Rabid Transit by The Ratbastards

At a recent convention I picked up a chapbook of four short stories. There was a good review of the work in *Locus* and the title, *Rabid Transit*, peaked my interest. But even more interesting was the group moniker for the four authors: The Ratbastards. Certainly, it was not a name one would soon forget. And this is also true of the stories. Each is an attempt to experiment with science fiction and fantasy and to bend the "rules", seeking new literary territory.

Each story is by one author. "The Blue Egg", by Christopher Barzak starts us off with a tale that seems familiar but quickly goes to unexpected places. Down-on-her-luck Mia finds a glowing, blue egg outside her apartment door. Such eggs are mysterious things that change the lives of people who find them. And it certainly changes Mia's life and her dreams, as the egg invades her sleeping hours. It is an unsettling story with fascinating atmosphere: it brushes the edges of surreal but also captures the world we know, while looking at the differences between choice and fate.

The second story, "The Psalm of Big Galahad", by Barth Anderson, is the most science fictional of all the works. A group of dark riders looks to save the Body from a virus. In a mix of the Holy Grail and microbiology, the riders fight an infection that can turn any of them into the enemy. This story has fantasy and science fiction elements combined with both lyric and hardedged language, giving us interesting characters and plot twists.

The most experimental of the stories is "A Number of Hooves" by Alan DeNiro. Structured as a series of numbered sentences that follow several storylines, it begins with "A girl fell in love with a centaur." This is part story and part poetry, showing different sides and views, like a kaleidoscope. It took more than one reading for me to wrap my

mind around this one, and I am sure there are parts for me to explore further.

Finally, Kristin Livdahl gives us the warmest story with "Even a Worm Will Turn". Tori buys an old house in a run-down neighborhood because she longs for a garden and it is the only area she can avoid. Through hard work and love, she transforms the yard from a urban trash dump into a green Eden. The effect goes beyond her property and local kids begin to help her change the landscape. But the transformation is not just to the land and the neighborhood, but also on the people and in more ways than just brightening their day.

short stories, and the market is often rigid in what it defines as "publishable". Fortunately, small presses allow for more unusual pieces to reach us; and the Ratbastards are one of the gems of this source. The four stories in *Rabid Transit* have succeeded in their goal of stretching the literature of fantasy and science fiction. A fusion of many styles, they are quirky, original, emotional and very good reads. You may have to search a bit for a copy of *Rabid Transit*, but you will find it worth the effort.

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Tiptree Awards Won by Two Men


The James Tiptree Jr. Memorial Award will be presented at Seacon (April 18-21, 2003, in Hinckley, Leicestershire, UK). The 2002 award has *two* winners: M. John Harrison's novel, *Light* (Victor Gollancz, U.K., 2002) and John Kessel's novella, "Stories for Men" (*Isaac Asimov's Science Fiction Magazine*, Oct/Nov 2002). Harrison and Kessel will each receive \$1000 in prize money and an original artwork created specifically for the award.

The James Tiptree Jr. Memorial Award was created in 1991 to honor Alice Sheldon, who wrote under the pseudonym James Tiptree, Jr. By her chance choice of a masculine pen name, Sheldon helped break down the imaginary barrier between "women's writing" and "men's writing". Her insightful short stories are notable for their thoughtful examination of the roles of men and women in our society.

The Tiptree Award is presented annually to a work that explores and expands gender roles in science fiction and fantasy. The aim of the award organizers is not to look for work that falls into some narrow definition of political correctness, but rather to seek out work that is thought-provoking, imaginative, and perhaps even infuriating. The Tiptree Award is intended to reward those women and men who are bold enough to contemplate shifts and changes in gender roles, a fundamental aspect of any society.

Each year, a panel of five judges selects the Tiptree Award winner. The 2002 judges were Matt Austern (chair), Farah Mendelsohn, Jae Leslie Adams, Mary Anne Mohanraj, and Molly Gloss.

The judges found *Light* (by M. John Harrison) to be a stunning work that's part space opera and part Something Else. Some of the judges thought that the protagonists (a physicist and serial killer; a mass-murdering pirate; a VR addict) were unlikable; others found the protagonists to be brutal, cruel, self-deluded, but completely real people about whom the

judges cared

deeply. All the characters are shaped in ways that very specifically have to do with the structuring and exploration of gender. The male characters are in love with ostentatious masculinity as a thing that's sometimes joyful and sometimes horrifying; the female characters are often consumed with fierce denial of their bodies and their own femaleness. Hanging over all of this is the enigmatic figure of the Shrander, whose gender identity, like so much else, is

ambiguous and complicated. *Light* is rich, horrible, sad, and absurd, and says a lot about how the body and sex inform one's humanity. It will reward rereading.

"Stories for Men" (John Kessel) is a story about masculinity, about how individuals define themselves in the context of kinship and community, and about how we construct gender roles by telling ourselves stories. The story begins with a female-centered society that mirrors some of our assumptions about social power relations between men and women, and then explicitly refers to our own society's assumptions (in the main character's encounter with a twentieth-century fiction anthology) in a way that makes those assumptions seem new and strange. It re-examines those tales of outcasts and lone heroes and manly individualism within the context of a story of community. It raises questions about the links between connectedness and exclusion, consensus and stifling

conformity, patriarchal protectiveness and sociopathy. "Stories for Men" is a short work, one that's more subtle than it first appears.

In addition to selecting the winners, the judges have compiled a "short list". This is not the list of fiction from which the judges picked the winners. Rather, it is a list of works that the judges found interesting, relevant to the award, and worthy of note.



The Academy of Science Fiction, Fantasy & Horror Films was founded in 1972 by Dr. Donald A. Reed to honor and recognize the quality of genre entertainment. Toward that end, the organization annually votes the Saturn Awards, one of the genre's most respected groups. The Academy has the support of such industry giants as Steven Spielberg, Roger Corman, Sherry Lansing, William Friedkin, Douglas Wick, Bryan Singer, James Cameron, Frank Marshall, Kathleen Kennedy, and George Pal.

On March 5, 2003, Cinescape and The Academy of Science Fiction, Fantasy and Horror Films announced the nominees for the 2003 Saturn Awards ceremony. (The winners will be presented in June 2003 in Los Angeles.) Leading the pack in the feature film category with a whopping 10 nominations each are: The Lord of the Rings: The Two Towers and Minority Report, followed closely behind by Star Wars: Episode II - Attack of the Clones (6 nominations), Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets (5 nominations) and



Spider-Man (5 nominations).
