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Passages

by Connie Willis (Bantam Books, 2001) a review by Colleen R. Cahill

Author Connie Willis has dealt with death in her books before: her award-winning novel *Doomsday Book* describes the demise of a village in 14th-century England. Her new work, *Passage*, deals with near death experience (or NDE). Several popular nonfiction books on this phenomenon describe it as seeing a light at the end of a tunnel, floating above one's body in an hospital, meeting angels, all while being clinically dead. The Willis novel looks at this subject with a broad eye, showing several sides of the nature and purpose of NDE.

Dr. Joanna Lander is a psychologist who is researching NDE. She gathers most of her information through hospital interviews of people who recently had an NDE, talking to them as soon as possible after the event. The bane of her existence is Maurice Mandrake, an author of popular works on NDE. His books are the type that describe the light at the end of the tunnel, and he sees NDE as proof that: God exists; there is an afterlife; and the dead can communicate with the living. Joanna has a more neutral view and finds Mandrake's poor interviewing techniques, typified by leading questions and encouraging certain remembrances, very destructive to her work. Seeking answers, she begins a research project with Dr. Richard Wright. discovered a way to chemically induce NDE, and he wants to use volunteers to test his theory that it is strictly a reaction of the brain to imminent death. While Joanna leans more toward Dr. Wright's view of NDE, she is still not sure if he is completely correct, especially after she becomes one of the volunteers to undergo the chemical NDE.

Joanna's sessions keep taking her back to a dark passage with a light at one end. Because she can repeatedly undergo NDE, she learns that she is constantly going back to the same place. She is shocked to discover she is aboard the Titanic as it has begun to sink. This

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revelation opens a whole series of questions and investigations for her. She wonders if all NDE's are actually taking place on the Titanic, especially after she meets a hospital patient who recently died during one of her sessions. Some unlikely characters assist her in the investigation, including a little girl with a weak heart and Joanna's high school English teacher, who is now suffering from Alzheimer's disease.

While a book about death would seem very dark and depressing, Willis handles this topic with a human touch. The sadness and pain of dying is portrayed with realism and countered with the love and caring for both the dying person and for those around them. *Passage* is a book about death, but it is full of life and worth the trip.

This year's winner is *The Kappa Child*, by Hiromi Goto.

2002 Lambda Literary Awards

They are sponsored by the Lambda Literary Foundation, The Lambda Book Report, and The James White Review. Closest Metro Stop: Take Metro to the "U" St/African-American Civil War Memorial/Cardozo stop (Green Line). Exit Metro on the 13th Street side of station. When you come up the escalator, you'll be on "U" Street, facing 13th Street. There will be a Rite Aid drug store in front of you. Cross 13th Street toward the Rite Aid. Follow "U" Street to 14th Street. There will be a McDonald's at 14th Street. Cross 14th Street toward the McDonald's. Turn left in front of the McDonald's. Follow 14th Street for two full blocks. When you cross "T" Street, you'll pass a church which looks like a warehouse. When you cross Swann Street (which is between "T" and "S" Streets), you'll pass a 24-hour laundry. At "S" Street, hang a right. (If you cross "S" Street and pass a small used car lot, you've gone too far.) You'll pass the Whitman Walker Clinic and then an alley. We're the seventh row house after the alley, 1425 "S" Street, NW. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.

Alternative Metro Stop: Take Metro to the Dupont Circle stop (Red Line). Exit the Metro on the "Q" Street side of the station. At the top of the escalator, hang a right on "O" Street. Follow "Q" Street and pass a liquor store on your right and a Wrap Works sandwich shop on your left. Travel five blocks, passing the Raku Asian restaurant at 19th Street, a couple of large apartment buildings at 18th Street (you'll also cross New Hampshire at a diagonal), a Trios Pizza restaurant at 17th Street, the Jewish Community Center at 16th Street, and row houses at 15th Street. Cross 15th Street and hang a left. Travel two blocks on 15th Street to "S" Street. Cross "S" Street and hang a right. We're of the way down the street, at 1425 "S" Street, NW. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.

