Hal Clement 1922-2003

Another of our Greats passes.....

Harry Clement Stubbs, who under the pen name of Hal Clement wrote science fiction for sixty years and received SFWA's Grand Master Award in 1999, died in his sleep at his Milton, Massachusetts home on October 29, 2003, at age 81.

Author of a multitude of novels and stories over the course of 60+ years in the genre, Hal Clement was a regular fixture at conventions and in the community. I had the pleasure of meeting and interacting with Harry first through MITSFS (the MIT Science Fiction Society), whose annual picnic Harry tried to attend

each year, and later through casual passing at conventions. He adored the universe, the people in it, the wonders it held, and I rarely saw him with anything less than a smile. He will be missed.

Harry Clement Stubbs, who wrote science fiction as Hal Clement, died in his sleep earlier today, October 29, 2003, at his home in Milton, Massachusetts.

Born in 1922, Clement was a high school teacher whose fiction gained a reputation as quintessential hard SF – science fiction firmly based on established physics, chemistry, and astronomy. His novels often depicted highly-imagined alien worlds. The most famous was *Mission of Gravity*, set on a heavy, fast-spinning planet where the force of gravity is several times greater at the poles than at the equator. His last novel, *Noise*, was published earlier this year.

Clement was named a Grand Master by the Science Fiction Writers of America in 1999. Among his other honors was a Retro-Hugo Award in 1996 for his 1945 story "Uncommon Sense".

Clement is survived by his wife Mary, two sons George and Richard, daughter Christine Hensel, and grandson Jackson.

How to Get There? The party will be held at the home of Peter and Rob at 1425 "S" Street, NW, Washington, DC, near Dupont Circle, U Street, and Logan Circle.

Closest Metro Stop: Take Metro to the "U" St/African-American Civil War Memorial/Cardozo stop (Green Line). Exit Metro on the 13th Street side of station. When you come up the escalator, you'll be on "U" Street, facing 13th Street. There will be a Rite Aid drug store in front of you. Cross 13th Street toward the Rite Aid. Follow "U" Street to 14th Street. There will be a McDonald's at 14th Street. Cross 14th Street toward the McDonald's. Turn left in front of the McDonald's. Follow 14th Street for two full blocks. When you cross "T" Street, you'll pass a church which looks like a warehouse. When you cross Swann Street (which is between "T" and "S" Streets), you'll pass a 24-hour laundry. At "S" Street, hang a right. (If you cross "S" Street and pass a small used car lot, you've gone too far.) You'll pass the Whitman Walker Clinic and then an alley. We're the seventh row house after the alley, 1425 "S" Street, NW. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.

Alternative Metro Stop: Take Metro to the Dupont Circle stop (Red Line). Exit the Metro on the "Q" Street side of the station. At the top of the escalator, hang a right on "Q" Street. Follow "Q" Street and pass a liquor store on your right and a Wrap Works sandwich shop on your left. Travel five blocks, passing the Raku Asian restaurant at 19th Street, a couple of large apartment buildings at 18th Street (crossing New Hampshire Ave. at a diagonal), a Trios Pizza restaurant at 17th Street, the Jewish Community Center at 16th Street, and row houses at 15th Street. Cross 15th Street and hang a left. Travel two blocks on 15th Street to "S" Street. Cross "S" Street and hang a right. We're of the way down the street, at 1425 "S" Street, NW. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.

Driving Directions: 1425 "S" Street, NW is located in the 1400 block of

14th Street, half way between 14th and 15th Streets, which run north/south. 14th Street is a two-way street. 15th Street is a one-way street, heading north. "S" Street is a two-way street and runs east/west.

From the North: Get onto 16th Street (Exit 31 on the Beltway) on Connecticut Avenue (Exit 33 on the Beltway) heading South. Turn left on "S" Street and follow "S" Street (6½ blocks from Connecticut Avenue; 2 blocks from 16th Street) to 1425 "S" Street, NW. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.

From the South: Get onto I-495 North. After crossing the Potomac River, follow signs for US Route 1 (near the Thomas Jefferson Memorial). US Route 1 become 14th Street. Follow 14th Street to "S" Street. Turn left on "S" Street and follow "S" Street ½ block to 1425 "S" Street. Call 202-483-6369 if you get lost.


