Well, it all started back in 1989, when both Gurney and Michael Brett-Surman (a staff scientist at the National Museum of Natural History) were attending the World Science Fiction Convention in Boston. As with so many things science-fictional, it all started in a hotel bar, when Brett-Surman overheard Gurney pitching the idea for Dinotopia to a publisher. One thing led


August 11th LSF Meeting

to another, and Brett-Surman offered his services for "strengthening the 'science' in Gurney's science fiction." The collaboration has lasted for over a decade.

And now Brett-Surman has coorganized an exhibition of Gurney's Dinotopia art at the Smithsonian's Museum of Natural History. The show features 30 of the oil paintings Gurney prepared for the Dinotopia books, as well as numerous unpublished paintings, watercolors, and preliminary studies. 

The Outpost by Mike Resnick

It's really kind'a neat when a couple of your "favorite things" come together – you know, sort'a like chocolate and peanut butter in those Reese's Peanut Butter Cup commercials. Well, in a more literary fashion, it happened for me reccently when one of my favorite authors wrote a novel dealing with one of my favorite F&SF themes.

The author is Mike Resnick – far and away one of my favorite authors. I must have dozens and dozens of his novels and collections of his shorter works. *Santiago, Ivory, Paradise, Purgatory, Inferno*, the "Kirinyaga" stories, the "Tales of the Velvet Comet" novels, and on and on and on – I've loved 'em all! In fact, there's only one Mike

There was some discussion about the upcoming WorldCon convention to be held Labor Day weekend in San Jose, CA. Many LSF members will be attending. Preliminary info will be posted in early August. And the Gaylactic Network is organizing a GLBT fandom suite for the weekend; events in the suite will include a Gaylaxicon promotion party.

Carl announced that he will once again help coordinate a GLBT fandom party at this November's Darkover convention, where Deborah Christian will be the guest author.

Rob made available some nongenre books that he received for free in the mail. It was noted that metacritic.com is a recommended source for reviews. Resnick novel that I *haven't* liked: a very early work of his entitled *Redbeard* (1969). To this day, I haunt the "R" section of the F&SF shelves of any bookstore or dealer's table I visit, hoping for the appearance of a new Resnick work – preferably in hardback.

And then there are the socalled "bar stories" - also known as "club stories" or "pub stories" - one of my favorite F&SF sub-genres. They're a type of frame story in which a number of patrons or "regulars" (mostly humans, but not always) are gathered at their favorite watering hole and someone ends up telling a story of some sort: a whimsical exploration of some sort of F&SF conundrum or a semi-serious exploration of some facet of the human experience - it could even be just a tall tale, a "shaggy dog story," or the set-up for an extended (and ghod-awful!) pun. Bar/club/pub stories have been around for a very long time; and they've appeared in F&SF magazines for well over half a century. Classic examples of the sub-genre are Arthur C. Clarke's Tales from the White Hart (US collection, 1957), L. Sprague de Camp's & Fletcher Pratt's Tales from Gavagan's Bar (collected 1953), and Spider Robinson's "Callahan's Crosstime Saloon" books and stories (starting with Callahan's Crosstime Saloon, collected 1977). As you might imagine, I've got quite a collection of 'em in my personal library.

And, now, here comes Mike Resnick with his contribution to the "bar story" sub-genre - The Outpost. That this novel is, in fact, an intentional addition to the "bar story" sub-genre is obvious from the book's dedication page. In addition to his wife, Carol, Resnick dedicated this book to "the Outpost's progenitors: Rick's Café Américain, The Monkey Bar, Gavagan's Bar, Joe the Angel's City Hall Bar, Wallace's, The White Hart, Tchoka's, [and] The Draco Tavern." Being the writer he is, however, Resnick can't let well enough alone; and The Outpost turns out to be quite a unique contribution indeed.

The story starts out "normally" enough – for an SF bar story, that is. The



setting is a lonely little gathering place ("the farthest you can get from anywhere") known as the Outpost, owned and operated by one Thomas Aloysius Hawke (aka Tomahawk). The Outpost (a combination bar-restaurant-boarding house-trading post-etc.) is situated on the planet Henry II – one of "the Eight Henrys" in the Tudor-Plantagenet binary star system – at the leading edge of the Inner Frontier, near the Galactic Core and far from the centers of galactic civilization in the Commonwealth. (Resnick has actually written quite a number of stories and novels set somewhere along the Inner Frontier. He uses it as an analog for the Wild West of American folklore.) Reggie (a robot, one of the novel's characters) describes the Outpost as "a gathering place for the most extraordinary people in the galaxy." And what "extraordinary" people they are! Here are the names of just a few of The Outpost's cast of characters: Catastrophe Baker, the Reverend Billy Karma, Gravedigger Gaines, Bet-a-World O'Grady, Three-Gun Max, Sinderella, Little Mike Picasso, Nicodemus Mayflower, and Hellfire Carson - I leave it to your imagination to figure out why they've got these names. At any rate, the Outpost is being visited by a largerthan-usual number of these "extraordinary people" all at the same time, which is (as you can imagine) not exactly conducive to a peaceful, relaxed atmosphere at the bar. It seems that there's a war on "out there" - a vast and powerful alien armada is sweeping through human space, devastating everything it encounters - and all these "extraordinary people" really don't have any interest in getting involved. They figure they'll just wait it out at the Outpost and spend the first third of the novel swapping tall tales, yarns, and hard-to-swallow anecdotes about their extraordinary careers. The reader is treated to such tales as "Catastrophe Baker and the Dragon Queen," "The Greatest Painting of All Time," "The Short, Star-Crossed Career of Magic Abdul-Jordan," "Johnny Testosterone and the Temple Virgin," and




and are lost...

many, many more. Like I said, pretty standard fare for a collection of bar stories – well-written and a rollicking good time!

But then the unthinkable happens - the war approaches the Outpost and our band of rugged individualists discover that "staying out of it" is no longer an option. So, off they go to fight the alien armada in their own unique ways. (I mean, what the hell! A fight's a fight, isn't it?) This third of the book is, naturally, devoted to a series of stories entitled "[name of character] and the Now the reader gets the Aliens." pleasure of "watching them all in action," not just listening to them spin tall tales about their careers. The reader is still in for a rollicking good time; but the body count steadily rises - and it isn't always the Aliens who bite the dust at the end of any given story.

But Resnick *still* isn't finished – he's got another twist in store! As all wars must, this one ends, too; and the survivors gradually trickle back to the Outpost, where (as always) Willie the Bard is waiting to take down everyone's story. Funny thing, though – the stories they tell just don't seem to exactly match what the reader "saw" happen during the war! Makes you wonder just how many outright lies we've been listening to since the opening of the novel, doesn't it? And then, as an added kicker, Willie announces that he's been "embellishing" and/or "interpreting" everybody's story, so that everything comes out the way it "should" – and the reader is treated to a fascinating, eye-opening discussion of such concepts as the accuracy of history, the nature of "facts," and truth vs. Truth.

What an incredible story (sto-ries?) Mike Resnick tells in *The Outpost*,with a fair-sized dollop of philosophisizingmixed in amongst one helluva lottaentertainment. It's no wonder I'm such abig fan of his! $\Lambda\Psi\Phi$
