal for vote must be provided to the Secretary and an exact copy to the Speaker at the meeting where the proposal is made." Be amended to read: "A written proposal for vote must be provided to the Secretary and an exact copy to the Speaker at the meeting where the proposal is made, and that exact text provided by e-mail to the Speaker, the Secretary, and the Newsletter editor, if at all possible."

Michael solicited volunteers for the LSF social event committee.

DC Comics will be releasing a new comic book called *Codename: Knockout* about a straight woman and a gay man who are spies. The comic is being written by Robert Rodi, who also wrote the novel *What They Did to Princess Paragon.*

Helggi briefly described Furry Confusion, a furry con he attended back in January.

Carl passed around newsletters and a fanzine from Spaced Out, Inc., the Australia sci-fi GLBT group. He also praised the promos he's seen for the upcoming Disney animated movie about the search for Atlantis, coming out in June 2001.

Steve, a first-time visitor, advised that he is presently working on a science fiction book. He invited everyone to visit www.xernon.com.

Kurt volunteered his Capitol Hill home on Saturday, April 21, for an LSF video party. (Details on page 1 of this issue of the newsletter.)

Kay and Nan reported that they had great fun at JohnCon, a gaming con at Baltimore's Johns Hopkins University. Nan was pleased to announce that her Water Faerie button character won the Button Man game tournament!

Kay: The *Farscape* series premiere is this week. *Cleopatra 2525* has been canceled. *Crusade* is coming to the Sci Fi Channel in April. *All Souls* begins in April. *Lexx* will be in reruns until July. It finally happened --Tara kissed Willow on *Buffy, The Vampire Slayer*! Episodes of classic *Star Trek* are now available on DVD.

Once again, Rob promoted the Spectrum Awards. He reminded us that the awards results will be announced at World Con.

The original Star Trek move

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Basho and the Fox by Tim Myers (Marshall Cavendish, 2000) reviewed by Carl Cipra



As I've said before, I'm a sucker for illustrated children's books. *Basho and the Fox* is one of my latest finds. At least in part, I suppose this book caught my eye because of Rob's "haiku minutes" (featured in the

December 2000 LSF newsletter).

Basho was the pseudonym of Matsuo Munefusa, who lived in the 17th Century and is considered to have been one of Japan's greatest poets. In this book, Tim Myers has made up his own delightful little tale about Basho and his meeting with a kitsune (sort of a foxspirit). The story is set during a time when the master haiku writer is living as a hermit in the village of Fukagawa (central Hokkaido). One day, Basho meets a kitsune, "the leader of all the foxes in these mountains," who disputes the poet's exclusive ownership of the delicious late-summer cherries on a particular tree. The kitsune states that foxes are the greatest poets in the world and that he will concede ownership of the cherries only if (given 3 chances) Basho can write "one good haiku". What unfolds is a combination of a trickster tale and a story of artistic inspiration. Myers has even included one of Basho's actual poems ("probably the most famous haiku ever written"):

> An old pond. A frog jumps in. The sound of water.

Myers' narrative is brought to life by the delightful watercolor illustrations of Oki S. Han. "Furry" fans will no doubt enjoy her depiction of the foxes as anthropomorphic figures dressed in colorful *yukatas* (lightweight summer kimonos).

It's because of books like *Basho and the Fox* that I'm such a fan of illustrated children's literature.

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Hard Heroes (an Adult DVD) Peter Knapp,

For fun, my partner and I decided to rent an adult DVD. We were in-

trigued by the multiple angle feature that many of these DVDs offered. While at the store, the packaging of a DVD called *Hard Heroes, The Director's Cut* caught our eye. It featured very hunky men in superhero tights. While multiple angles were not available in this DVD, we figured a genre porn flick could be fun. We should have read the back sleeve more closely. Little did we know that we would be seeing bondage racks, vacuum bags, slime pits, and mind control butt plugs!

The movie starts promisingly enough, especially since it is presented in Dolby Digital. Our six heroes are shown in various states of relaxing, from sunbathing, to making love. Their leisure is interrupted by a call from their commander-in-chief. Before joining him at headquarters, they all have to get into their spandex. A lot of time is spent putting on their costumes, with a lot of crotch adjusting and buttock shaping. For those with spandex fetishes, the extended dressing sequences should be quite alluring.

At the meeting, the chief briefs our heroes on their mission; they must protect a scientist who fears his cloning technology is going to be stolen. We also learn the names and powers of our heroes: Speed Demon, Omega, Thunder, Lightning, Razor, and Edge. As with all good superhero groups, there's а speedster, a brainiac, a controller of elements, and a strong man. True to the genre, the leader is charismatic, the strong man is rough around the edges, and the newbie's worth to the group has yet to be proved. The six head off to the factory and, of course, into a trap.

One by one, they are captured and tortured by the villain. He is after their powers, as villains often are prone to do. In a porn twist, he steals their powers through the heroes' semen, which he extracts via a bondage rack, a vacuum bag, and a slime pit, among other toys. With so much emphasis put on the toys, the actual sex is mostly of a manual variety. There is almost no oral or anal action in this movie, for which I found the movie rather limp.

I would not recommend this movie unless you get your kicks from the above-mentioned toys. While the men are cute, the spandex is tight, and the comic book tropes are present, the eroticism is not. Watching people getting milked against their will is not my idea of fun.

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(*Star Trek: The Motion Picture*) will be cleaned up and re-edited. Some of the boring parts will be removed. Robert Wise, the original director, will be working on the project.

Rob: The BBC may provide a *Doctor Who* film in 2001. A British actor will play Doctor Who. Disney will produce a sequel to *Tron*.