Driving Directions: 1425 "S" Street, NW is located in the 1400 block of 14th Street, halfway between 14th and 15th Streets, which run North/South. 14th Street is a two-way street. 15th Street is a one-way street, heading

North. "S" Street is a two-way street and runs East/West.

From the North: Get onto 16th Street (Exit 31 on the Beltway), or Connecticut Avenue (Exit 33 on the Beltway), heading South. Turn left on "S" Street and follow "S" Street (6½ blocks from Connecticut Avenue; 2 blocks from 16th Street) to 1425 "S" Street, NW. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost

From the South: Get onto I-495 North. After crossing the Potomac River follow signs for US Route 1 (near the Thomas Jefferson Memorial). US Rte. 1 becomes 14th Street. Follow 14th Street to "S" Street. Turn left on "S" Street and follow "S" Street for ½ block, to 1425 "S" Street. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.

Parking: Street parking is generally available, though it is harder to find the later it gets. On weekends, there are no parking restrictions, but make sure not to park too close to street intersections, alleys, and fire hydrants -- or risk getting a ticket. Safe distances are usually marked.

During the business portion of the meeting, Rob and Peter advised that they would be hosting the post-Pride video party at their home in DC on Saturday, June 15,. Rodney volunteered to host a pre-Pride video party at his home in Silver Spring, MD on Friday, June 7. It was decided that the June LSF meeting would be held in conjunction with the Friday night pre-Pride video party.

The club voted unanimously for three minor changes to the LSF Operating Procedures, in response to recent changes in the structure of the Gaylactic Network. Among the changes is the elimination of the position of LSF's representative to the Gaylactic Network.

A hearty round of applause followed, with great thanks to Carl for all his hard work. Rob also advised that the same 144 issues were available on CD-ROM, with indexes to the reviews. He indicated that he will send copies to local and national history projects.

Rodney read from a dog-eared 1950's sci-fipulp magazine about thinking machines. He chuckled, because the article indicated that machines would never be able to successfully play chess. Ha!

Carl distributed info about the upcoming *Hulk* and *Daredevil* movies. Apparently, Ben Affleck will be playing Daredevil. There appeared to be much eagerness for the *Scooby Doo* movie. Also, there was some unimaginable interest expressed in the upcoming *Powerpuff Girls* movie. Poor nutrition perhaps.

Michael C. led a discussion about possible interest in collecting LSF reviews of local area movie theaters, restaurants, etc. Mike said that he would post an e-mail about this to the LSF listserv.

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Futureland by Walter Mosley

(Warner Books, 2001) a brief review by Carl Cipra

I've been a fan of Walter Mosley for some time now. It all started back in 1995, when I saw the movie Devil in a Blue Dress, starring Denzel Washington. (It's film noir -- no pun intended. Washington portrays "Easy" Rawlins, the main character in a series of popular mystery novels authored by Mosley. In this story, Rawlins, a recently-returned Korean War veteran, gets involved in a murder/mystery in 1948 Los Angeles -his "first case," as it were.) I liked the movie so much that I raced out to read the 1990 novel upon which the film is based and was instantly hooked on Mosley's works. Since then, I've been slowly working my way through his novels (mostly mysteries and/or social commentary fiction), savoring the experience a bit at a time.

So, imagine my delight when I discovered that Walter Mosley would be appearing at Millenium Philcon to do a reading! As it turned out, he read a chapter from his "soon-to-be-published" new novel, Futureland: Nine Stories of an Imminent World. (And let me say that Walter Mosley is one helluva dramatic reader, too!) Hooked again! I spent the next several months waiting impatiently for the novel to hit the bookstores. And, guess what? It was definitely worth the wait!