Parking: Street parking is generally available, though it's harder to find the later it gets. On weekends and holidays, there are no parking restrictions, but make sure not to park too close to street intersections, alleys, and fire hydrants — or risk getting a ticket. Safe distances are usually marked.



There's a new book coming out this month entitled *Phobos*, by Ty Drago; and it's one of the best stories I've read in a very long time. And as I've had quite some time on hand(s), I've been living with my nose in a book (I love the smell), so I would know.

Quickly, and with no spoilers: Mike Brogue is part cop and part solider, and full Martian. As a prize for saving one of the powerful people on Mars from a terror kidnapping, he is given a choice of being stuck in a never-ending photo op or of getting sent to a research outpost on the moon Phobos, where something has started hunting the scientists. Guess what his choice is?

This is a truly great story with a little bit military, mystery, intrigue and a lot of just good old-fashioned SF— with a hostile lifeform thrown into the mix, just for that special added flavor. I got a jump on everybody when I had the chance to read the advanced, uncorrected proof (a bit of bragging here), but I'll be out to buy the book. As the author lives very near to me in NJ, I think there's a good chance I can get it signed.

Star Trek x 3 = ? reviews by Carl Cipra



As with any category this broad, I've found "Star Trek literature" to be a pretty mixed bag. I've read almost a dozen Star Trek books - by various authors - and I can't say that reading them has been an unalloyed pleasure. Yes, I really enjoyed a couple of 'em specifically: Steve Barnes' incredible "expanded novelization" Far Beyond the Stars (based on the DS9 TV episode about Benny Russell, the black sci-fi pulp writer); and Captain Proton: Defender of the Earth by D.W. "Prof." Smith (a campy pulp-style story based on Tom Paris' Vovager holo-deck adventures). On the other hand, I found some Trek books to be utter disappointments. (I'm a big fan of Julia Ecklar's works; but I can't say that I'd recommend her "classic Trek" novel, The Kobayashi Maru, to anyone as an indication of just how good a writer she is. And I consider my reading of Jeri Taylor's novel, Unification, to have been a waste of time, since it provides nothing beyond what you'll see in the 2part TNG episode – I'd been hoping for some further insights into Romulan society.) Others - such as Diane Duane's Dark Mirror [TNG]; Melissa Scott's Proud Helios [DS9] and The Garden [Voyager]; and S.N. Lewitt's Cybersong [Voyager] - I'd rate as anywhere from "pretty good" to "just OK".

Having said that, I ended up taking three *Star Trek* novels along with me on a recent work-related trip. I just thought I'd let you know what I think about 'em.

Uhura's Song by Janet Kagan (1985)

This one's been buried in my "to read" pile for quite a while. I bought a used copy of *Uhura's Song* several years ago after reading – and enjoying! – Kagan's *Hellspark* (Meisha Merlin Press). I had really enjoyed the way Kagan handled non-alien cultures and personalities in *Hellspark* and decided to give her earlier work a try. (If you're



interested, I reviewed *Hellspark* in the May 1999 issue of the LSF newsletter.)

Uhura's Song is an example of a "non-canonical" Star Trek story – i.e. it's not a story from any of the TV series or movies. It's a novel that uses familiar Star Trek characters to tell a science fictional story. In the case of Uhura's Song, Kagan uses "Classic Trek" characters.

A deadly plague has broken out among the cat-like sentients of the planet Eeiauo; and the USS Enterprise has been sent in an attempt to find a cure. Unfortunately, there doesn't seem to be a cure and humans are succumbing to the plague, too - in fact, several of the Enterprise crew have been infected. The only hope would seem to be encoded within the secret traditional songs of the Eeiauoans, songs that Uhura learned from an Eeiauoan diplomat she befriended many years ago. Now, Enterprise is flashing across the galaxy in a race against time to find a cure on a mythical Eeiauoan homeworld - before the plague spreads to more Federation planets.

Not a bad little book. Although I didn't find Kagan's handling of the cultures of the feline Eeiauoans and Sivaoans to be as expert as her handling of alien cultures in *Hellspark*, it was still well done. Interestingly, Kagan has also woven an archetypal "Trickster" figure into this story – an intriguing plot device that I can't go into without spoiling the story; and, frankly, I'm still of two minds as to whether I like the way she handles it. This book will probably be difficult to find – I think it's been out of print for years.

Garth of Izar by Pamela Sargent and George Zebrowski (2003)



This is the novel that actually got me going on this recent Star Trek kick. Garth of Izar is what I'd call a "continuing story" type of Star Trek novel – it takes a character from one of the Trek episodes/movies and tells you "what happens next" (or "what led up to this"). Garth of Izar, obviously, tells "what happens next" to Captain Garth ("LORD Garth!!!"), the shape-shifting madman that Kirk and Spock encountered on their visit to the Federation rehabilitation asylum on Elba II (in the episode entitled "Whom Gods Destroy"). I'd found Garth (as portrayed on TV by the late Steve Ihnat) to be a fascinating character - and Sargent and Zebrowski are pretty well-known SF authors – so when I saw this novel on the stands, I decided to give it a try.

Garth has seemingly been cured of his madness; and Starfleet Command has been debating what to do about him. Garth was, after all, a tactical military genius and a war hero – but then there's that period of insanity and the uncertainty of whether he's actually cured. Should Starfleet give him his rank back, give him a command, bury him in a desk job somewhere, or retire him outright? In the meantime, Garth has alerted Starfleet about a secret plot by the Antossians (the secretive race that originally taught him their shape-shifting abilities) and has offered his services in exposing their plans. Still not certain of what to do with him, Starfleet Command assigns Captain

Kirk, Commander Spock, and the rest of the crew of the *USS Enterprise* to assist Garth on this mission – and to keep an eye on Garth, should he in fact still be insane.

On the whole, I wasn't overly impressed with this one. The plot twists centering around the uncertainty of Garth's mental status were handled well; but, considering what was done with Odo and the Founders in *DS9*, I expected the culture of the shapeshifting Antossians to be handled better. Ah, well, I guess I'll just have to rate *Garth of Izar* as another of those "just OK" *Trek* novels.

Vulcan's Heart by Josepha Sherman and Susan Shwartz (1999)




I've always been intrigued with the contrasting societies and cultures of the planet Vulcan and the Romulan Empire, so I decided to read this one despite my previous disappointment with Jeri Taylor's novelization *Unification*.

Vulcan's Heart is what I'd call a "linking story," one that connects events that occur in one or more TrekTV episodes or movies – or, if you prefer, a "fill in the gaps" story that tells you what happened between various episodes/movies. In the case of Vulcan's Heart readers are provided with links between the classic *Trek* episode "The Enterprise Incident" and the episodes "Yesterday's Enterprise" and the two-part "Unification". The major characters in Vulcan's Heart include: Ambassador Spock; Commander Saavik (Spock's former protege,); Lieutenant Jean-Luc Picard of the USS Stargazer; Ambassador Sarek (Spock's father); Admiral Leonard McCoy; Senator Pardek of Romulus (from "Unification") and Commander Charvanek (the unnamed Romulan Commander, from "The Enterprise Incident"); and Captain Rachel Garrett and Lieutenant Richard Castillo of the *USS Enterprise*, NCC-1701-C (from "Yesterday's Enterprise"). The story begins with the betrothal of Spock and Saavik on Vulcan (an event not previously shown anywhere else) and culminates with the Battle of Narendra III (as shown in "Yesterday's Enterprise").

For years, Spock has been researching his theories of the origins of Romulan civilization as an offshoot of Vulcan civilization; and he has dreamed of healing that ancient rift between the two branches of the Vulcan-Romulan The authorities on Vulcan. race. however, have studiously ignored him. Therefore, to advance both these projects, Spock plans to secretly visit the Romulan capital and contact the leaders of a growing dissident movement. Meanwhile, Dralath, the ambitious new Romulan Praetor is plotting to overthrow the Emperor and assume personal control of the Romulan Star Empire using a sneak attack against an unarmed Klingon outpost as the first step to garner support for his regime. Spock's life becomes increasingly imperiled as the political pot boils over on Romulus, while the lives of his friends - and of his bride-to-be, Saavik – are endangered by the interplanetary cold-war-gone-hot.

I rather liked Vulcan's Heart. Sherman and Shwartz do a nice job of bringing together the elements of various disparate TV episodes and melding them harmoniously. They've also managed to "stay true" to the characters and to the overall "feel" of the Trek universe. Not exactly Hugo or Nebula Award material, but nicely done nevertheless. (FYI: The same authors had previously co-written another *Trek* novel, Vulcan's Forge [1998], which I haven't read. It's apparently a stand-alone novel about another period of Spock's life, not part of a "series," as such.) ΛΨΦ