Futureland takes place in a near-future America, about a generation from now. And the America of Futureland is a strange, grim, technologically-wonderful place indeed -- very much a vision in the cyberpunk tradition. Many aspects of Mosley's near-future America are harsh and gritty, to all intents and purposes a science-fictional extension of the harsh, gritty streets of Los Angeles as portrayed in Mosley's contemporary fiction. Here are just a few of the features of Futureland's "brave new world":

- Common Ground: a section of every city in the world, where unemployed workers have to go when there is no other refuge for them. ("Beans and rice



to eat and a doorless sleep cubicle were the bare essentials of those consigned there.")

- <u>Pulse</u>: a "gene drug that alters the structure of the brain, temporarily allowing consciousness some measure of control over dreams." It's an addition from which death is the only withdrawal (aka "Pulsedeath").
- <u>Infochurch</u>: a new mega-corporate religious entity that preaches "God is a riddle and the world of science [is] filled with His clues." At facilities throughout the country, people kneel and offer their prayers, pleas, and confessions to computer terminals. This data is transmitted to the Infochurch's central Database of Hope and ultimately beamed out from its great Idaho transmitter (advertised as a "direct link to God") to Infinity, "God's fifth child."
- -- Angel Island: first (and most feared) of the offshore "non-national private prisons," where prisoners are controlled by ultra-sensitive packets of intravenous drugs. And, since the Supreme Court decision of 2022, it's been legal to suspend the citizenship -- and all rights thereof -- of any convict until such time as rehabilitation has been scientifically proven.

And if the world of *Futureland* isn't wild enough for you, here are some of the fascinatingly-colorful, wonderfully-depicted people who inhabit its streets:

- Fera Jones: a two-hundred-sixty-pound, six-foot-nine-inch female boxer who "looks like she was molded from iron." It's rumored that Fera is the product of "an outlawed genetics program that came out of the feminist studies department at Smith College" -- but that has never been proved.
- Folio Johnson: a hard-boiled private eye with some pretty nifty cyberaugmentations. He's sort of a sci-fi PI,

an extension of the street-wise black detectives featured in some of Mosley's contemporary fiction (such as "Easy" Rawlins and Fearless Jones). Johnson gets involved in a really bewildering case -- he's hired to find out who's systematically killing off a bunch of rich young neo-Nazis.

- <u>D'or Hallwell</u>: owner/operator of Hallwell's China Diner, an "eight-seat hole-in-the-wall" on Lower Thirty-third Street, "one of only five independently owned restaurants in all the Twelve Fiefs of New York". Her diner seems to be Folio Johnson's favorite hang-out.
- -- <u>Dr. Ivan Kismet</u>: the "eccentric" and unbelievably-wealthy CEO of MacroCode International. He owns his own fabulous island-nation (called "Home") off the Pacific coast of Mexico and is one of the most powerful men in the world -- if not *the* most powerful!

Each of these characters -- and several more -- has his/her own fascinating story to tell; and they all add up into an incredibly rich exploration of Mosley's "if-this-goes-on" vision of near-future America. At first it may seem that you're reading a series of independent stories in a "shared universe" (an impression seemingly corroborated by the book's subtitle: Nine Stories of an Imminent World); but Mosley has cleverly interwoven these various strands into a very satisfying whole, as one character's story impinges upon and inter-relates with others. Futureland is exciting; it's action-packed; and I couldn't help but feel the author grabbing me by the collar occasionally, pointing off into the future, and saying: "Look! Can't you see where we might be heading?!" If you've enjoyed reading some of Walter Mosley's contemporary fiction (such as Fearless Jones, Walkin' the Dog, Devil in a Blue Dress, or R.L.'s Dream), then I think you'll get a kick out of Futureland, too. I certainly did.

A final note: Futureland is actually Walter Mosley's second foray into the F&SF field; but, for some reason, I've never been jazzed enough by what I've heard about it to pick up a copy of Blue Light, his previous F&SF novel. Now that I've read Futureland, maybe I'll go back and read Blue Light, too.
